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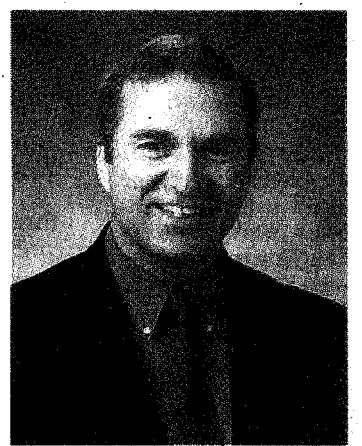

Area election overview

This overview of the Nov. 4 election examines the votes in Boyne City, East Jordan, Boyne Valley Township, Evangeline Township, Melrose Township, South Arm Township and District 3 of Wilson Township.

Boyne City, East Jordan and township area voters decided to retain incumbents in state and county races when they voted in the General Election.

The Charlevoix County Road Commission ballot proposal for 1 mill to improve county roads passed countywide by 96 votes. Boyne City voters helped pass the 1 mill, as did Evangeline and Melrose townships. But, East Jordan, Boyne Valley Township, South Arm Township and Wilson Township said no to the proposal.

The state of Michigan's proposal-1 to allow medical marijuana use was approved by voters in the cities and townships included in this overview.

Group fights to stop well

BELLAIRE — With the appeals process to government agencies behind them, Antrim County, Star Township, Friends of the Jordan River, and others now seek remedy from the courts.

The group has opposed trucking and storing of leachate from Bay Harbor Resort to a CMS Energy company injection well in Star Township, but the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and the federal Environmental Protection Agency issued permits to CMS for the well and to Beeland Group to drill.

Attorneys for Antrim County, Star Township and others ("the group") filed a civil case with the Antrim County Circuit Court on Oct. 30, naming Beeland Group as a defendant. Documents filed include a motion for a preliminary injunction to stop any drilling or other action until the case is heard. A hearing date on that motion has not yet been set.

Boyne Mountain celebrates 60 years

BOYNE FALLS — This winter season Boyne Mountain will celebrate 60 years of winter fun highlighted by many new offerings including new guns, lift and a SnowSports Academy. All the upgrades for on-hill improvements have totaled nearly \$2 million and Boyne Highlands has also expanded, with a mountaintop dinner, new family adventures with a lighted cross country trail, and bonfire and cocoa on the snowshoe trail. Boyne Highlands is located in Harbor Springs.

"This winter Boyne Mountain celebrates its 60th anniversary not only in business but 60 years of innovation in the skiing industry. Boyne Mountain installed the first chairlift in the Midwest," Ed Grice, Boyne Mountain General Manager said. "Everett Kircher purchased the lift from Sun Valley for \$2,000, it was their Dollar Mountain lift, a single seat contraption that was designed and built in 1936 by the Union Pacific Railroad. That Dollar Mountain lift was actually the first chairlift in the world designed and built to transport skiers up hill."

Kircher founded Boyne Mountain in 1947 and purchased the land from William Pierson for a price of \$1. Boyne Mountain is home to the world's first four-person chair, installed in 1964. Kircher passed away in 2002 and his son Stephen, is president of Boyne Resorts eastern operations

and his brother John, is president of Boyne Resorts' western operations.

Grice, who grew up in Boyne City since age 11, has been the General Manager since August of 2004 and said some of the new things coming this winter include the new Meadows chairlift, a four-place Doppelmayr conveyor loaded lift that is the only one of

its kind in the Midwest. Grice said the lift will travel nearly 500 feet per minute and is the second fastest on the Mountain behind the high-speed Mountain Express.

"We have added 10 new Boyne Low-E snow guns and converted another 50 guns to Boyne Low-E guns. The new snow guns use 40 percent less energy than their predecessor. Our crew also in-

stalled new snowmaking water lines on the Hemlock slope that will allow us to make snow faster and more efficiently," Grice explained. "Snowmaking lines were also added to the Meadows slope to complement the new lift opening this winter."

