This voucher can be completed and mailed to the COA, without a presigned contract, accompanied by a quote or receipt for lawn cleanup. The voucher, which expires July 1, is good for up to \$100 to pay a provider to clean up your lawn. One voucher is allowed per household for a person 60 years of age or older who resides in Charlevoix County and owns his/her own home. 

## Merriman found guilty, despite no body

CHARLEVOIX — A jury of eight women and four men found Charles Merriman guilty of seconddegree murder on Friday, May 9, in the Charlevoix County Circuit Court. The jury deliberated about 10 hours after listening to testimony and reviewing evidence in the 14-day trial.

Merriman stood quietly next to his attorneys while the jurors filed into the courtroom and the jury foreman read the unanimous verdict. After a brief comment between Merriman and his attorneys, he was ushered out of the courtroom by the bailiff.

Prosecutor John Jarema convinced the jury that Charles, 58, had murdered his brother, Bill Merriman, then 54, in June 2006, at the Phelps Road family home near East Jordan. Bill disappeared in mid-June 2006. His body has not been found.

"I think it is a just verdict," Jarema said. "It was a long case, and the jury was great. Dan and Mike (defense counsel) put a lot of work into it and did a great

Although Bill's body has not been found, some of the bloodstains within the house have Bill's DNA. Jarema told the jury that there was too much blood

## Boyne City Library is going green

BOYNE CITY - After celebrating their 90th anniversary in April, the Boyne District Library decided to honor the milestone with a Going Green campaign. After 90 years, Library Director Nannette Miller said it was time for a change.

"We are sort of changing" our ways of doing things. We are calling it Renewable Resources at your library. We are going to start being more responsible to the environment," Miller said. "We are using recyclable materials and redoing the entry way right now with recycled materi-

Miller said the library will stop giving out plastic bags to take books home and start using bags made out of recycled materials. The library already recycles cardboard and newspapers and has started using recycled copy paper.

The Renewable Resources at your library campaign will kickoff in a couple of weeks with banners announcing the project. It will be an ongoing process throughout the year as they celebrate turning 90.

## Moody, Vondra win Boyne City school board seats

BOYNE CITY — Ed Vondra, 59, was re-elected to the Boyne City School Board joined by Marty Moody, 45. Vondra, an incumbent, earned 40 percent of the vote while Moody took 32 percent.

## East Jordan advances towards new rentals

EAST JORDAN — The city is a step closer to approving new rental housing with rents that reflect today's tight economy. On Tuesday, May 6, the East Jordan city commission approved a first reading of an ordinance that would per-

mit the project. The proposed project is a 12-unit apartment building off of M-66, near Glen's Market. The Jordan Valley District Library currently owns the 71-acres of land, but the developer would purchase it. Only a small portion of the land would be used for the apartment building.

A two-bedroom apartment has approximately 1,100-square-feet and a three-bedroom has approximately 1,200-square-feet, according to design plans. The lowest rent would be about \$300 per month and the highest would be about \$650 per month. The rental rate varies depending on the household income and the size of the family.

The housing would be new apartment residences with conveniences, such as dishwashers and garbage disposals.

Developer Gerry Haan from Harbor Springs would construct the apartment building under a state program known as the PILOT program, or Payment in Lieu of Taxes. This means that the city will receive eight percent of each unit's rent, rather than receiving proper-

ty taxes from the landowner. The program is administered through the Michigan







## Give Me Strength

Just because you reach a certain age doesn't mean you have to give up exercising. Sure, it won't be as easy, but if you become inactive, you will lose flexibility, endurance and strength. Your metabolism will slow down, and you may gain some weight. Exercise is important, even in your golden vears.

