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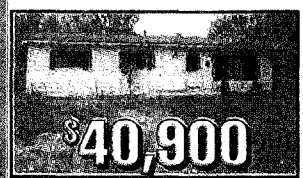

## The nightmare returns

BOYNE FALLS — Masked in the fog covered hills of Boyne Falls, a creepy castle stands with petrifying creatures waiting for unsuspecting Halloween patrons. Such is the case when Challenge Mountain begins its 7th annual Nightmare at Challenge Mountain starting on Friday, Oct. 3 through Halloween, from 7 to 10 p.m.

Upon arrival, guests will be greeted by creatures that only come out during this season. These scary hosts then lure you to the castle where the nightmare begins.

"We are extremely grateful to those who come out. Their support means so much," Sue Moody, the Executive Director of Challenge Mountain said. "We are positive they will have a great time, we are the premier haunted house in northern

Michigan. With that being said, be afraid, be very afraid. They are out there."

Moody does not direct this event, Terry "Scary" Baker takes on that responsibility with her husband Jim "Jugular" who own the nightmare and production.

"There is a very unique story concerning their involvement (the Baker's). They had a daughter named Brandy who was mentally impaired and came to Challenge Mountain for 16 years," Moody explained. "She even became a volunteer in my office for three years. She passed away very suddenly from a massive blood clot to her lungs. Brandy was a huge Halloween lover. We began a small haunted house at Challenge Mountain two years before she died. When she passed away, her parents needed something to do, so they grew the Nightmare into the great deal that it is now."

## County candidate brings experience

MELROSE TOWNSHIP — Mike Webster is the Melrose Township supervisor, a position he has held for eight years. Prior to supervisor he was township clerk for two years. Now he wants to bring his local government experience to the Charlevoix County Board of Commissioners.

"I have a new perspective and will bring my experience as a local politician, along with my education and business experience to the county commission," Webster said.

Webster is running against county commissioner Ron Reinhardt in District 3. The district encompasses the townships of Melrose, Chandler, Hudson, Boyne Valley and part of Wilson, and the Village of Boyne Falls.

He said the highest priority with citizens in the county is "Roads, roads, roads."

"The number one complaint from citizens is about the roads and we

don't have the authority over county primary roads," Webster said. "We need to increase county commission involvement with Road Commission issues."

The county commission should ensure that the state does not divert tax dollars from the Northern Michigan county road commissions, he said.

The November election ballot has a proposal that taxpayers approve one mill to fund county primary road improvements. Webster said his position on the

BOYNE CITY — To be a successful business in today's economy is difficult to say the least, but a Boyne City business is not only a success, but has been recognized as one of the 5,000 fastest growing businesses in the nation.

Classic Instruments Inc. received the ranking in September from "Inc. Magazine," a national business publication.

Classic Instruments designs and manufactures custom dashboard instruments for hot rod and classic cars and trucks.

"If you can draw it on a napkin, we can make it," company owner John McLeod said.

business climate is the company able to do so well?

McLeod's first question gave credit to his staff.

"I look for good people. Obviously, people have to have the skills, but does the person fit in with the company? It's so important that everyone work as a team,"

McLeod said. "And where I have weaknesses, I look for staff members that can fill in for those weaknesses."

Pringle, Director of the Jordan Valley District library said.

Reference materials covering business topics and a wide variety of suggested federal state and local websites will be available to assist with business formations and business planning. He draws some staff from colleges to bring in young people with fresh ideas. Employees are family at Classic Instruments. Following recent area layoffs, McLeod knew his 21 employees were wondering about their own jobs. So, he called everyone together to reassure "them that jobs were secure and to keep the company vision clear.

Other key components to the success of the company are service and quality.

"We believe it's all based on service," McLeod said. "We will never have a computer

answer the phone, for instance, it will always be real people."

The company maintains a growth level that allows it to continue its personal service.

"We're not about big, we're 'Mom and Pop.'"

A company doesn't necessarily need to be big to be a success. Word travels throughout the country and the world from satisfied customers who may be, say, a hot rod enthusiast refurbishing a car in his home garage, or a renowned celebrity.

Classic Instruments' customers include basketball star Michael Jordan, singer Billy Joel, musician Sammy

Hagger and hot rod builder, the late Boyd Coddington.

McLeod credits his wife, Josette Lory, for much of the company's success. About 12 years ago when he was a police officer in Boyne City, she encouraged him to follow his dream of working with cars.

"Without my wife there is no doubt that I would not be here," he said. "She keeps me sane. She's my foundation."

The couple has two adult children, Randy and Nikkie.

John moved to Boyne City when he was eight-years-old and he says he

wouldn't live anywhere else.

"I could locate my company anywhere, but I choose to live in Boyne City. I believe that people in our area are a better job pool. I love it here."

McLeod purchased the company in 2002. At that time, sales were \$700,000 a year. This year Classic Instruments expects sales of about \$2.6 million. Most of the sales come from within the United States, but 10-15 percent are from outside the U.S. Australia and New Zealand are the strongest markets at this time, he said.

McLeod is also manager of the Great Lakes

Motor Works. He serves on the Hot Rod Industry Alliance. He and Josette are part of the Charlevoix County Community Foundation with a focus on the Women's Resource Center.

countywide millage is that if voters pass it, he would propose to fellow commissioners that the commission find cuts in the budget equal to the one-mill increase.

"This would effectively make it a tax neutral proposition," Webster said. "The Melrose Township Board recently passed a resolution to take that approach."

A top priority for Webster is to maintain a healthy environment. "We live in a county of immense natural beauty and we are the stewards. We must make sure the appropriate protections are in place to ensure a healthy environment for future generations."