Grice said the construction crews are working on finishing the remodel of the new children's center, Helga's House. The building is the former One Water Street restaurant that was saved from demolition and moved to Boyne Mountain this summer. Helga's House will be used for all the Junior SnowSports Academy activities as well as Playcare, the resort's daycare facility. Helga's House is named after the former SnowSports Children's Director, Helga Altenberg, who passed away three years ago.

Boyne Mountain will be celebrating throughout the season with special events, contests, food and beverage deals, fireworks, and a commemorative logo. January 9 through the 11 will be the celebratory weekend to highlight the 60-year anniversary.

In addition, Boyne Highland Resorts offers a two-mile all-level cross country loop opening this winter for evening skiing. The lighted loop is open for skiers to hit the trail each Friday and Saturday and daily during the holidays.

"Snowmaking is another area of past and current highlights. Snow is where it all starts; without it, we are dead in the water."

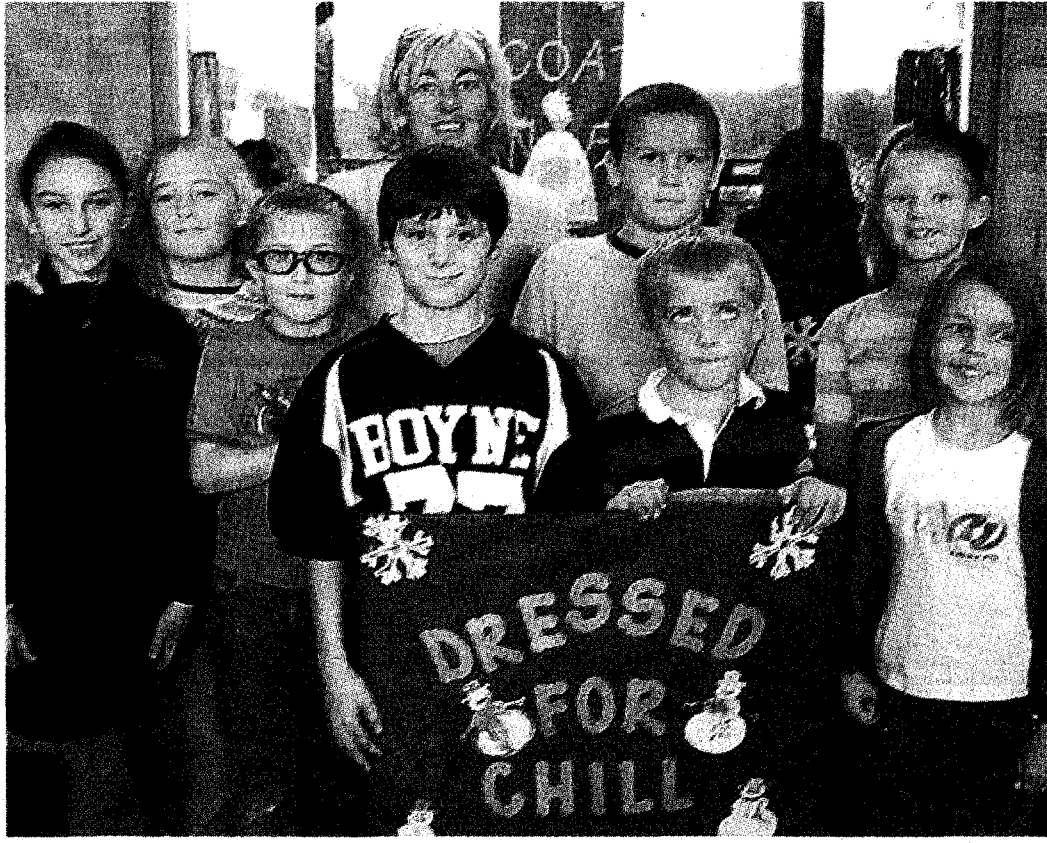
"This will be a difficult year for everyone, but especially for those who were already struggling to meet basic needs," Sue Hoffman, Elementary School Social Worker said.

