
New center opens

BOYNE FALLS - Masked in the fog covered hills of Boyne Falls, a creepy castle stands with petrifying creatures waiting for unsuspecting Halloween patrons. Such is the case when Challenge Mountain begins its 7th annual Nightmare at Challenge Mountain starting on Friday, Oct. 3 through Halloween, from 7 to 10 p.m.

Upon arrival, guests will be greeted by creatures that only come out during this season. These scary hosts then lure you to the castle where the

When she passed away, her parents needed something to do, so they grew the Nightmare into the great deal that it is now."

County candidate brings experience

MELROSE TOWN-SHIP — Mike Webster is the Melrose Township supervisor, a position he has held for eight years. Prior to supervisor he was township clerk for two years. Now he wants to bring his local government experience to the Charlevoix County Board of Commissioners.

"I have a new perspective and will bring my experience as a local politician, along with my education and business experience to the county commission," Webster said.

Webster is running against county commissioner Ron Reinhardt in District 3. The district encompasses the townships of Melrose, Chandler, Hudson, Boyne Valley and part of Wilson, and the Village of Boyne Falls.

He said the highest priority with citizens in the county is: "Roads, roads, roads.

"The number one complaint from citizens is about the roads and we

don't have the authority primary county over roads," Webster said. "We need to increase county commission involvement with Road Commission issues.'

The county commission should ensure that the state does not divert tax dollars from the Northern Michigan county road commissions, he said.

The November election ballot has a proposal that taxpayers approve one mill to fund county primary road improvements. Webster said his position on the

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

Can going green also help the economy?

A new report prepared by the Political Economy Research Institute (PERI) at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst under the commission by the Center for American Progress found that the United States can create two million jobs over the next two years by investing in a rapid green economic recovery program. The report (Green Recovery: A Program to Create Good Jobs and Start Building a Low-Carbon Economy) also found that a \$100 billion green investment package would create nearly four times more jobs than spending the same amount of money within the oil industry and would also aid in reducing the unemployment rate to 4.4 percent over the two-year

Now we all know how going green is beneficial to the planet, albeit some people feel this is also overblown, but can it be at least one solution to our struggling economy? At this point, we need to do something and it can't just be a bailout plan for big corporations.

If there is a chance this program could decrease the unemployment rate then why not give it a try? This down economy is hitting everyone hard, especially the little guy, so any avenue that shows some type of plan to get American workers back on their feet has to be at

The authors of the report are Robert Pollin, Heidi Garrett-Peltier, James Heintz, and Helen Scharber all who work for PERI. The document was released in conjunction with the Green Jobs for America campaign, which made stops in Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Ohio, New

York, Missouri, Tennessee, and Minnesota to promote the findings. As with anything, we need to look at this with a skeptical eye, but then again, it can't hurt. We are hitting such an incredible downturn in the economy and with the elections nearing we have to pick a candidate we think can start to fix this mess. I don't know if this green campaign is something that will work but it does bring up good points. To access the information, go to www.americanprogress.org/issues/2008/

The report also boasts that the \$100 billion green economic recovery package would roughly triple the number of good jobs that pay at least \$16 an hour as spending the same amount of money within the oil industry. Also, according to their findings, the employment in construction and manufacturing would go up after falling from 8 million to 7.2 million jobs over the past two years due to the housing bubble collapse. The recovery program claims it can recover the 800,000 construction

Obviously, it can't be that easy but again, there are some good ideas or thoughts to at least ponder in the report. Basically, the green economic recovery program addresses the immediate need to boost our economy, accelerating the adoption of a comprehensive clean energy agenda through the \$100 billion investment. It also says the investment would combine tax credits and loan guarantees for private businesses along with direct public spending.

Those are quite a lot of promises but at this point I'm willing to listen to anything and hopefully those that guide the country are doing the same.

Clean up project

The United States Environmental Protection Agency recently released several years worth of documents pertaining to the leachate clean up project in Bay Harbor. In them there was one item that I found very alarming. At one point CMS Corporation claimed that one of the seeps had slowed, and at certain times of the year was now intermittent. That is to say, at some times of the year there was no leachate flowing into Lake Michigan. The EPA's response was that the real reason the seep was intermittent was because the Petoskey water wells were drawing so much water during certain times of the year that it reversed the flow of leachate so it was traveling back toward the wells and not into Lake Michigan. In other words the slow down in the leachate was not due to any of the efforts put forth by CMS. This article had nothing to do with the safety of the wells. But if the water wells can draw so much that they can reverse the flow of leachate back toward them then how can anyone guarantee the leachate is not getting sucked into the drinking water? And how can anyone guarantee it could never happen? The people of Petoskey should demand that their drinking water be tested for safety. It should be tested at the well heads and during peak months as apposed to February when demand is at its lowest. The safety of the people of Petoskey should be far more important than the interests of CMS Corporation.