Webster sees that it is the role of county commissioners to communicate closely with state and federal legislators, and said he has good relationships with the politicians who represent Charlevoix County.

He is concerned that the state may sell land that it owns and wants the county to have a voice so that valuable resources are not lost.

Webster and his wife, Shawn, have two children. He is self-employed in the metal fabrication industry and holds a bachelor's in general studies with a concentration in economics, political science and business from the University of Michigan, and a master's degree from Lake Superior State University. Some of his public service activities include chairman of the Michigan Township Association, treasurer of the Boyne Area Kiwanis, vice president of the Boyne City Booster Foundation and a member of Habitat for Humanity.

Moody said the couple invests their own money and all of the proceeds go directly to Challenge Mountain and the facility pays for nothing for the event.

Some new highlights this year are an expanded Drain Maze, a scarier basement, Grateful Dead Graveyard, Grimm Forest, the Dragon room and much more.

"We look at this event as a 'friend raiser' as much as a fundraiser. People who have never been to Chal-

lenge Mountain have the opportunity to see what a great place it is," Moody said. "Some people have never heard of us and get the chance to learn more. The Nightmare is designed to have something for every age group so if one area of the event is not suitable for a child, there is something else for them to do."

Moody also said the entire upstairs of the castle provides a great history lesson, albeit a frightening one. There is the Salem Witch Tri-

als, Lizzie Borden, the castle area torture devices through the centuries, and the Grateful Dead Graveyard where all musicians that are no longer with us reside. Apparently, Pavarotti is coming next year.

"The prices are low so families can afford to attend together. It is a scary place, but a whole lot of fun," Moody said. "Tickets are season passes so people will have the chance to come back as often as they like. Like I said, it is scary but there is no one lurking around a

corner with a chainsaw, but you never know."

**Giving Children Medicine**

It's often a challenge to get children to take medicine, especially if it is hard to swallow or tastes bad. Talk with your pharmacist to see if he can add a flavor to it to make it more palatable. Let your child suck on a popsicle or ice cube before and after taking the medicine. To keep them from spitting out liquid, gently squeeze their cheeks making a "fish kiss" with their lips. If it is a pill that is difficult to swallow, ask your pharmacist about crushing the pill and sprinkling it in some pudding or applesauce. **Warning: Some pills are not supposed to be crushed or split, so be sure to check with your doctor or pharmacist first.**

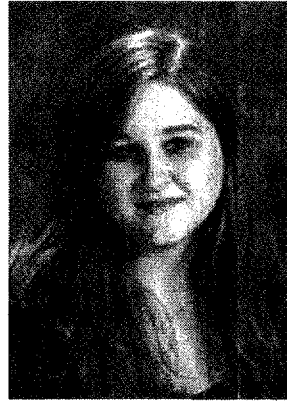

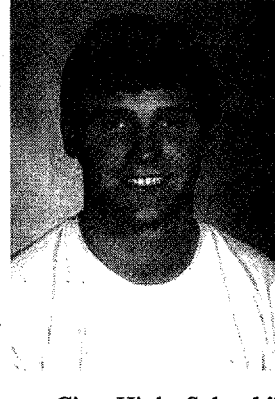

I have found that sufferers have shame and guilt related to their symptoms of PTSD feeling the need to handle their own problems. It is necessary to reach out. The PTSD information and VA programs for Veterans are well researched and reevaluated. I would encourage any Veteran to use these programs especially where Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) is in question. Other groups of PTSD sufferers would benefit from a multimodal approach including Psychiatrist, psychotherapist, primary care physician, and neurologist. ### Can going green also help the economy?

A new report prepared by the Political Economy Research Institute (PERI) at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst under the commission by the Center for American Progress found that the United States can create two million jobs over the next two years by investing in a rapid green economic recovery program. The report (Green Recovery: A Program to Create Good Jobs and Start Building a Low-Carbon Economy) also found that a \$100 billion green investment package would create nearly four times more jobs than spending the same amount of money within the oil industry and would also aid in reducing the unemployment rate to 4.4 percent over the two-year period.

Now we all know how going green is beneficial to the planet, albeit some people feel this is also overblown, but can it be at least one solution to our struggling economy? At this point, we need to do something and it can't just be a bailout plan for big corporations.

If there is a chance this program could decrease the unemployment rate then why not give it a try? This down economy is hitting everyone hard, especially the little guy, so any avenue that shows some type of plan to get American workers back on their feet has to be at least considered.

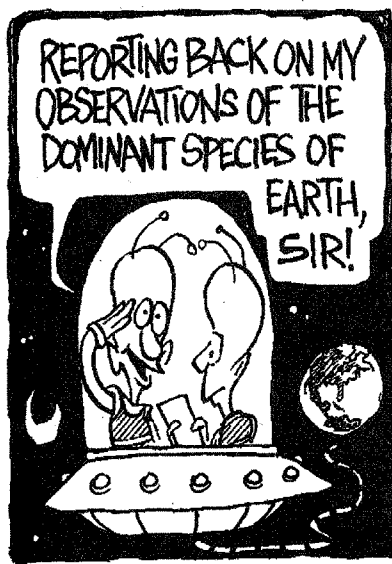
The authors of the report are Robert Pollin, Heidi Garrett-Peltier, James Heintz, and Helen Scharber all who work for PERI. The document was released in conjunction with the Green Jobs for America campaign, which made stops in Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Ohio, New York, Missouri, Tennessee, and Minnesota to promote the findings.