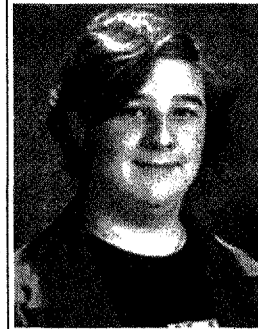

gation, Laurie returned home and was employed by the United States Postal Service in Boyne City working as a postal letter carrier

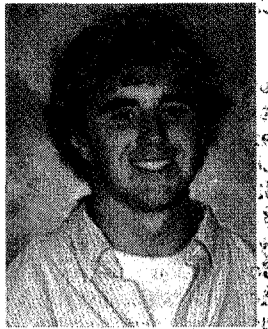

Paranoid Personality Patterns
Paranoid reactions result when patterns of personal failure are attributed to external people or events. Over time, personal failure heightens the attention towards the threatening aspects of external stimuli quite often associated with others, especially when threatened by loss of control and self-esteem. People and events tend to be perceived as the cause of their intrapsychic and interpersonal pain. There is a selective focus on the threatening stimuli in the form of the way others perceive, think, and act toward the person. Paranoid patterns are understood through observation. There is a suspiciousness, rigidity, petty vengefulness, guarded, self-righteous presentation. These individuals hold grudges and can overtly act with aggression. Theoretically, paranoid reactions are amenable to treatment but difficult to treat. These sufferers rarely seek treatment unless ordered by a physician well after a history of recurring gastrointestinal problems are not fully responding to medical treatment.

Oral Health Maintenance Important for Patients With Osteoporosis

It has long been known that oral health and other ailments may go hand-in-hand. That is why routine oral health screenings are so important. Take for example, osteoporosis. Physicians and dentists should collaborate to improve early detection and treatment of patients who have or may develop osteoporosis, said researchers in the cover story of the May 2008 issue of The Journal of the American Dental Association.

The authors of the article, "Osteoporosis and Its Implications for Dental Patients," reviewed the medical and dental literature to examine osteoporosis' effect on public health in the United States. They also assessed the implications of providing dental care to people who have or are at risk of developing osteoporosis.

According to the authors, the literature indicated that osteoporosis and related fractures are more common than coronary disease, stroke and breast cancer. Fractures resulting from osteoporosis can affect a patient's quality of life, as well as result in functional impairment and increased health care cost and mortality.

Their literature search also revealed that medical management of osteoporosis includes diet control, weight-bearing exercise, discontinuation of tobacco and alcohol intake, and use of medications -- including selective estrogen receptor modulators, calcitonin, anabolic agents and bisphosphonates -- that have been associated with the development of osteonecrosis of the jaw.

The authors determined that oral health maintenance is important in patients with osteoporosis, and that changes to bisphosphonate therapy or other medical treatment should be made only after consultation with the patient's physician. "Dentists need to understand osteoporosis, its treatments and its complications to provide adequate care," wrote the authors.

All health care professionals involved in the care of all dental patients, particularly patients who are taking oral bisphosphonates, should discuss patient care decisions with the patient's physician, the authors concluded.

Keyboards Dirtier Than A Toilet?

Computer keyboards may harbor more harmful germs than a toilet seat. One study found that the average desktop keyboard had 400 times more bacteria than the average toilet seat. Researchers in London found equipment carrying germs that could cause food poisoning. They said sharing a keyboard could pass on illnesses among office workers. Contamination may be due to users eating lunch at their desks and leaving crumbs that promote the growth of bacteria. Workers neglecting to wash their hands after using the restroom could also be to blame. To clean keyboards, shake out crumbs, dust with a damp cloth and disinfect them with an alcohol wipe.

Which meant a slight alteration in preparation for the coaches and players, who were used to spending up to eight hours competing in the districts.

Playing one match at a time was different, but something to which the Ramblers adjusted quickly.

Boyne City experienced little difficulty handling Charlevoix in the title match, establishing its command of the match early and rolling to a 25-17, 25-20, 25-20 victory.

"I was a little nervous coming into the match although we were 4-1 against them this year," coach Casie Parker said. "Charlevoix always seems to win when it matters most."

"After the win the night before, my girls were very pumped up. We got the momentum right away and never let up. We knew that would be a key to winning the match."

"My girls played very well and cut down on the errors to win."

