EAST JORDAN — Lady motorcycle enthusiasts came together for a weekend of riding and fun in East Jordan for the 8th annual Lady Biker Day on Aug. 15 and 16. All money raised from the event went to Camp Quality Michigan, a summer camping experience and year-round support program for children with cancer.

Dawn Johnson, coordinator of the event for the last eight years, said Lady Biker Day has been a magical experience for both the community and the ladies.

"The one-day event turned into two days with many lasting friendships being made. The event brings excitement and positive growth not just to the community of East Jordan but throughout our northern Michigan area," Johnson said. "Lady Bikers have made many return trips to northern Michigan to experience our four-season climate."

Johnson said the women look forward to visiting the children of Camp Quality and the kids play a huge part in their lives throughout the year. The Lady Bikers spend the year raising funds, hosting events and promoting Camp Quality in their home communities.

"It is truly amazing the funds that are given to this wonderful organization with love and a deep sense of caring for the Camp Quality kids and the programs that this organization does for children with cancer," Johnson added. "When our visit is over with the kids, we leave being inspired by their determination to survive and beat the biggest obstacles that life has handed them."

Throughout the years attendance has varied with the highest number totaling 150 members of the community. In the first year, only 25 people came out but factors such as the economy and weather influences the numbers.

When it comes to motorcycles, most often people think of men, but Johnson said another benefit of this event is seeing how women also love to ride.

"Lady Bikers breaks the stereotype that is so often placed on bikers. You will find grandmothers, daughters, and granddaughters among those riding bikes and enjoying the freedom and independence of owning and riding their own bikes," Johnson explained.

Road funding slated for Nov. ballot

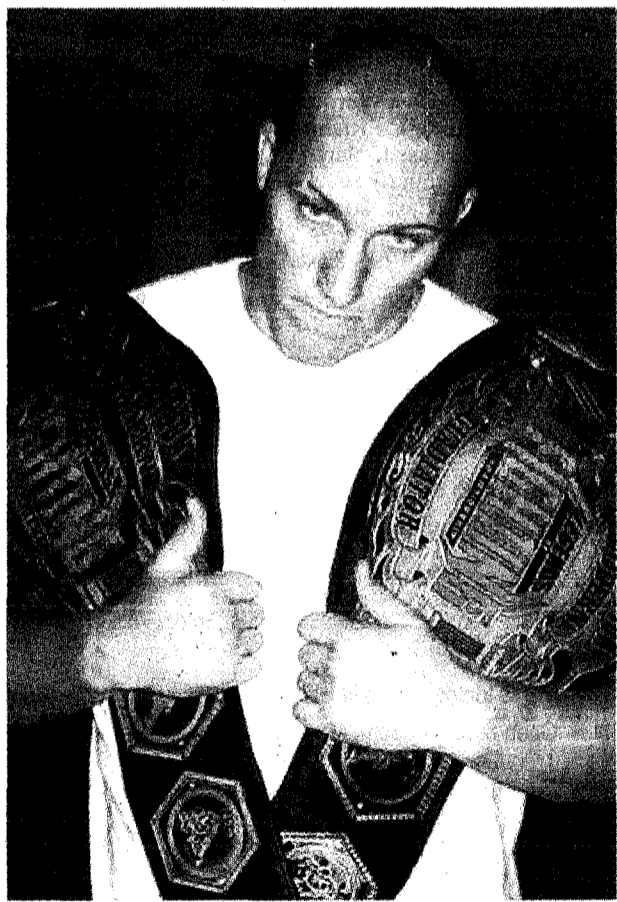
CHARLEVOIX — Charlevoix County residents who already pay for repairing and rebuilding county roads through gasoline taxes will be asked to pay more through a millage that would be levied on their property taxes.

County commissioners at an Aug. 13 meeting approved the county road commission's resolution to place a request for one mill on the Nov. 4 general election ballot. If approved by voters, the millage would tax residents the one mill each year for a period of 15 years — from 2009-2023. The funds would be used to pay the cost of rebuilding and repaving existing roads in the county's townships, cities and villages.