As with anything, we need to look at this with a skeptical eye, but then again, it can't hurt. We are hitting such an incredible downturn in the economy and with the elections nearing we have to pick a candidate we think can start to fix this mess. I don't know if this green campaign is something that will work but it does bring up good points. 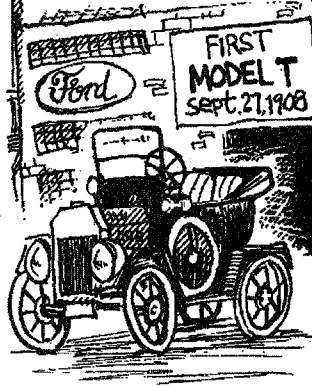
The report also boasts that the \$100 billion green economic recovery package would roughly triple the number of good jobs that pay at least \$16 an hour as spending the same amount of money within the oil industry. Also, according to their findings, the employment in construction and manufacturing would go up after falling from 8 million to 7.2 million jobs over the past two years due to the housing bubble collapse. The recovery program claims it can recover the 800,000 construction jobs with this plan.

Obviously, it can't be that easy but again, there are some good ideas or thoughts to at least ponder in the report. Basically, the green economic recovery program addresses the immediate need to boost our economy, accelerating the adoption of a comprehensive clean energy agenda through the \$100 billion investment. It also says the investment would combine tax credits and loan guarantees for private businesses along with direct public spending.

Those are quite a lot of promises but at this point I'm willing to listen to anything and hopefully those that guide the country are doing the same.

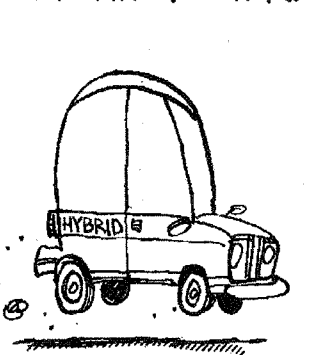

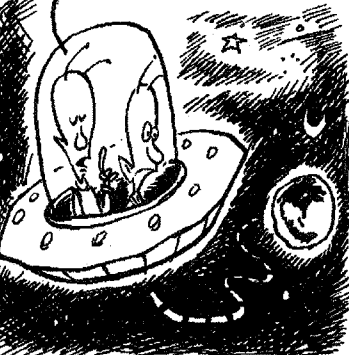

Mostly, these nightly sojourns are pleasant, if unexceptional, diversions. Although there have been some epics. With dreams, you just never know what you'll get.

There are the short, but horrific recurring dreams wherein an endless line of identical menacing lumberjacks march through my house demanding chewing gum or a slathering fox is chasing me. 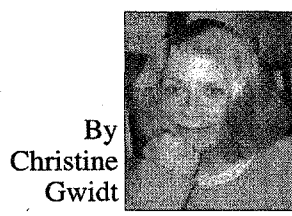

The United States Environmental Protection Agency recently released several years worth of documents pertaining to the leachate clean up project in Bay Harbor. In them there was one item that I found very alarming. At one point CMS Corporation claimed that one of the seeps had slowed, and at certain times of the year was now intermittent. That is to say, at some times of the year there was no leachate flowing into Lake Michigan. The EPA's response was that the real reason the seep was intermittent was because the Petoskey water wells were drawing so much water during certain times of the year that it reversed the flow of leachate so it was traveling back toward the wells and not into Lake Michigan. In other words the slow down in the leachate was not due to any of the efforts put forth by CMS. This article had nothing to do with the safety of the wells. But if the water wells can draw so much that they can reverse the flow of leachate back toward them then how can anyone guarantee the leachate is not getting sucked into the drinking water? And how can anyone guarantee it could never happen? The people of Petoskey should demand that their drinking water be tested for safety. It should be tested at the well heads and during peak months as opposed to February when demand is at its lowest. The safety of the people of Petoskey should be far more important than the interests of CMS Corporation.

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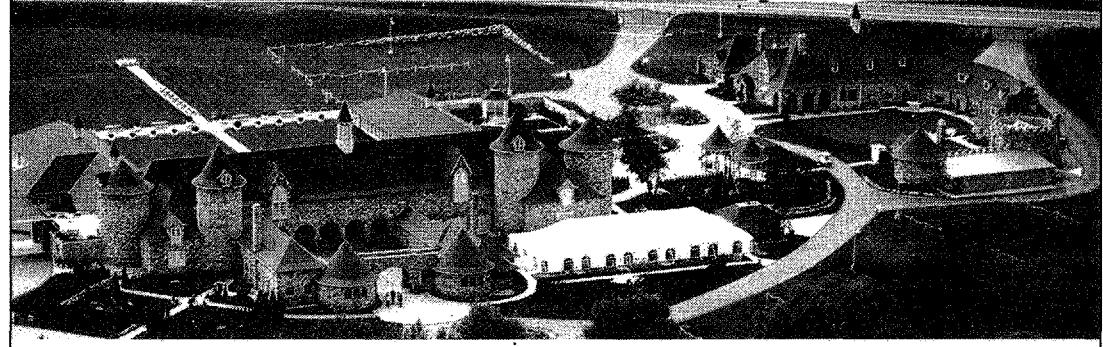
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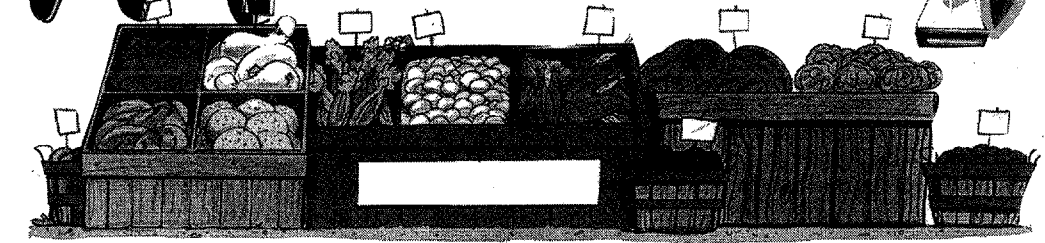

**Taking care of business**

Boyne City took a business-like approach in practice last week.

