Today, the most powerful forces of nature are at work fitting together situations, circumstances, attracting, repelling and creating; and they will continue to do so until we have at last accomplished the purpose for which we now are cooperating.

These forces went to work for us the moment we reached a definite decision with common hope and faith.

We have summoned this natural power through our decision and cooperation and it will work for us as long as we let it; any major indecision or confusion among ourselves now will turn the tide for all of us.

Old wounds and memories lay by the wayside, stripped of their dangerous barbs. But one man, stopping to pick them up, can upset the flow of current in the powerful magnet which is attracting industry to East Jordan.

We will stand in the months ahead on the threshold of success in our attempt to develop our community.

Someone has said that when the chips are down the "common people have common sense." The chips are down in East Jordan. And the "common people" have revealed their common sense.

All of us now can picture a new industry in East Jordan. Any negative attitude now can wipe out that picture and in turn the reality we seek.

EDITORIAL

Easter Sermonette

"But now is Christ risen from the dead." (I Cor. 15:20a)

There is a great deal more to Easter than Easter bunnies, little fluffy chickens and Easter parades of the latest spring fashions. The deeper things of Easter take us back nearly two thousand years to an empty tomb and the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. So important an beheld Him who had power not only to lay down His life His resurrection is the very foundation upon which the whole structure of the Christian faith has been built.

That Jesus arose from the dead on the third day is a well established fact in history. Luke (the author of the book of Acts) tells us that Jesus showed Himself alive after His death and resurrection by "many infallible proofs" and continued with His chosen apostles for forty days before ascending into heaven, where He ever lives to make intercession for us at the Father's right hand.

Paul in his first Corinthian letter, chapter fifteen, tells of the three-fold benefits of Christ's resurrection in the following words: "... if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins. Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished. ... But now is Christ risen from the dead and become the first fruits of them that slept."

FIRST BENEFIT IS FAITH

The disciples of Christ had their faith severely tried by the cruel death of their Master. They had trusted that He would be their King and establish a kingdom of righteousness, but instead, He was taken by the angry mob, brought before Pilate for trial, condemned, crucified, and buried. Then came the resurrection reviving their faith, for they event is the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead that had power to take it up again.

So we, too, are not trusting in a dead Savior but in one who is alive forevermore. He is "the author and finisher of our faith" and "whosoever believeth in Him" need not perish because of his sins but may have "everlasting life." But on the other hand, "he that believeth not" can have no part of this eternal life "but the wrath of God abideth on him."

North State Labor Survey Shows Plenty of Help In Area

The East Jordan Businessmen's area employment survey has brought applications from nearly every community in northern Michigan.

The industrial employment check was launched last week in connection with the locating of a prospective industrial plant here.

Thirty former residents now employed down state have been contacted and many are expected to express their willingness to return home if employment is available.

The requests for employment are reaching the association through advertisements placed in several north state newspapers. From the flow of applications arriving daily, local officials believe there is no doubt that plenty of factory labor is available for an additional industry here.

The employerment survey is continuing and residents are urged to help find prospective laborers who might be willing to work in a new East Jordan industrial plant.

Expect Largest City Vote Next Monday

The largest city-wide vote in many years is expected here Monday when residents go to the polls to name a mayor and several councilmen. Adding to the political side of the voting are two other reasons for a large turnout.

Voters will have to decide whether or not they favor the sale of spirits by the glass in East Jordan; and whether or not they favor closing a portion of Spring street for expansion of the East Jordan Iron Works.

In the race for the mayor's office are Chris Taylor, local merchant, and active civic worker; and Tom Bussler, long-time city office holder.

FIRST WARD
A first ward petition was filed for Frank Strehl, a newcomer in city politics. He will run to replace Bill Taylor, whose term will expire and declined to become a candidate. Tom Bussler's position as first ward councilman will not be determined until after the April 6 election. Bussler's term of office has not expired.

SECOND WARD
Archie Griffin, incumbent councilman in the second ward filed petition for re-election and will be opposed at the polls by Dan Bennett. Councilman George Rebec has one more year to serve in the second ward.

THIRD WARD
In the third ward Richard Malpass, incumbent councilman, will be opposed by William Rebec. Edward Nemecek's term of office will not expire until next year. East Jordan holds no primary spring election this year because not enough petitions were filed to require it.