One mill is \$1 in taxes for every \$1,000 of a home's taxable value. In other words, if the taxable value of a home is \$100,000, one mill will add \$100 each year to the property taxes on that home.

Approximately 61 miles of county roads would be repaired or reconstructed, including the Boyne City-Charlevoix

The return of "The Franchise"

BOYNE CITY — On Sept. 6, the Leelanau Sands Casino will host the King of The Cage event and Boyne City's own "The Franchise" Kyle Gibbons is set to participate. Gibbons has quickly climbed the ranks in the professional mixed martial arts sport world and at just 24-years-old, boasts a 15-0 Middleweight record with nine knockouts and six submissions in the 185-pound weight class.

His road to the MMA began with tragedy as Gibbons lost both his mother, Lori Cain, and best friend, Damian Vondra, at the age of 21. Needing an outlet for his anger, Gibbons turned to Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu to deal with his rage.

"I felt as if two very important people in my life were stolen from me with no explanation. At 21-years-old in northern Michigan there aren't a lot of options for someone who was as upset or angry as I was," Gibbons said. "I turned to Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu, a discipline that I could study and focus on and escape the anguish of loss and cope with

Hearing set for fate of oldest city building

BOYNE CITY — The 1910 Water Works building at Park and Division streets has not been in use for 20 years and the city commission wants to decide its fate — demolition or preservation.

At a commission meeting on Aug. 13, the commissioners scheduled a public hearing for Tuesday, Aug. 26, that will be a part of the regular commission meeting. The noon meeting has been rescheduled to 7 p.m. on that day.

The 1,000-square-foot building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The National Register is the federal government's official list of properties that are deemed to be worthy of preservation because of their importance in American history and culture. It provides benefits, such as eligibility for federal tax incentives and other preservation assistance. However, listing in the register does not interfere with the owner's right to manage or dispose of the property.

The 1910 building was built as a pump station for the city water works and is the oldest structure owned by the city. It is historically significant as a part of the original infrastructure of Boyne City, according to information from city records.

The public water supply system became grossly inadequate by 1910, after the city's population grew by 600 percent during the burgeoning wood products industries era, according to research conducted by the state's historic preservation office.

A major reconstruction of the water works that began in 1910 expanded

the public water system to keep pace with the city's anticipated future growth.

But, now, the brick on the exterior of the 98-year-old building is deteriorating in some areas and the interior is in poor condition. However, much of the

original tin ceiling and woodwork is salvageable, according to the city.

Several commissioners declined to comment on a resolution of the building until after the Aug. 26 public hearing. But, Mayor Eleanor Stackus said the

building should be torn down.

"We've been over and over this so many times and we need to make a decision," Stackus said. She said she is in favor of demolishing the building.

the mental pain. I paid close attention to my Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu instructor Kevin Shoultz, and he took my physical attributes and made me a Jiu-Jitsu national champion."

Gibbons then met Seung-Ni out of Traverse City who gave him a place to train providing discipline that Gibbons said improved his confidence in himself.

"Seung-Ni presented me with a great group of other dedicated people. Since my move to Traverse City after college I was missing one thing that Boyne City had given me that I had took for granted for years...family and friends. Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu turned my life back in the right direction," Gibbons added.

After reaching the heights of national champion in Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu, Gibbons said the floodgates opened as he was thrust into the MMA spotlight. Gibbons received numerous calls from agents and fight teams as new possibilities opened up. He then decided to pursue a career in MMA and signed with agent Scott McCorkle and moved to Indianapolis, Ind., to join the Midwest's premiere fight team, Damage Inc.

Gibbons moved to Boyne City to live with his father in 1998 and

excelled in football, track and basketball at Boyne City High School. Gibbons' family has supported his decision to participate in such a violent lifestyle and trusted his choice.