After losing 44-6 at Traverse City St. Francis on Saturday afternoon the week before, Boyne City had to get back on track in a hurry if it wanted to stay in the hunt for a playoff berth.

**Devils chilled by Elk Rapids, 32-8**  
*Bingham prevents homecoming shutout*

**EAST JORDAN** — The sun managed to break through overcast skies Saturday afternoon in Red Devil country, providing a beautiful backdrop for East Jordan's homecoming game against Elk Rapids.

Styrofoam cups pushed strategically into the fence along the visitors' sideline formed the words, "IT'S ELK HUNTING SEASON," spelling out East Jordan's intent — to pick off the undefeated Elks and send a message to the Lake Michigan Conference.

But Saturday's homecoming target turned the tables, going on a 32-point offensive that produced an automatic birth in the playoffs for Elk Rapids, now 6-0.

The first quarter smelled of an upset as the fairly explosive Elk Rapids offense was held down for the majority, lining up on fourth down with 12 yards to go. But six-foot-four-inch, 220-pound Charlie Hoch, a 48-minute headache for East Jordan, caught a pass from Elks quarterback Derek Sentieri to bring up first down and goal.

Elks running back Tyler Smith moved around the left end to score with 1:23 left in the first quarter. The extra point attempt was blocked by the Red Devils.

East Jordan's offense struggled on the ensuing drive and punted to Smith, who broke free on the return and made it all the way to East Jordan's 18 yard line before being popped by Matt Werner. An eight-yard run ended the first quarter.

The Red Devils came out hitting to start the second, holding

Elk Rapids out of the end zone for three downs inside the 10-yard line. But Smith managed to slip through for a touchdown, with Sentieri adding the extra point, 13-0.

East Jordan punted the ball 48 yards to finish their offensive effort, sending the Elks back to their own 2-yard line. The Devils' defense clobbered the next three Elk attempts, bringing up fourth down on the 10-yard line and forcing a punt.

The home team showed signs of a comeback offensively, with quarterback Teddy Snowden weaving his way through the defense on a 23-yard scramble, enabled by an open field block by Travis Braman. The Red Devils lined up 20 yards from the goal line on first down but struggled to advance, ending their drive with an interception.

With help from a facemask penalty on the Devils and a personal foul during Elk Rapids' at-

  - On Oct. 17, 1931, gangster Al Capone is sentenced to 11 years in prison for tax evasion and fined \$80,000. Although wanted for bootlegging, tax evasion was the only charge the authorities could make stick, as Capone was known for intimidating and bribing witnesses.
  - On Oct. 13, 1941, singer-songwriter Paul Simon is born on this day in Newark, N.J. Simon grew up in Forcst Hills, N.Y., where he befriended Art Garfunkel in the sixth grade. The two began singing together, and by the time they were 16 they had released a single, "Hey, Schoolgirl," recording as Tom and Jerry.

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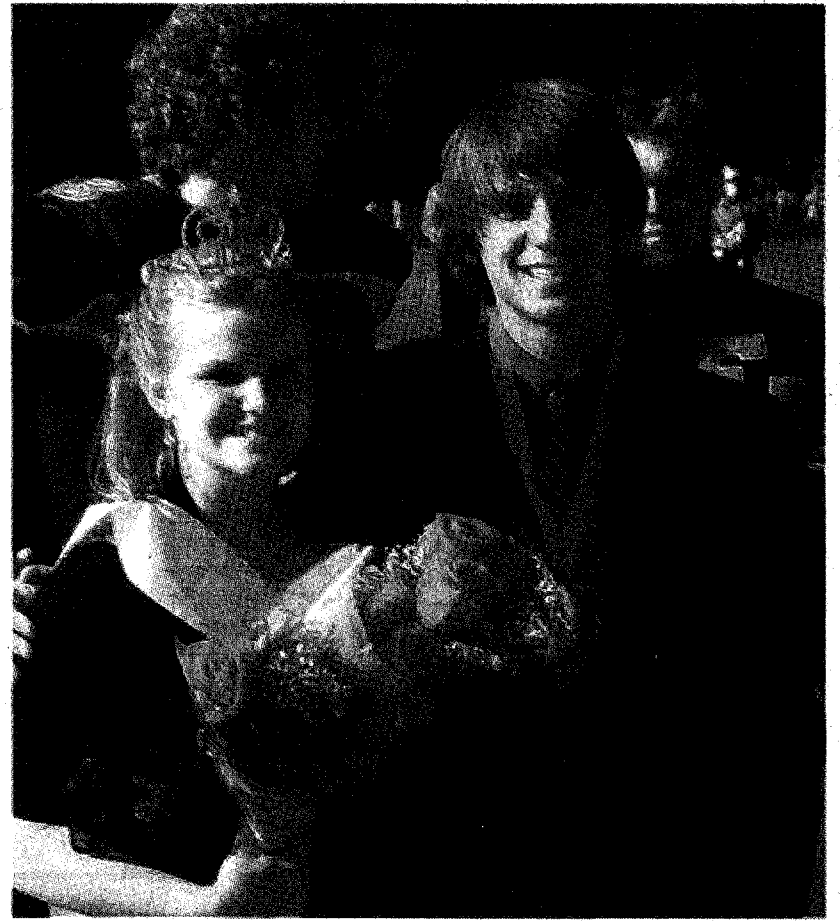