Although the score was closer in the second set than it had been in the first, Boyne City was never

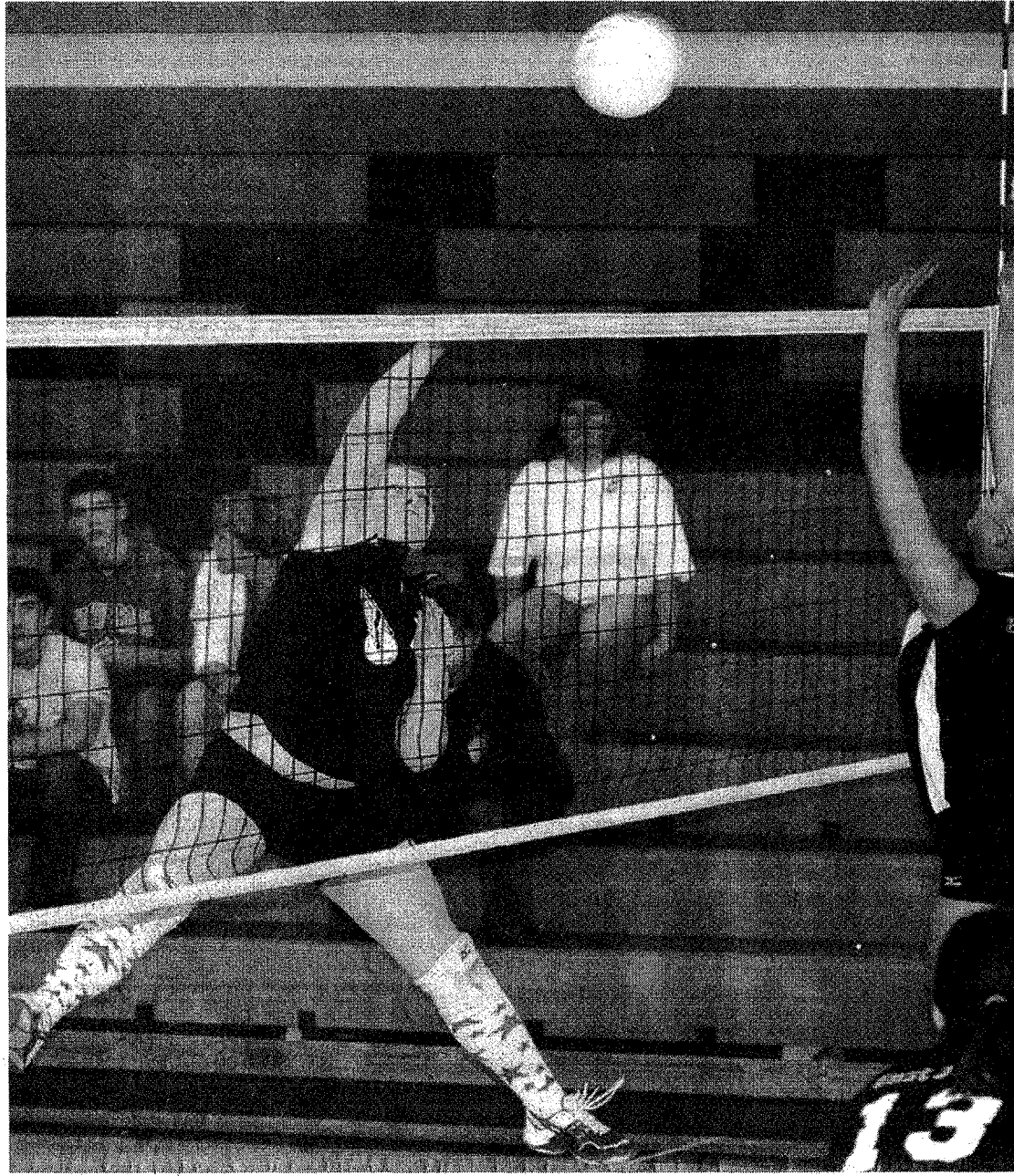

The road to the title match against the Rayders began with East Jordan standing on the other side of the net in the opening round. After squeezing out the win, the Lady Ramblers advanced to play Suttons Bay in the semi-final Thursday.

"Tonight's win was the best win of my coaching career," Parker said.