"My family has always supported me in whatever I have done. I have always had a very devoted close-knit family. They raised me knowing there would be times I would make bad decisions, but they knew with their direction that I was smart enough to learn and make the right ones," Gibbons commented. "Naturally there are members of my family who are afraid or concerned when I compete but they had the same concerns when I strapped on that Boyne football helmet and ran onto the Earl Brotherton field."

Kyle's parents, Jim and Melanie Gibbons currently reside in Boyne City and met 10 years ago. Jim had Kyle and daughter Aliasha, 19, and Melanie's kids Tiffany, 15, and AJ, 13, all came together to join as one big family.

"Jim was born and raised in Boyne City. We have always liked and appreciated the community and the impact it has on our kids in a positive manner," Melanie said. "We have always been a very tight knit family.

Kyle was raised by us to know and appreciate his family. We are extremely proud that Kyle has been able to take a life of extremely hard occurrences and be successful at everything he does."

The Gibbons' said they are always concerned when Kyle has a big fight but they trust his preparation and judgment before he competes.

Kyle now lives in Greencastle, Ind., where he met his wife Erin at a social function. The couple have two sons, Hunter, 8, and Maddox James who was just born and named after Kyle's father. Gibbons now teaches Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu in Greencastle and hopes to do a Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu defensive tactics seminar in Boyne City in the near future.

Gibbons' rise up through the ranks in the sport has seen him fight in 17 MMA events with a record of 15-2, with his only losses at the 170 pound level. He is 15-0 when fighting at 185. His ultimate goal was to fight in the Ultimate Fighting Championship and after his first nine fights ended in victory in the first round lasting no more than two minutes, he got a call from UFC matchmaker Joe Silva.

"Unfortunately at that time he needed a

welterweight fighter (170 pounds). So my agent spoke to me and we decided to drop an additional fifteen pounds for my next fight so I could compete in the welterweight division," Gibbons explained. "35 pounds was just too much weight to cut, and in the first round of my next fight I broke my sternum trying to lift my opponent for a slam."

He then went back to the middleweight division and won his next fight by knockout in 25 seconds in the first round. His agent was contacted again for a welterweight fight against UFC veteran Rich Clementi in Las Vegas, the Mecca of professional fighting.

"Rich Clementi is not the type of competition you fight with the experience of only six professional cage fights. This man had been fighting professionally since I was sitting in Mr. Thomason's math class at Boyne City Middle School in eighth grade," Gibbons said. "I fight in the middleweight division (185 pounds)...I believe it to be the most competitive weight division in mixed martial arts."

If the building is preserved, some suggestions for its use are as a fire or ambulance service building or for use

with Avalanche Park. The building could also be moved to another site.

Road and Ellsworth Road, which would be totally reconstructed. Other roads that would be improved include Marion Center, Peninsula, Norwood, Ferry, Deer Lake and Camp Ten Road.

County commission chairperson, Chris Christensen, said that while he is concerned about more taxes, a ballot proposal gives people a choice.

"It's not a perfect solution, but this way the voters have a chance to decide what to do about the roads," Christensen said.

Deteriorating roads are not unique to Charlevoix County. The problem is pervasive throughout Michigan's 83 counties and the state highways as a whole. Factors such as truck traffic and the freeze and thaw cycles contribute to road deterioration, according to the County Road Association of Michigan.

The state historically does not budget as much in funds for roads as most other states, according to the County Road Association of Michigan. At current funding levels it is estimated that local road agencies will lose \$204 million annually by 2015 because of the inability to match federal funding, according to CRAM.

Adding to the problem are the costs of road improvements. Asphalt has increased by 47 percent within the last eight years, for

instance.

The gas tax accounts for 45.7 percent of the funding for roads. Vehicle registration fees account for 43.6 percent. The gas tax is a flat tax and it does not increase with the price of gas or with inflation.

Fourteen of the state's 83 counties have turned to a millage to garner more funds. But, CRAM states that an increase in the fuel tax is the most equitable way to fund roads, because it is a user tax whereas a levy on property taxes will affect the elderly and other people who may be on fixed incomes and who do not use the roads as much as others.