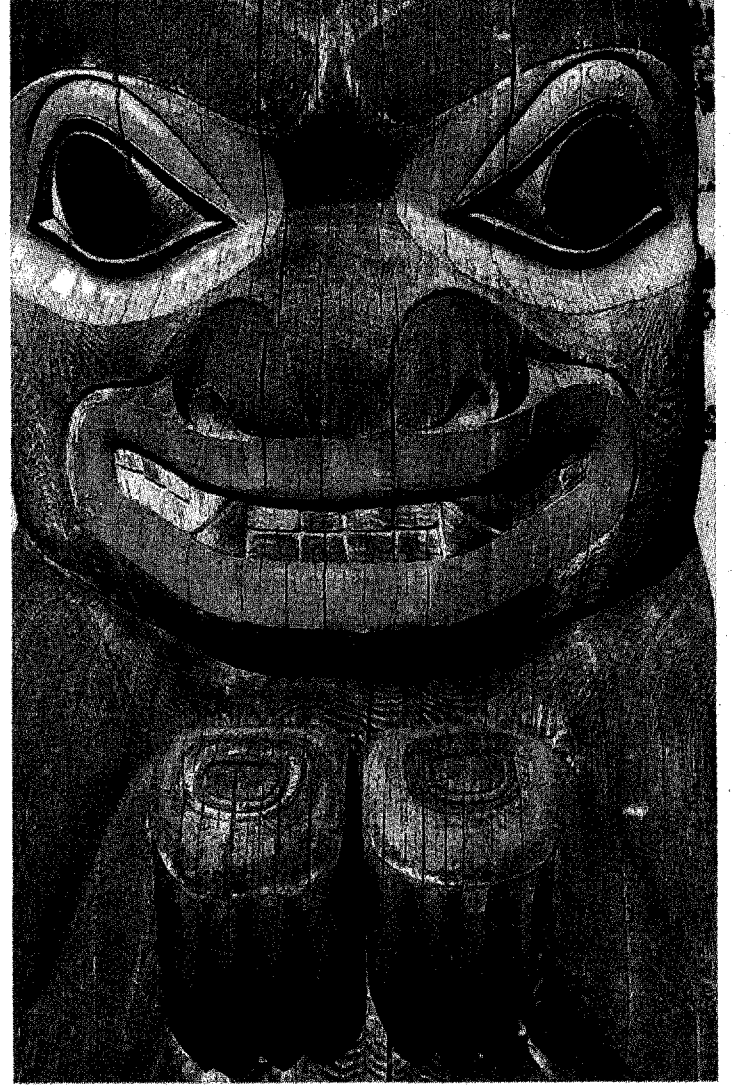

# Geocaching is a hidden treasure

The autumn colors of northern Michigan are a treasure all of their own. However, there is an activity which involves tracking down an entirely different kind of treasure, which can go hand-in-hand with taking in the delightful scenery.

This activity, Geocaching, is a global game in which players both hide and seek treasure. It is also just one more reason to get off the couch and go appreciate nature.

Once the treasure is hidden, the location is noted, using Global Positioning System (GPS) technology. The people hiding the treasure then post its coordinates online at [www.geocaching.com](http://www.geocaching.com) to send would-be treasure-hunters, with GPS devices of their own, on their way.

This simple sport can appeal to the treasure-seeker in all of us; if stories of pirates seeking buried gold or adventurers seeking the Holy

Grail have ever tickled a person's fancy, then geocaching may do just the same.

The name of the game is a combination of the word "geography" and the word "cache." A cache is a hiding place, especially one in the ground, for ammunition, food, treasures and other small trinkets.

Caches can be hidden up in trees, under rocks, inside crannies or in other such creative places. Sizes of the caches range from "micro," as small as a 35 mm film canister, to large, a five gallon bucket or larger.

So, while there may not be gold in 'dem der northern woods,' there are treasures to behold. There are local caches in spots such as the "Old" Fairgrounds and along Boardman Lake.

And, although the process sounds deceptively easy — since the treasure-hunter has the exact global location — there are obstacles which raise the excitement level of the hunt. The search is about a lot more than taking a straight path to the red X; searches may include having to find one's way around rivers or up steep paths. And, as I have learned many times, the elements may also pose a challenge. Geocaching in the snow, while on snowshoes, raises the bar of difficulty up a notch!

Caches in geocaching usually always involve a logbook — where treasure-seekers write about both their experience and their find. Sometimes small trinkets come with the logbook; and sometimes the prize is merely information of the useful, interesting or comical variety. Tangible prizes can be stickers or figurines or coins.

If trinkets are left, and the finder wants to

take them home, it is good form to leave something of equal or greater value behind in its stead. The only thing to keep in mind is that the activity is enjoyed by people of all ages; so anything left behind should be appropriate for both young and old.

If geocaching sounds like something that may interest you and you want to get into it in northern Michigan, the Web site, [www.Geocaching.com](http://www.Geocaching.com), offers more information and has an easy-to-find feature which allows hiders to post the location of their cache and seekers the opportunity to decide which cache to go after. A basic understanding of how to use a GPS device is required; one must understand how to enter waypoints into the system.

Another requirement is that Geocaching participants practice a "Cache In, Trash Out" policy, where they attempt to leave the environment in the same state in which they found it. This means taking all trash out whenever a seeker leaves and taking care not to disturb local flora and fauna.

GPS devices are available at electronics stores, as well as at some camping and boat supply outlets.