Boyne City defeated Suttons Bay 26-28, 21-25, 25-23, 25-19, 15-9.

Kotalik had 28 digs, 57 serve receptions, 24 kills and five blocks. Clemens contributed 48 setter assists and five service aces. Hausler had 17 serve receptions and 15 kills. Stevens had 21 digs and 11 kills, and Robinson had 14 digs.

"We were down 0-2 and had to fight our way back," Parker said. "Suttons Bay is one of the best teams we have faced all year. We never gave up. I was very proud of the girls."

"They deserved this win. During the match we had to make several adjustments to our lineup because of their hard hitter. Some of the changes we have never practiced or done before. The girls listened and executed."

Suttons Bay had an All-Stater who is an extremely hard hitter, but Kotalik and Sam McLeod did a good job shutting her down, according to Parker.

When the Norsemen's coach moved her to the outside position so she could hit against the Ramblers' shorter girls, Parker switched her right sides back and had the middles block her one-on-one and it worked.

"The girls are really starting to play together and peaking at the right time," Parker said.

The Ramblers (34-10-10) advanced to the regionals at McBain High School, where they faced the winner of the Farwell district Tuesday.

Boyne City won its first ever volleyball district title a year ago.

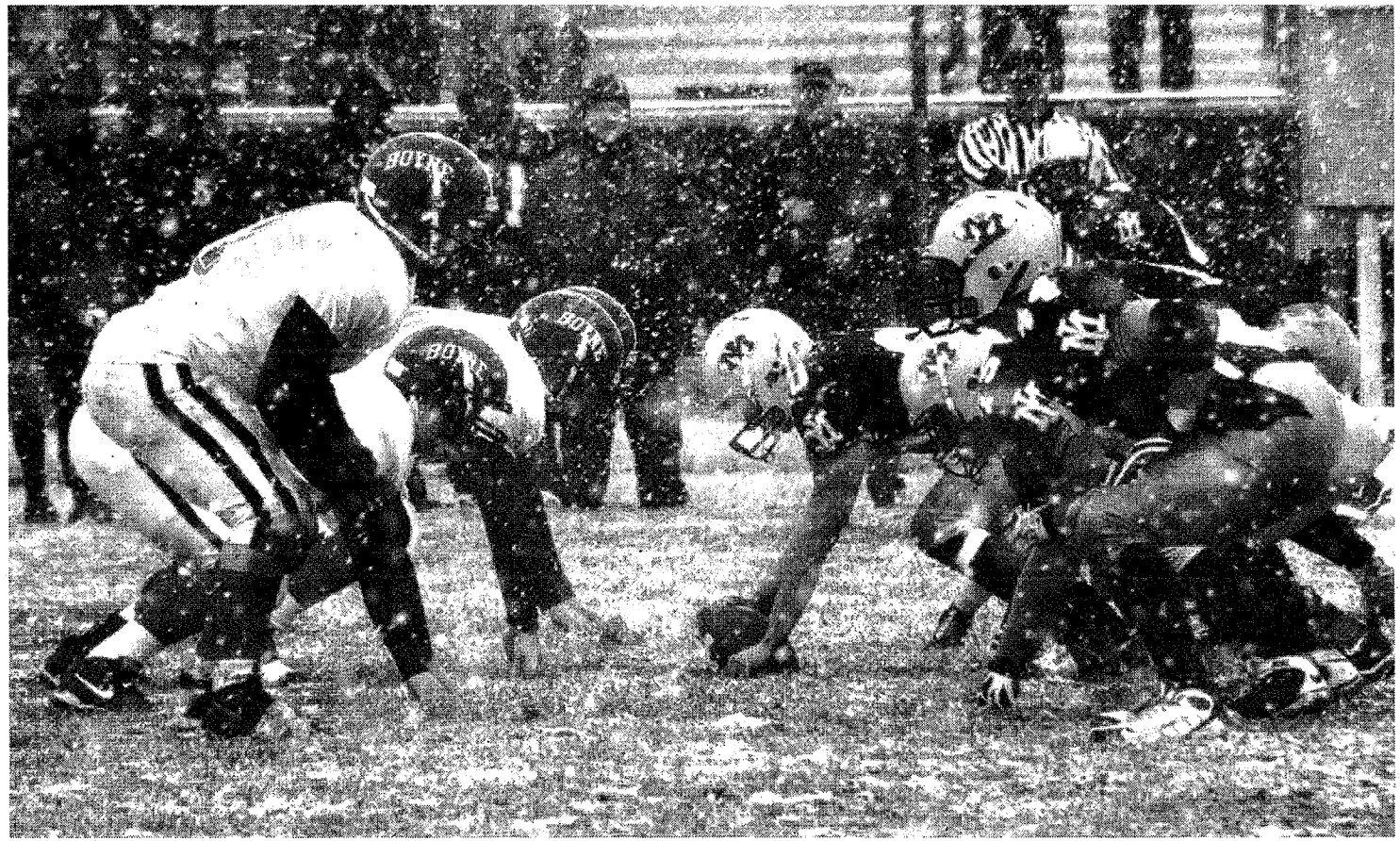

Ramblers retired by Iron Mountain, 35-6

IRON MOUNTAIN — It was a steep and slippery uphill climb for the Boyne City Ramblers football team in last Saturday afternoon's Division 6 District Championship game against Iron Mountain.

The Ramblers fell behind by three touchdowns in the first quarter, and couldn't recover in dropping a 35-6 decision to the Mountaineers on a cold, wet day in the Upper Peninsula.

Coming into the game with a 9-1 record and a pre-district victory at home just a week earlier, the Ramblers had confidence and momentum.