CRAM also supports an increase in the diesel tax. Currently, Michigan charges the equivalent of 15 cents tax per gallon of diesel fuel, but 19 cents per gallon of gasoline. The Michigan Department of Transportation reports that trucks are responsible for 40 percent of the need to fix roads and the cost of building and repairing roads, but contribute only 15 percent of the funds needed.

A comprehensive effort is underway to come up with the best solution for fixing and funding roads. A "Drive MI" campaign is underway to raise the gas tax. More information may be found at www.drivemi.org.

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Grant would provide sidewalks

BOYNE CITY — The city and Northern Homes Community Development Corporation will have new sidewalks in a neighborhood close to the public schools if a grant is approved.

Jane MacKenzie, executive director of Northern Homes CDC, brought the grant possibility before city commissioners at an Aug. 12 meeting. Known as the Neighborhood Preservation Initiative Challenge Grant, the funds would be awarded by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority. The maximum award is \$60,000. A local match of \$20,000 is required.

The sidewalks would run along Boise Street, between Main Street and Brockway Street, along Roosevelt Street from Boise to McLean streets, along Main Street between Boise and Harris streets and for 370-feet along Harris. A 390-foot section near the Housing Commission on Wynonna Street would also be included.

City manager Michael Cain said the benefits of obtaining the grant are that the neighborhood sidewalk network will be expanded with additional loops, the area will be safer for school children, and the city will continue infrastructure improvements in more areas of the city.

The sidewalks would be installed at no cost to the abutting property owners, Cain said, and the work would be done in 2009.

N.E.A.T. stands for non-exercise activity thermogenesis and is the energy expended for everything we do that's not eating, sleeping or sports-like exercise. It can include the energy used in walking, fidgeting, yard work, playing guitar, housework, shopping, pacing while on the phone, etc. Researchers overfed both lean and obese people by 1000 calories a day and found that those who can switch on their NEAT don't gain fat when overfed. The people who don't increase their NEAT gain 10 times more fat than those who do. They also found that obese people are dramatically more sedentary and move 2½ hours less per day than lean people.

Crackdown on drunk driving

Having a fun summer? Enjoying all the festivities and parties that are associated with this time of year? Well, as August begins to set and the fall creeps in, you may want to be especially careful on the roads as the Sheriff puts a major priority on drinking and driving.

No matter what time of year it is, driving while under the influence is unacceptable and not only endangers you but every citizen on the road. With the summer coming to an end, Sheriff George T. Lasater and the Charlevoix County Sheriff's deputies are on the lookout for impaired drivers in the county instituting an "Over the Limit/Under Arrest" crackdown.

From Aug. 15 to Sept. 1, the Sheriff's office, and law enforcement agencies across the state will be targeting all drunk drivers in this historically festive time of year. Lasater puts a priority on this crime year long but knows right now is especially high for drunk drivers. He said in a release they will go easy on nobody. Basically, you drink, you drive, and you go to jail.