The type of exercise you do will depend upon the effect you want. If you are hoping to gain flexibility, you will want to concentrate on stretching exercises. If you are hoping to improve your overall fitness and strengthen your heart, you will want to concentrate on endurance exercises. If you are hoping to gain muscle strength, you will want to concentrate on strength training. For the best results, you may combine the three. Before you start an exercise program, make sure you check with your doctor

Building and maintaining strength is important for seniors. Strength training

involves weights that you can buy at a sporting goods store or make using milk jugs filled with water or sand or socks filled with beans. You should start with a weight you can lift without much effort five times. As lifting becomes easier, you can gradually increase the number of repetitions up to 15 times in a set. Then you can increase the amount of weight you are lifting. Strength training works well when done two to three times a day for 30 to 40 minutes in the privacy of your own home.

Here are some strength training exercises you can do at home: • Arm raises. Sit in a chair with your feet flat on the floor even with your shoulders. Drop your arms down by your sides with your palms facing toward your body. Raise both arms until they are at shoulder height. Hold this position for one second and then slowly lower your arms back to your sides. Repeat eight to 15 times, rest and repeat another eight to 15

Chair stands. Place some

pillows against the back of a chair. Sit in the middle or toward the front with your knees bent and feet flat on the floor. Lean back on the pillows in a half-reclining position, keeping your back and shoulders straight. Raise your upper body until you are sitting upright. Using your hands as little as possible, slowly stand up and slowly sit back down. Keep your shoulders and back straight at all times. Repeat eight to 15 times, rest and repeat another eight to 15 times. As your strength increases, try doing this while standing on one leg and alternating legs.

• Back-strengthening exercises. Sit with your back straight and your feet flat on the floor. With your arms relaxed and bent, pull back your shoulders as far as they will go. Repeat 10 to 30 times twice a day.

• Hip flexion. Lie back with one leg bent. Straighten your other leg and raise it about six to eight inches. Slowly lower your leg. Repeat 10 to 30 times twice a day, alternating legs.

• Quadriceps-squats. Stand on

your tiptoes holding onto a countertop or the back of a chair. Squat down as far as you can and then stand up. Repeat 10 to 30 times twice a day.

While exercising,

there are some things you should remember. Breathe. Exhale as you lift weights and inhale as you relax. Don't hold your breath, or it could affect your blood pressure. Use smooth, steady movements when bringing weights into position. Don't use jerky movements or lock the joints of your arms and legs into a strained position. Be prepared for some fatigue and muscle soreness for a few days. Don't overdo it, or sore joints, muscle pulls and exhaustion could occur.

To avoid injuries while strength training, warm up and



cool down with some stretching exercises for five to 15 minutes. There are stretching exercises for the back, chest, shoulders, arms, stomach, calves and thighs.

Strength training can build your hips, ankles, legs, buttocks and lower back, which in turn can lead to better balance, more active participation in everyday activities and more independence. Isn't that what every senior wants?

## Beware of something for nothing scams

For over three years, a western Michigan company has seen their name smeared by scam artists offering an "International Lottery Winning" or "Grant" check sent to thousands of consumers.

Individuals across the United States have received certified checks for about \$4,900 according to the Better Business Bureau of Western Michigan, Inc. stating it was the first part of their winnings or grant. The scam starts by asking to deposit the check in your account and send \$3,000 or more to a P.O. Box in some far off place to pay for taxes, insurance and handling.

Once a consumer falls for this and sends the money, the original check will bounce at your bank after they learn it is counterfeit. Then it's too late and you are swindled out of your hard earned money.

Now most of us want to believe we are to smart to be fooled by these predators but another catch with the check is the name and logo of an actual business appears on the counterfeit document to add credibility. According to the news release, the BBB system has seen many fake check scams drawn off of local banks, local manufacturers and local retailers that had high tech copies printed on stock check writing forms.

Ken Vander Meeden, BBB of Western Michigan President said: "This scam won't go away particularly in this tough economy when even good people have a greater financial need and think they won something for nothing. It used to be a generation ago, that a socalled "certified check" was as good as gold as you had to put the money into the bank in order to get a certified check. Many older people still believe this falsehood and are the victims. Additionally, a local business gets it's named misused and abused and has very little recourse in clearing their name."