But there was plenty of both

on the other sideline as well, and this time the Ramblers were playing on foreign turf after a long bus ride.

The sun might have been shining, but it shed little of its warmth on the Rambler offense, which was kept under wraps all afternoon by a swarming Iron Mountain defense.

A moderate snowfall in the second quarter turned the field slippery and made it difficult for either team to enjoy good footing.

Coincidentally, the Ramblers mounted their only scoring drive of the afternoon during that snowy second quarter.

Junior quarterback Nick Young capped the drive with a 5-yard touchdown pass to senior

tight end Josh McGeorge.

Boyne City failed on the two-point conversion attempt, and trailed 21-6 four minutes into the second period.

Senior running back Trevor Kruzel found a hole off left guard and bolted for a 63-yard gain to the Mountaineer 9-yard line two plays earlier to set up the touchdown.

The Ramblers would not score again.

"(The Mountaineers) are what we thought they were," Boyne City coach Dave Hills said.

"They're very balanced. They put a lot of pressure on you defensively. They can score from anywhere on the field."

Iron Mountain proved that early in the third quarter when

senior quarterback Pat Flood raced 45 yards for a touchdown to put the Mountaineers up 28-6.

Whatever spark the Ramblers had lit after scoring their touchdown seemed to flicker out with that drive.

Boyne City was staggered when the Mountaineers scored three touchdowns in the first quarter.

Meanwhile, the Ramblers' offense struggled against the Mountaineers' defense and finished with just 130 yards total.

Kruzel accounted for the biggest chunk of it with 94 yards rushing on 15 carries, while Young completed 3-of-8 passes for just 20 yards.

Trek / Voltzwagon's Jeremiah Bishop of Virginia iced the field with a first-place finish in one hour, 28 minutes and 31 seconds.