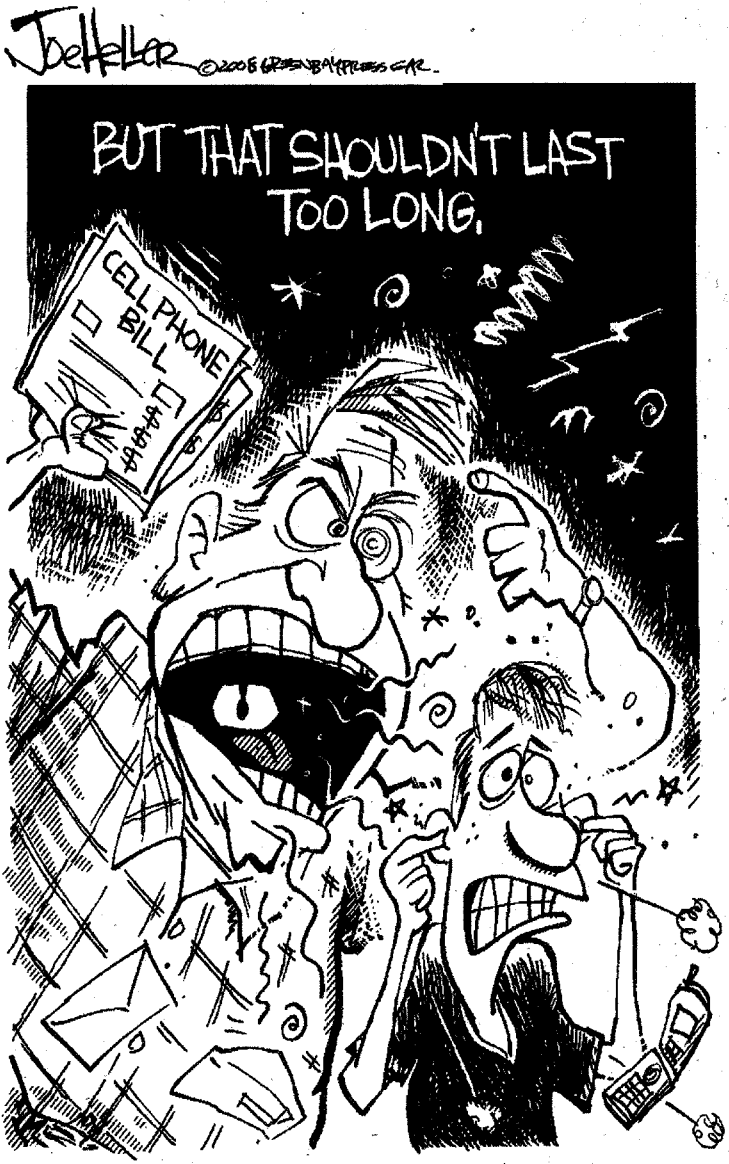
In this effort, agencies will be working additional patrols that are funded by federal grants from the Office of Highway Safety Planning. What does that mean? It means double the police officers on the roads specifically looking for impaired drivers.

Just a reminder, the blood alcohol content in Michigan is .08 and any motorist will be arrested if they are over the limit. Bravo Sheriff Lasater for taking this initiative so seriously and protecting our roads.

If a trip to the slammer doesn't encourage you to call a cab or sleep over with friends, then how about the effect it will take on the wallet? A drunk-driving conviction carries an assortment of penalties including court cost and fines, increased car insurance rates, legal fees and \$2,000 in driver responsibility costs.

It's more than money however, last year in Michigan 382 people were killed in drunken driving crashes, 382 too many. The "Over the Limit/Under Arrest" campaign will encompass Labor Day weekend, a very popular time when people are traveling and celebrating. Last Labor Day, there were four fatalities involving alcohol.

Let's enjoy the rest of the summer and make sure we keep the roads safe.

"Cigarettes saved my life," Roz said, pausing to touch a match to the tip of his Marlboro.

He inhaled, fanning out the tiny flame before continuing: "It was 30 years ago. I was sitting at my desk, finishing some paperwork, when I decided to walk to the corner for a pack of cigarettes." Roz considered the glowing ash for a moment. "I'd gone about half a block when I heard the crash. What? He told 50 people about my simpering and pathetic interview? Still, I did want to be there. I wanted to work in a place where the boss was summarily vetoed when he behaved badly. Like a bolt

A world record was obliterated by a bolt of lightning over the weekend, reaffirming the world's fastest human as Jamaican sprinter Usain Bolt, who claimed the 100-meter dash record at The Reebok Grand Prix May 31.

Barely old enough to drink or, apparently, tie his shoes, 21-year-old Bolt entered a previously untouched realm of human ability Saturday, dropping the world record to 9.69.

The 6-foot-5-inch Jamaican electrical storm crossed the line with arms spread wide, a pose taken 15 meters before the finish. He beat his chest, pointed a finger to the stands and celebrated like, well, a 21-year-old. Members of the media covering the 100-meter massacre zoomed in on Bolt's shoe as he sprung about the stadium like Big Bird on speed.