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
I am writing this letter to the person(s) who have been trespassing on my property and stealing my yard signs; most recently my Obama for President, which was next to my American flag.



Taking care of business



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
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Geocaching is a hidden treasure



The autumn colors of northern Michigan are a treasure all of their own. However, there is an activity which involves tracking down an entirely different kind of treasure, which can go hand-in-hand with taking in the delightful sce-

This activity, Geocaching, is a global game in which players both hide and seek treasure. It is also just one more reason to get off the couch and go appreciate nature.

Once the treasure is hidden, the location is noted, using Global Positioning System (GPS) technology. The people hiding the treasure then post its coordinates online at www.geocaching.com to send would-be treasurehunters, with GPS devices of their own, on their way.

This simple sport can appeal to the treasureseeker in all of us; if stories of pirates seeking buried gold or adventurers seeking the Holy



Grail have ever tickled a person's fancy, then geocaching may do just the same.

The name of the game is a combination of the word "geography" and the word "cache." A cache is a hiding place, especially one in the ground, for ammunition, food, treasures and

other small trinkets. Caches can be hidden up in trees, under rocks, inside crannies or in other INFORMATION such creative places. Sizes of the caches range from "micro," as small as a 35 mm film canister, to large, a five gallon bucket or larger.

So, while there may not be gold in 'dem der northern woods,' there are treasures to behold. There are local caches in spots such as the

"Old" Fairgrounds and along Boardman Lake. And, although the process sounds deceptively easy — since the treasure-hunter has the exact global location — there are obstacles which raise the excitement level of the hunt. The search is about a lot more than taking a straight path to the red X; searches may include having to find one's way around rivers or up steep paths. And, as I have learned many times, the elements may also pose a challenge. Geocaching in the snow, while on snowshoes, raises the bar of difficulty up a notch!

Caches in geocaching usually always involve a logbook — where treasure-seekers write about both their experience and their find. Sometimes small trinkets come with the logbook; and sometimes the prize is merely information of the useful, interesting or comical variety. Tangible prizes can be stickers or figurines or coins.

If trinkets are left, and the finder wants to

take them home, it is good form to leave something of equal or greater value behind in its stead. The only thing to keep in mind is that the activity is enjoyed by people of all ages; so anything left behind should be appropriate for both young and old.

If geocaching sounds like something that may interest you


and you want to get into it in northern Michigan, the Web site, www.Geocaching.com, offers more information and has an easy-tofind feature which allows hiders to post the location of their cache and seekers the opportunity to decide which cache to go after. A basic understanding of how to use a GPS device is required; one must understand how to enter waypoints into the system.

Another requirement is that Geocaching participants practice a "Cashe In, Trash Out" policy, where they attempt to leave the environment in the same state in which they found it. This means taking all trash out whenever a seeker leaves and taking care not to disturb local flora and fauna.


GPS devices are available at electronics stores, as well as at some camping and boat supply outlets.

Caches are not to be placed on properties that have warned against trespassing or on properties that are managed by an agency that has prohibited the activity; this would make U.S. National Parks and wildlife refuges off-limits. Burying caches is also not acceptable.

From my experience with the sport, the best places are those where the cache lies in plain view, but is still deceptively hard to find. The activity can be likened to an Easter egg hunt — you want to find the egg eventually, but you don't want it to be too easy to locate, either.

Red wines go great with heartier fall foods

ELK RAPIDS — Red wines made locally are the perfect complement for the heavier foods many of us gravitate toward as the weather cools in the fall, according to Laura Kohl, manager of Elk Rapids Wine Shop.

While red meat may have some thinking French wine, and tomato-based casseroles may have others wanting Italian wines, Kohl said wines produced in Michigan, particularly on the Old Mission and Leelanau peninsulas, can offer great taste,

basic house red wine

from any of the nearby vineyards can be a terrific addition to dinner, she said. The house wine is made from a variety of different grapes, and while the label may not list all the grapes in the mix, the result is still a wine that works with most dishes and boasts a full-bodied flavor.