Brian Matter of Wisconsin took

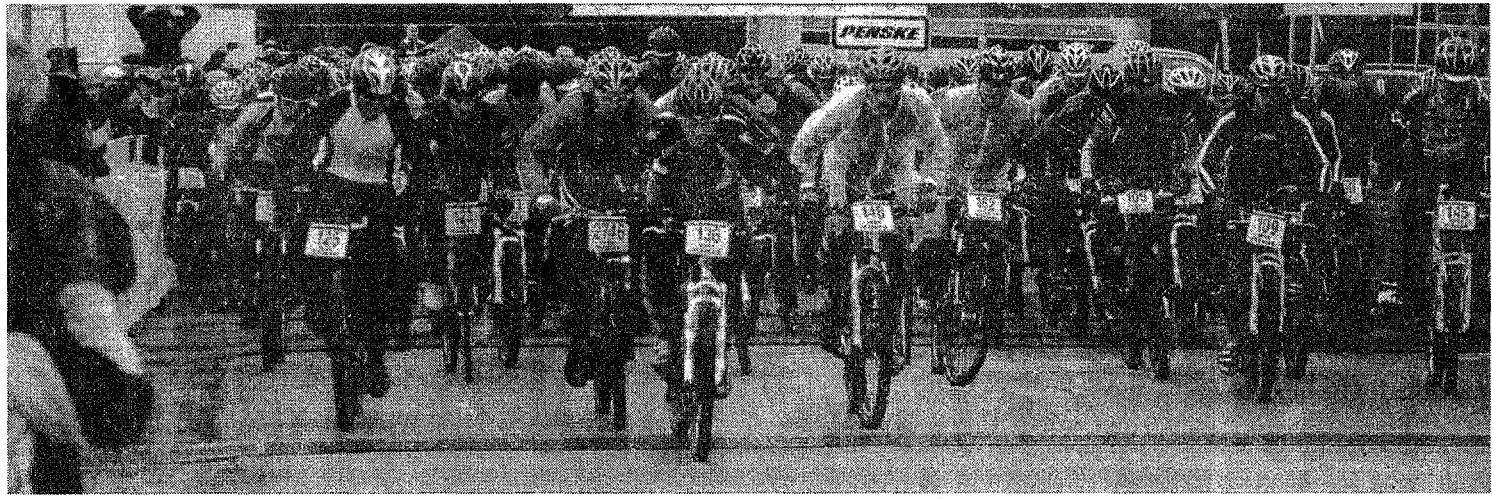

Also racing without the convenience of gears, Boyne City's Mark Blaauw-Hara handed in a 2:12:45 to place 31st in the Singlespeed race for men 39 years and under.

Justin Baetsen of Boyne Falls competed in the Sport class for ages 19-24 and placed eighth in 2:07:44, and Boyne Falls' Steve Schnell finished 92nd in the Sport class for ages 40-43, completing the Iceman in 2:37:39.

Boyne City's Samuel Minor

placed 64th in the Sport Class for ages 40-46 with a 2:58:42, Mike Cornell was 72nd among ages 50-54 with 2:59:44, and Steve Talboys placed 76th in the same wave, pedaling a 3:09:37.

The Iceman Cometh Challenge has grown from an initial turnout of 40 racers to the first 2,500 people able to register before the cutoff date.

The course is mostly made up of dirt roads, two-tracks and abandoned railroad beds. It joins up with the Vasa Nordic Ski Trail in Williamsburg after crossing the

only paved road along the way, Williamsburg Road. Subaru and Meijer are the primary race sponsors, while many more contribute.

"There's people here from 33 states (and Ontario)," marketing consultant Chuck O'Conner told the Citizen-Journal before the start of the first wave of racers Saturday. "This is the largest single-day, point-to-point race in the country. It's the best race...globally."

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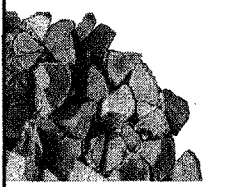

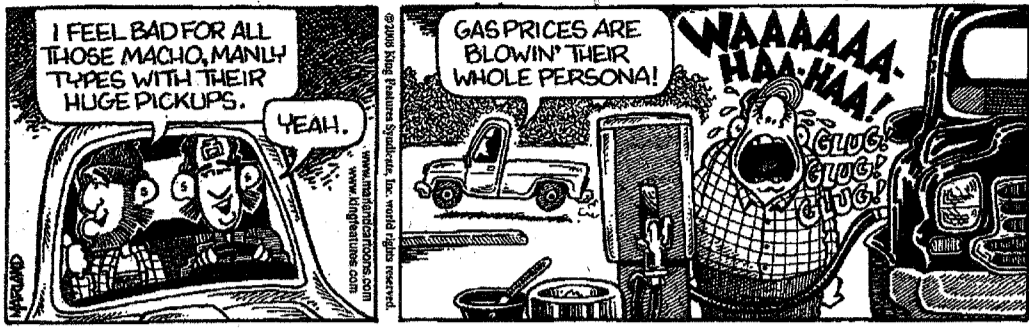

Dr. John Richter is president of the Friends of the Jordan River and has played a central role in taking action to prevent the leachate contaminant from injection well storage in Star Township.