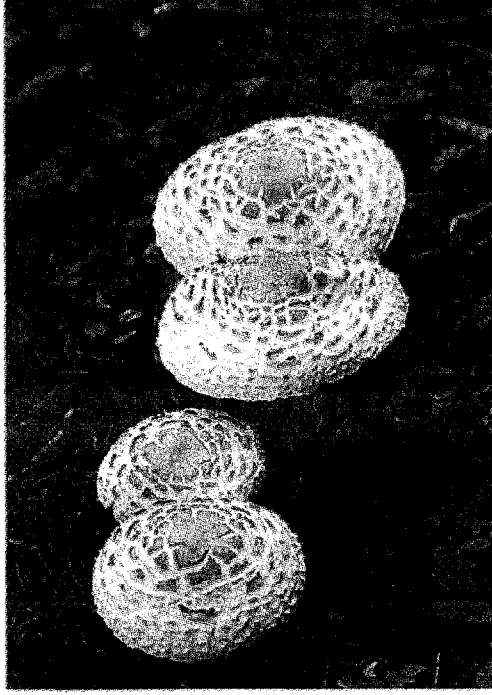
Caches are not to be placed on properties that have warned against trespassing or on properties that are managed by an agency that has prohibited the activity; this would make U.S. National Parks and wildlife refuges off-limits. Burying caches is also not acceptable.

From my experience with the sport, the best places are those where the cache lies in plain view, but is still deceptively hard to find. The activity can be likened to an Easter egg hunt — you want to find the egg eventually, but you don't want it to be too easy to locate, either.

# Red wines go great with heartier fall foods

**ELK RAPIDS** — Red wines made locally are the perfect complement for the heavier foods many of us gravitate toward as the weather cools in the fall, according to Laura Kohl, manager of Elk Rapids Wine Shop.

While red meat may have some thinking French wine, and tomato-based casseroles may have others wanting Italian wines, Kohl said wines produced in Michigan, particularly on the Old Mission and Leelanau peninsulas, can offer great taste, too.

For most dishes, a basic house red wine

from any of the nearby vineyards can be a terrific addition to dinner, she said. The house wine is made from a variety of different grapes, and while the label may not list all the grapes in the mix, the result is still a wine that works with most dishes and boasts a full-bodied flavor.

"Most of the vineyards have a blend, where they use just a mix of grapes," Kohl said. "They don't always identify what they are, but they're real friendly wines."

House wines generally are less expensive than the 100 percent varietals, which are made from only one type of grape, she said.

Pinot noir, gamay noir, merlot and cabernet franc all are varietals and also go well with food, depending on the dish and individual tastes, Kohl said.

The local red wines available now are from grapes harvested last year, which Chateau Chantal winemaker Mark Johnson said was one of the best years for the red wine varieties. The warm summer of 2007 produced flavorful grapes, he said. Chateau Chantal is located on the Old Mission Peninsula.

"It was just a fantastic year for pinot noir, cabernet franc and merlot," Johnson said.

This year, grape harvest is a little later than last year because the summer started slower, he added.

The northern Michigan climate, with its cool autumns, helps all the locally-grown grapes create flavorful wines, according to Johnson.

"I do not think there is a better place in the country for growing wines that pair well with food," Johnson said.

Fruit flavors are developed in the last three weeks before harvest and the fla-

vors are volatile, Johnson said, so the cooler climate helps the grape develop fuller flavors. In warmer climates, the flavor can be baked out of a fruit during those crucial last three weeks, he said. He likened the grapes to locally-grown strawberries.

"Everybody knows what Michigan strawberries in June taste like compared to strawberries from California or Florida or Mexico in February or March," he said.

The strawberries grown in the warmer climates may look good, he said, but they aren't very flavorful.

Michigan produces a selection of white wines, too, to serve with poultry dishes, particularly the Thanksgiving turkey.

"Riesling is one of the best food wines there is and one of the nice things is Michigan does them so well," Kohl said.

Michigan's climate is perfect for growing Riesling grapes, and the Riesling wines made here offer different degrees of