"Most of the vineyards have a blend, where they use just a mix of grapes," Kohl said. "They don't always identify what they are, but they're real friendly wines."

House wines generally are less expensive than the 100 percent varietals, which Tare made from only For most dishes, a one type of grape; she

Pinot noir, gamay noir, merlot and cabernet franc all are varietals and also go well with food, depending on the dish and individual tastes, Kohl said.

The local red wines

available now are from grapes harvested last year, which Chateau Chantal winemaker Mark Johnson said was one of the best years for the red wine varieties. The warm summer of 2007 produced flavorful grapes, he said. Chateau Chantal is located on the Old Mission Peninsula.

"It was just a fantastic year for pinot noir, cabernet franc and merlot," Johnson

This year, grape harvest is a little later than last year because the summer started slower, he added.

The northern Michigan climate, with its cool autumns, helps all the locally-grown grapes create flavorful wines, according to Johnson.

"I do not think there is a better place in the country for growing wines that pair well with food," Johnson said.





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

Photographer sees more than color in fall

BOYNE CITY -For the last 40 years photographer Ruggles has been taking pictures and in that time has developed a style and method for taking breathtaking shots during this colorful season.

"I don't look for anything in particular. If I'm looking for a fall color shot I'll go for a long slow drive and try to be aware of everything out there. I don't wait for the perfect sunny day, and I don't wait for the trees to all be in full color," Ruggles said. "Clouds add interest to a fall color shot just as they do a sunset. A sunset without an interesting cloud formation or reflection on water is really pretty boring. There has to be more to a sunset photo than a round orange dot in the sky. And most of the time there ought to be more to a fall color shot than a tree at

Ruggles said fall has many different looks and the trees peak at different times. When he starts to get ready for the fall season, Ruggles begins when the trees have green leaves. He enjoys the contrasts between the greens, reds and other

various colors. Ruggles was an art at Eastern Michigan University in the 70s, which included a couple of semesters of photography. When he looks back on his classes, one thing stood out in particular.

"The one thing I remember most is the fact that my instructor shot his final portfolio with a Brownie Instamatic camera. A lot of people starting out in photography get hung up on the technical aspect," explained. Ruggles "They will ask about this camera or that, hoping for a strong recommendation from me one way or

the other. If my col-

lege professor and his Brownie taught me one thing it's that if you can't see a subject and compose an interesting photo, it doesn't matter what kind of camera you have in your hands or how much it costs."

Ruggles said if he could offer one suggestion for purchasing a camera it would be to have a Polaroid filter option to make colors "pop." He said this option allows subtile color which is better in a picture than color that is enhanced or exaggerated and warned to not use it all the time.

Ruggles has a process for fall photography and is always searching for the perfect shot. He likened the process to trout fishing and said to just enjoy where you

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





Obviously fall provides so much for photographers, but for Ruggles, he has no favorite time of year. Each season pro-

vides new opportunities and

he has a process for each. When asked what his favorite season was, Ruggles couldn't

decide.

"That would mean putting away my cameras for nine months of the year. I like challenging myself to take a decent picture anytime. That's what a photographer does," Ruggles said. "Can I take photos of colored leaves year round? Of course not. Can I shoot a Fourth of July parade in February? No. The availability of subjects is constantly changing and infinitely interesting. If the only subject

that inspires you to take photographs is colored leaves, you need a different hobby."

Ruggles said fall has so much to offer and it's not just about the colored leaves. He likes to take shots of horses, frosty mornings, jack-o-lanterns, first snow and homecoming parades to name a few.

When taking pictures, Ruggles doesn't go out trying to communicate anything specific. He said it's about pleasing himself and taking a photograph that isn't a waste of time. He tries to capture an emotion, news event or a piece

of history.

"Each photo is different. A photo may tell a story or not. It is what it is. People are free to interpret them any way they want. If I have a specific message it might be part of an included caption so that is isn't

misinterpreted," Ruggles explained.

For people who aspire to become photographers, Ruggles offered another piece of advice to take as many shots as possible. He said no photographer goes out and takes just one photo for the perfect picture. He suggested going digital although there are artistic arguments for standard film.

When asked what his biggest inspiration is, Ruggles had one simple answer.

"I'm inspired by having a camera in my hands and the time to use it," Ruggles said. "If you are interested in photography that's all the inspiration you need."