His shoelaces had come untied at some point during the dash, a very small issue that could have had catastrophic consequences.

Although, with the lapse in time between first place and second, one wonders if a barefooted Bolt would have still taken gold and nipped the world record. This got me thinking about running barefoot.

If track and field is the purest form of sport we have, and it is, then why not take things to the extreme and embrace such purity? The Greeks, though making the disturbing mistake of competing in the buff, had the right idea in many other areas. Events were simple and derived from everyday life. The field of competition was made of dirt.

I'm not saying we should throw off our \$1 million dollar Mondo running surfaces, lightweight plastic shoes with aluminium spikes and technologically-advanced suits. I just think track and field should include a new division.

Barefoot performances would be one requirement of this new league of extraordinary athletes, dedicated to simple events relative to today. Not many Americans find it necessary to grab a stick and vault over an 18-foot bar, for instance. So pole vaulting would be out.

Car jumping on the other hand, an ability every pedestrian should practice, would be a worthwhile event.

Another possible event, which I participated in on Sunday afternoon following Bolt's flashy victory in Beijing, was sand dune descending. I had never seen the Sleeping Bear Dunes before, and was blown away by the view from atop the 450-foot sand pile on the shore of Lake Michigan.

After a rapid decent down a slope scattered with rocks and innocent bystanders, I stood on the beach breathing hard and wondering how I

Red Devils back in numbers

To host quad scrimmage

EAST JORDAN — The numbers are up from the previous two years on the East Jordan varsity football team, and first-year head coach Bill Tison sees that as a good sign.

When you're taking over a team that won only two games over the previous two years, and was 0-9 in 2006, it's going to be a challenge.

But when you're the fourth head coach the team has had in the last four years, it's difficult to determine just how the kids will respond.

Tison spent eight seasons as the Red Devils junior varsity coach, and the team had only one losing season under his watch.

Since many of his junior varsity players are on the varsity this year, the expectations are considerably higher than they've been in some time.

East Jordan's first game is still a week away from Thursday, and fans may be best served to be patient and reserve judgment until the team starts playing for real.

One week of practice is in the books and the Red Devils are still sorting things out on both offense and defense.

"We did two-a-days for the first three days (which are devoted to conditioning without pads), and then we've been practicing in the evenings the last two days," Tison said.

"That's the plan this week. We have our scrimmage on Thursday, and we're getting ready for that."

East Jordan hosts Onekama, Bellaire, Onaway

and Twining, Bellaire and Onekama both made the playoffs a year ago.

Onekama runs a Veer offense, which will give the Red Devils' defense a good test early.

But the Portagers lost their leading rusher, JJ Randall who gained over 1,700 yards a year ago, to graduation. They do have their quarterback coming back, however, who should be a challenge.

Bellaire, making the playoffs last year, should give the Red Devils a good look. The Eagles compete in the Ski Valley Conference.

Tison feels the Red Devils are ready.

"We're looking pretty good I think," Tison said. "We're in a tough conference (Lake Michigan), so you do what you can."

Even after going 2-16 over the last two years, Tison has 27 players on the varsity roster compared to

only 14 a year ago.

The Red Devils have 30 on the junior varsity, so there should be a healthy crop of prospects moving up in the coming years.

After only two days practicing in pads, it's hard to tell how the offense is progressing.

Getting the timing down is the biggest hurdle to clear, Tison said.

"Most of the guys know my offense anyway from the junior varsity," Tison said. "The last two years the varsity coaches have pushed me to run their stuff."

"I brought the juniors up with me, and the seniors have been with me for a little bit. So, we're getting it together."

East Jordan will probably be starting a senior at fullback, a junior at quarterback and juniors will also be sharing duties in the backfield at the half-back spot.

Teddy Snowden is the quarterback, while Marshall Paige will run at fullback. Billy Kraemer should see extensive duty at halfback.

But everything revolves around the performance of the offensive line, and the Red Devils have experience and some size up front.

"Our tackles are big, and our guards are small and quick," Tison said. "I think we've got three seniors on the O-line, and two juniors."