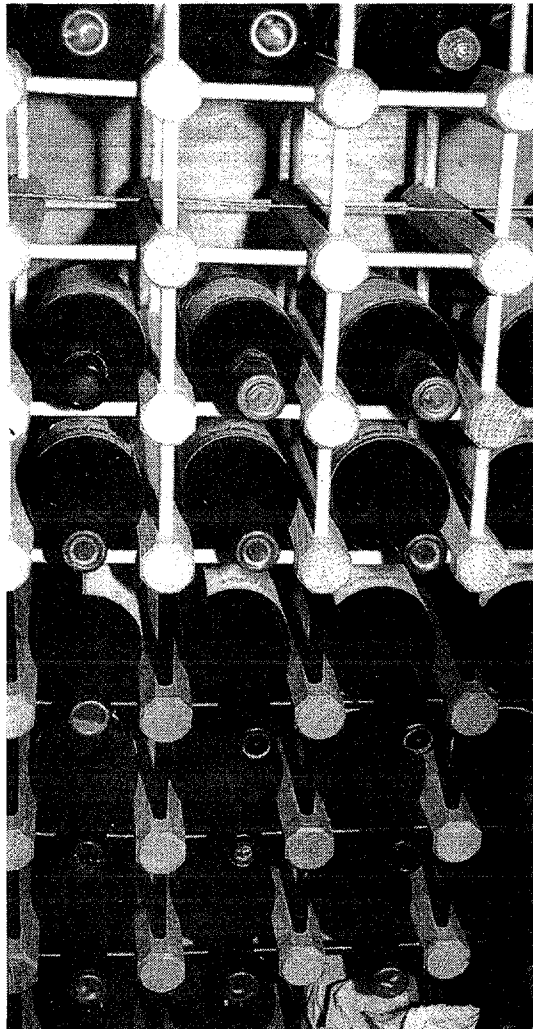
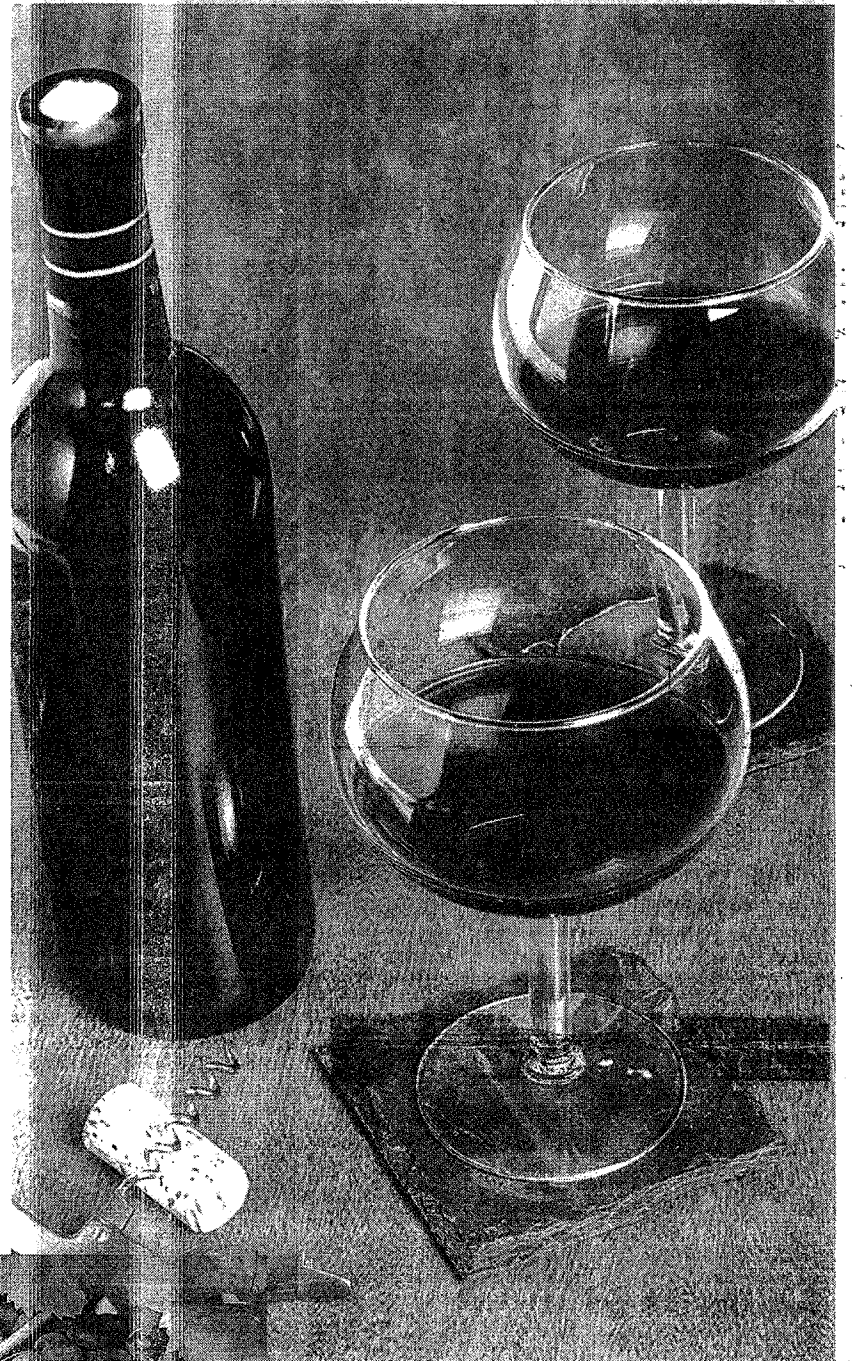
sweetness for almost any taste, she said.

Generally at Thanksgiving, the French wine Beaujolais nouveau is ready, but Kohl recommends trying a locally-produced gamay noir instead.

Customers who are confused about which wine works best with which foods can always visit a tasting room or ask the staff at a specialty wine shop.

Kohl said she and fellow wine shop employee Ron Schmidt can help customers find the right wine for any occasion within the customers' price range.

# Photographer sees more than color in fall

**BOYNE CITY** — For the last 40 years photographer Vic Ruggles has been taking pictures and in that time has developed a style and method for taking breathtaking shots during this colorful season.

"I don't look for anything in particular. If I'm looking for a fall color shot I'll go for a long slow drive and try to be aware of everything out there. I don't wait for the perfect sunny day, and I don't wait for the trees to all be in full color," Ruggles said. "Clouds add interest to a fall color shot just as they do a sunset. A sunset without an interesting cloud formation or reflection on water is really pretty boring. There has to be more to a sunset photo than a round orange dot in the sky. And most of the time there ought to be more to a fall color shot than a tree at

peak color."

Ruggles said fall has many different looks and the trees peak at different times. When he starts to get ready for the fall season, Ruggles begins when the trees still have green leaves. He enjoys the contrasts between the greens, reds and other various colors.

Ruggles was an art major at Eastern Michigan University in the 70s, which included a couple of semesters of photography. When he looks back on his classes, one thing stood out in particular.