In other words, you never get something for nothing. In these tough economic times watch out for scams that promise the world with very little in return. Anytime an organization asks for money that should raise a red flag and this type of hustle targets everyone across Amer-

The BBB in the release warns consumers to research any check before cashing it and obviously before sending any money from your own account. Simple steps like asking why you received a check, why would a bank or manufacturer send a partial check and ask for your money, and does the company whose name is on the check actually exist.

The BBB urges individuals to call their office or the Attorney General before succumbing to these scam artists. Visit www.bbb.org to find out more about counterfeit check scams.

Despite your title, the assurances offered in the referenced open letter deal with only a minor portion of the Little Traverse Bay pollution problem, and those assurances ring somewhat hol-

Several important questions have been asked but have simply been ignored - questions about the several legally required but missing maps, the basis for CMS's assumptions as to matters that are required to be measured, the missing though required comparative data from

been answered by nothing more than a dismissive silence.

The two layers of rock you identify as impermeable, both in your letter and in the sidebar, are shown in the accompanying dreamy sketch as not impermeable. Such stark contradiction on a key factor is not reassuring. That graffito does not even vaguely resemble officially published stratigraphy of the region, making it hard to credit your claim of reliance on science.

As is well known hereabouts, our drinking water aquifers do not belly upwards toward the surface, as your cartoon depicts. The underground structure here in the Michigan Basin is bowed strongly downward, like a stack of cereal bowls. All the rock layers do cup upwards at the edges, of course, with the one you're aiming at coming to the surface at Little Traverse Bay. So even if that layer were imother wells in the area of review. Those questions and others have permeable, what does your deep well plan actually hope to accom-

plish? Some have suggested that it merely engineers a twenty-year busy-work activity until the toxic injectate re-emerges where it is right now.

Never mind how many other injection well permits have been issued. Their number does not excuse errors and inattention to relevant detail in the project you head. Nor do they excuse the substitution of factual data by soothing PR syrup, showing such overweening disrespect for the readers you're addressing.

They do serve to remind us, however, of the great additional pressure that will be exerted on the fluid layers and the cracks and porosity you're imagining will constitute a safe repository. A bit more calculation seems called for.

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

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

## New rules at Boyne City boat launch sites

Boating season is upon us, and Boyne City has new rules governing both of their public boat launch ramps - the North Boyne Launch Ramp located at 525 N. Lake St. and the Veterans Park Launch Ramp which is adjacent to the City Marina.

Boat Launch Ramp Rules, adopted by the City Commission on 4/ 22/08, are as follows:

1. All launch ramp users must pay the daily launch fee which is adopted annually by the City Commission; unless an annual seasonal launch sticker has been obtained and is displayed as directed. In addition an overnight parking fee is required for each night a vehicle with attached trailer is parked at the launch or other designated parking areas. A payment tube and payment envelopes are located at each launch. Envelopes shall be filled out completely and legibly. 2. Parking at the North

spaces is restricted to only vehicles with attached, empty, boat trailers. The parking of passenger vehicles, empty trailers unattached to a vehicle, or any vessel on a trailer is prohibited. for instruction. 3. Overnight vehicle with attached trailer parking at the Veterans Park launch ramp parking area

4. Overnight parking at the North Boyne Launch is limited to 14 days.

5. Vehicles with attached trailers must be able to fit within the designated parking spaces. If your overall length extends beyond the markings, you must make arrangements with the launch attendant or marina staff.

6. Fishing off the launch ramp docks is prohibited.

7. No overnight camping is allowed.

The rules and fees are the same for both launch ramps. The Veterans Park ramp in the past has been used without a fee, but there was a size limit on the boat being launched. This launch is now a pay launch, but the size limit has been lifted. Users of this ramp should launch with caution, as the water is shallow and not usually conducive to launching a larger boat.

Boat Launch Ramp Fees are as follows: \$7 per day, \$7 per overnight, and \$30 for a season permit.

Violation fines are \$20 for the first offense, \$30, second offense, and \$50, third offense.