Tison is introducing a new defense from what the Red Devils have run the last couple of years.

It's something Tison's defensive coordinator ran when he played ball, and the kids have reportedly been receptive in learning it.

"Defense is always ahead of the offense when you start the year anyway," Tison said. "But they're

leaps and bounds ahead of where we expected them to be. We're pretty excited about it."

East Jordan's goals coming out of the pre-season scrimmage are simple: Come out of it healthy, and take a look at players in different positions.

Tison is hoping to have only three players going both ways this season.

He'd like to have a two-rotation system, especially going against the tough competition East Jordan faces in the LMC.

Rome wasn't built in a day, but Tison hopes the Red Devils can turn things around quickly and build some excitement in the community for the football program.

"We're getting close here where we only have to worry about football," Tison said. "That's a good thing."

Adult Attention Deficit Hyperactivity (ADHD)
In the 1980's the childhood disorder ADHD began sharing the spotlight with adults. ADHD does not begin in adulthood. Research suggests that childhood ADHD persists into adulthood 50%-80% of the time. Once an adult, ADHD is commonly diagnosed when one seeks intervention for mental health or relationship difficulties that can be exaggerated by the underlying ADHD. The ADHD complexities are of a neuropsychological base, involving memory, self-regulation of cognition, and goal directed behavior. Recently, researchers in London identified the need for planning and inhibiting responses as the key treatment goals for adults because they have the tendency to move towards a project too rapidly and recklessly. The ability to delay action increases one's ability to plan and benefit from forethought. Planning and problem solving are necessary for all life achievements. Abnormal planning can be addressed and ADHD adults can learn how to inhibit responses. There are times when medication can be beneficial.

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DNR WEEKLY FISHING REPORT

Northwest Lower Peninsula
Frankfort - North winds have pushed good numbers of salmon into the harbor. Pier and boat anglers have been doing very well with J-plugs.
Lake Mitchell - Largemouth bass are hitting on crawlers, leeches or artificial frogs. Try fishing around structure or weedbeds in the morning or evening.
Hamlin Lake - Fishing has been slow but some fish were caught around the drop-offs in both lakes. Fish were caught in 6 to 20 feet of water between the State Park and Wilson Hill Park. Those jigging with minnows off the dunes did find some crappie and walleye and crawlers produced a few bass and bluegills in the shallows.
Ludington - Boat anglers are catching good numbers of salmon from the piers out to 100 feet of water when using glow plugs. Pier anglers caught salmon in the early morning when casting glow spoons. A few perch were caught off the pier when fishing close to shore.

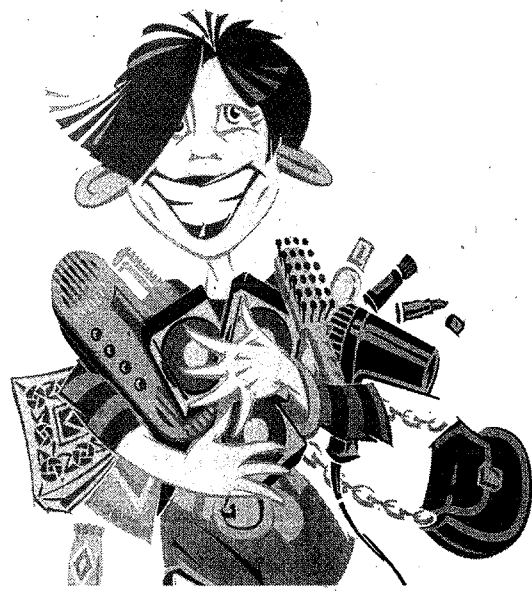

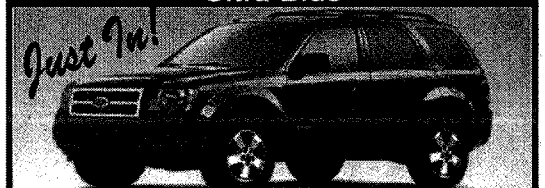