"The one thing I remember most is the fact that my instructor shot his final portfolio with a Brownie Instamatic camera. A lot of people starting out in photography get hung up on the technical aspect," Ruggles explained. "They will ask about this camera or that, hoping for a strong recommendation from me one way or the other. If my col-

lege professor and his Brownie taught me one thing it's that if you can't see a subject and compose an interesting photo, it doesn't matter what kind of camera you have in your hands or how much it costs."

Ruggles said if he could offer one suggestion for purchasing a camera it would be to have a Polaroid filter option to make colors "pop." He said this option allows subtle color which is better in a picture than color that is enhanced or exaggerated and warned to not use it all the time.

Ruggles has a process for fall photography and is always searching for the perfect shot. He likened the process to trout fishing and said to just enjoy where you

are and not to worry if you don't catch any fish.

"Sometimes I drive or take a golf cart. If I have the luxury of time, I'll walk. It's nice to walk and get down to ground level. Look up or across the ground through the dying ferns. Zoom in close on leaves in a puddle or on the ground," Ruggles added. "Look for the perfect photograph. I have never found it and never will. I'm never totally satisfied or completely disappointed. I know there is always someone who can take the same shot only better than mine. But I'll never stop looking. The fun is in hunting for the great photo and the

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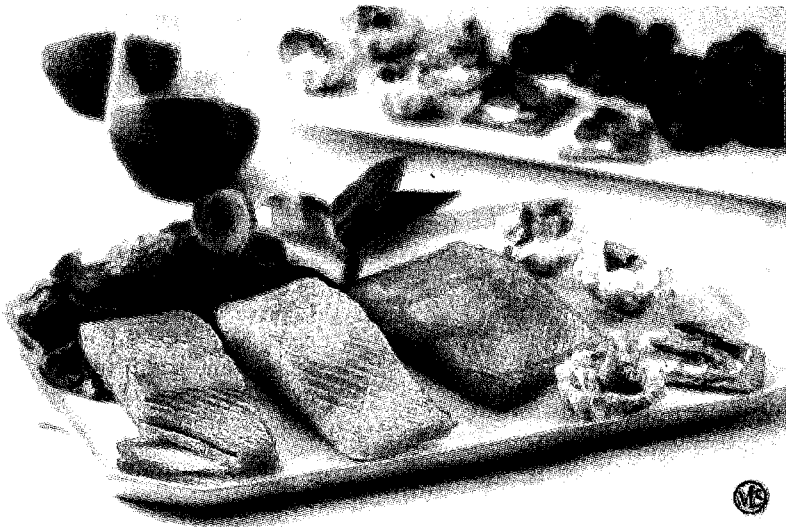





## STUFFED SQUASH

2 dumpling or acorn squash (most any kind will work)  
 1 box stovetop stuffing mix (flavor of your choice)  
 8 oz fresh mushrooms  
 small onion  
 diced celery  
 1/2 cup bulk mild sausage  
 shredded mozzarella cheese

Stab holes in squash so they don't explode. Microwave on high until squash become slightly soft. Cut in half, scoop out seeds, place in baking dish. Brown sausage. Prepare stuffing mix per directions on box. Saute sliced mushrooms, diced onion and diced celery. Add sausage, mushrooms, celery and onion to the stuffing mix. Place mixture into cavity of squash. Bake at 350 degrees approx. 30-45 minutes, until squash is tender. Top with mozzarella cheese, place in oven just to melt cheese (5 minutes). Makes 4 servings.

## SMOKED SALMON & ARTICHOKE DIP

Serves 8  
 6 ounces smoked salmon  
 2 6 1/2-ounce jars marinated artichoke hearts  
 1 4-ounce can mild green chilies  
 6 tablespoons mayonnaise  
 3/4 cup grated cheddar cheese  
 Salt & pepper to taste

Drain smoked salmon, remove skin and break into small half-inch chunks. Drain and chop artichokes and chilies, and mix with smoked salmon. Fold in mayonnaise, cheese (hold back one tablespoon of cheddar cheese and sprinkle over the top) and salt and pepper. Cover and bake in a pre-heated oven at 350 F for approximately 15 to 20 minutes. Serve hot and bubbly with crackers, tortilla chips, and slices of crusty artisan bread or crostini.

places that hunt takes you."

Obviously fall provides so much for photographers, but for Ruggles, he has no favorite time of year. Each season provides new opportunities and he has a process for each. When asked what his favorite season was, Ruggles couldn't decide.

"That would mean putting away my cameras for nine months of the year. I like challenging myself to take a decent picture anytime. That's what a photographer does," Ruggles said. "Can I take photos of colored leaves year round? Of course not. Can I shoot a Fourth of July parade in February? No. The availability of subjects is constantly changing and infinitely interesting. If the only subject

that inspires you to take photographs is colored leaves, you need a different hobby."

Ruggles said fall has so much to offer and it's not just about the colored leaves. He likes to take shots of horses, frosty mornings, jack-o-lanterns, first snow and homecoming parades to name a few.

When taking pictures, Ruggles doesn't go out trying to communicate anything specific. He said it's about pleasing himself and taking a photograph that isn't a waste of time. He tries to capture an emotion, news event or a piece of history.

"Each photo is different. A photo may tell a story or not. It is what it is. People are free to interpret them any way they want. If I have a specific message it might be part of an included caption so that is isn't


misinterpreted," Ruggles explained.

For people who aspire to become photographers, Ruggles offered another piece of advice to take as many shots as possible. He said no photographer goes out and takes just one photo for the perfect picture. He suggested going digital although there are artistic arguments for standard film.


When asked what his biggest inspiration is, Ruggles had one simple answer.

"I'm inspired by having a camera in my hands and the time to use it," Ruggles said. "If you are interested in photography that's all the inspiration you need."