"With the EPA appeals board it's rarely successful, but in the circuit court it's a more level playing field," Richter said. "We think that our chances are much better."

There are times of frustration, but the group is planning to move ahead, Richter said. The goals are not only to stop the injection well, but also to clean up Bay Harbor, he said.

Bay Harbor Resort was built on the site of a former cement plant. The kiln dust remains on the site in piles. When water reaches the kiln dust it forms a toxic substance.

St Marys Cement Plant near Charlevoix offered to remove some of the contaminated leachate piles from Bay Harbor some time ago, saying it could safely use it in production. But, that

offer has not been acted upon by CMS according to Richter.

Now, with St Marys laying off workers there is a greater advantage to working with the company, Richter said.

"If we call for encapsulation of the kiln dust piles (surrounding them with cement) so water can't reach them we'll need an enormous amount of cement to encapsulate. St Marys can use the leachate until the piles are encapsulated," Richter said. "It not only will provide jobs, but will provide a solution to the problem of leachate."

Richter and others are organizing educational meetings around the Northern Michigan area to give information to the public, like that pollutants, mercury for one, are entering Little Traverse Bay and Lake Michigan every day, Richter said.

The state's proposal-2 for stem cell research was voted down in those cities and townships. Both proposals passed statewide.

Rep. Kevin Elsenheimer (R-Bellaire) will serve another two-year term in the Michigan House of Representatives for the 105th District. Elsenheimer led in all of the area cities and townships and won throughout the 105th District, 30,568 votes to 18,455 votes for challenger Connie Saltonstall, a Democrat from Hayes Township, and to 1,354 votes for Libertarian candidate Greg Dean.

Saltonstall said she called Elsenheimer to congratulate him and she thanked the people who worked on her campaign and those who voted for her. She continues to serve on the Charlevoix County Commission on Aging board, the Hospice of Northwest Michigan board and the Northern Community Mediation board.

Republican Ron Reinhardt won reelection to his District 3 county commission seat against challenger Mike Webster, a Democrat from Melrose Township. Along with Boyne Valley, Melrose and Wilson townships, the District includes

Chandler and Hudson townships.

Reinhardt begins his fourth term on Jan. 1, 2009. He said that as a farmer, farmland preservation is a major issue for him.

"I'm the only agriculture guy on the county commission," Reinhardt said. He advocates a farmland preservation ordinance and open space preservation.

Reinhardt is county

commission liaison to the Charlevoix County Humane Society and to the Michigan Association of Counties. He serves on the Building and Grounds Committee and is part of the Northern Michigan Counties Association. He serves on the boards of county veterans and public transit.

Reinhardt said he campaigned more this year than in other years and that he appreciates

the votes.

Boyer City has the highest number of registered voters at 2,828, and 1,818, or 64 percent, of them voted. East Jordan has the next highest number of registered voters at 1,580 with 960 (61 percent) voters who went to the polls. Wilson Township registered voters numbered 1,485 and 991 of those voted, or 67 percent. South Arm Township's registered voters

number 1,433 and 969 voted, 68 percent. Melrose Township has 1,127 registered voters and 704, or 62 percent, voted. Boyne Valley Township registered voters number 989 and 645 of those went to the polls, or 65 percent. Evangeline Township has the least number of registered voters at 672 with 449 who voted, or 67 percent.

Boyer Valley Township elected Lynn M.

Sparks, a Republican, as township clerk with 380 votes. Judith K. Judkins, a Democrat, garnered 220 votes.

Both Evangeline and Melrose townships voted down a township road repair millage.

On the national level, Barack Obama was favored by 51 percent of the Boyne City voters, by 50-to-49 percent of East Jordan voters and by 53 percent of Boyne Valley Township

voters. Voters in Evangeline, Melrose, South Arm and Wilson townships voted for John McCain.

U.S. Senator Carl Levin and U.S. Congressman Bart Stupak who represent Northern Michigan both retained their seats in the November election.