One of the perks of being property owner and/or resident within the city limits of Boyne City is being eligible for one free seasonal boat launch pass. If you own more than one boat and trailer, you may purchase additional passes for \$10. City residents who do not obtain a pass will be expected to pay the regular rates. Commercial users pay \$150 for an unlimited use seasonal pass. Eligibility require-

ments for a free seasonal pass are: (this includes additional \$10 passes)

• You must provide us with your local address.

• If you are a renter, you will need to show proof of local address (i.e. drivers license or State ID card). • You must bring in

proof of boat ownership (current boat registration); you will not receive a free pass without it. You are NOT eligible

for a free seasonal pass if: You do not live within the city limits of Boyne City. • The boat you are get-

tered in someone else's name. Information you will need to fill out your regis-

ting the pass for is regis-

 MC #, trailer license plate #, and vehicle license plate #.

These passes (stickers) are seasonal and you will need to obtain a new one each year. They are available at City Hall, and for your convenience, they are also available at the Municipal Marina and Boyne River Bait Shop (across from the boat launch) on weekends and after hours.

The marina officially opens on May 15 and will be able to start taking reservations for the season at that time.

## **Boating safety** classes offered

County Sheriff's Office will again offer Boating Safety classes. The class is free of charge and preregistration is not required. Minimum age for class attendance is 12 years of age. Students should bring date of birth information with them for registration purposes. It is recommended that students eat prior to class or bring a small snack to class. Due to the short duration of the course, there will be no meal time. Students receiving a satisfactory test grade will receive their Michigan Boating Safety Certificate at the conclusion of the course. If you currently have an on-line boating safety certificate, you must take a proctored test and receive a state honored boating safety certificate. The state only honors on-line course completed certificates that have been verified by a proctored Michigan exam.

Classes will be offered on Saturday, May 31, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., at the Charlevoix Yacht Club; Saturday, June 28, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., at the Walloon Lake Country Club (Grandma's); Monday, July 7, from 4 to 8 p.m., at the Boyne City Middle School; Monday, July 14, from 2:30 to 6:30 p.m., at the

Charlevoix East Jordan District Library; and Saturday, Aug. 2, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., at the Walloon Lake Country Club (Grandma's).

The proctored exams will be held Monday, July 7, from 7 to 8 p.m., at the Boyne City Middle School and Monday, July 14, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m., at the East Jordan District Library. This is only for those who have an on-line boating safety certificate. Individuals will take the state exam and are free to leave upon successful completion of the exam. Completion of this

class is mandatory for individuals: (1) born after Dec. 31, 1978, to operate a PWC (jet ski), (2) for juveniles between the ages of 12 and 10 to operate a boat, and (3) for parents that allow their children between the ages of 12 and 14 to operate a PWC. A parent must be riding with the child during operation.

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



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

in the game with Robby Jensen and Trever Kruzel knocking out two each. Nick Young, Forbes, Kolbi


Shumaker, Ryan Clubine and Trevor Price all had one apiece.







## Morel mural planned for Boyne City

A seventeen-foothigh mural depicting morel mushrooms will soon become a feature of downtown Boyne Local artist, Jerry Douglas, proposed the project, designed the image, and has begun work at the site. The mural will be painted on the north side of the Boyne Valley Printing building, and be visible along Lake Street to the Water Street intersec-

tion.

The project is a promotional event and fundraiser for the Boyne City Morel Mushroom Festival. The Main Street program is sponsoring the cost of supplies and materials, purchased from local businesses, and additional funds will be raised by a raffle for the original oil painting, created by Douglas for this project. The estimated value of the painting, with museum quality

matting and frame is \$600. Raffle tickets will cost \$5 each, and can be purchased at the Boyne Area Chamber of Commerce, where the painting can be viewed. Besides paying for the mural, the raffle could raise more than \$2,000 for the festival.

The goals of the Morel Mural Project include promoting the festival, encouraging downtown foot traffic, replacing a bare conscrete wall with a visually pleasing image, and raising awareness of the Boyne Arts Collective, a local organization dedicated to promoting the arts and art education, and expanding opportunities for local artists.