An American Legion Honor guard met the body at the train in Ellsworth and came to the Watson funeral home, where the guard was on duty until services were held.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Howard Boyer, and his step father, and his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Glen Pinney, two sisters, Sharon and Sue Pinney and one brother Glen Pinney, Jr. A sister, Marcia Joann, preceded him in death July 4, 1951. Other survivors include: Ernest's grand parents, Mr. and Mrs. William VanDeventer and Mrs. Ida Pinney, besides several aunts and uncles and cousins.

East Jordan flags were dropped to half mast after the body arrived here and all local places of business closed during the services.

Voters will go to the polls Monday to elect a new Mayor, several councilmen and they will decide upon two city propositions: Shall the sale of spirits be allowed; and shall the city allow the East Jordan Iron Works to construct a new building across Spring street.

One of the largest and most successful smelt runs in history is expected to East Jordan in the next few days. The prediction is based on the fact that the fish have reached an all-time abundance peak in the Great Lakes; and that local fishermen report more smelt in nearby lakes and streams than in many years.

Close to 1,000 Boy Scouts from Cadillac to the Straits will convene at East Jordan May 22, 23, and 24th. City-wide preparations are underway for an all-out welcome program.

East Jordan will be host May 7th to 500 northern Michigan high school bandmen for the annual district band concert. Ten high school band units will assemble here during the morning with a street parade in the afternoon and a concert at the high school at night.

The East Jordan Business Men's Association has developed an all-out campaign to secure new industry for the city, along with the East Jordan Industrial Development Corporation; funds are being sought for construction of an industrial plant; an employment survey is well underway and cooperative action is greater today than in many years.

One of the famous trout streams in United States, the Jordan River, will be the scene of many a fisherman's paradise, Saturday, April 11th. Rainbow and Steelhead season open then. And again on April 25th, the city will play host to fishermen from all sections of the state when the regular trout season opens.

First signs of summer are arriving via letters of inquiry concerning East Jordan's summer advantages. People want to know about renting cabins, about real estate sites available etc.

East Jordan's high rating tourist park is nearing completion under direction of Tom St. Charles. The city's summer recreation area is also nearing completion and will have lights for night play.

The East Jordan Businessmen's Association is making every effort to locate a hometown lawyer. Several have been contacted.

Several hundred northern Michigan farmers will meet at the East Jordan high school April 20th to attend the annual meeting of the Jordan Valley Co-operative Creamery. One of northern Michigan larger industries, the creamery's annual butter output has reached 2,000,000 pounds.

City-Wide Pledges Sought By Merchants to Aid Campaign

East Jordan industrial committees turned big guns on the work of securing pledges this week for the raising of local funds in connection with prospective construction of an industrial plant.

Eight team captains were named at a recent meeting of the East Jordan Businessmen's Association and helpers were appointed to each team. The teams began immediately to secure pledges of \$100, \$500 and \$1,000.

Upwards of \$20,000 in investment pledges to bear five percent interest had been pledged at press time.

City Prepares to Entertain 1000 Boy Scouts

City-wide preparations are under way on a large scale to welcome nearly 1,000 Boy Scouts who will camp at the fair grounds in May for their annual Council Camporee sponsored by the Scenic Trails Council.

Co-chairman of the event with Harvey Bays, of Traverse City, is Harry Watson, of East Jordan. They report that scouts will arrive in East Jordan from Cadillac to the Straits.

Watson reported Monday that several businessmen and residents have joined the work of welcoming the scouts and will act as chairman of several necessary committees.

Grounds preparation committee Howard Porter, plumbing and utilities, William Grauel, electrical and sound equipment, Lou Gardner, parade committee, Tom St. Charles, handicraft raw materials and firewood committee, The American Legion, Bill Bennett, chairman, advertising committee, Marshall Sayles; service committee, John Downing, church committee, Rev. Edward DeHaven.

Other committees to be appointed will handle work of setting up a trading post at the fair grounds, securing a fire truck for stand-by action at the camp grounds, securing a speaker for the downtown assembly after a Boy Scout parade.

The scouts will begin to arrive in East Jordan the night of May 21st and will camp for three days.

A parade will be staged on the Saturday afternoon featuring the lumberjack theme as well as a pageant camp fire that night.

Sunday morning boys will attend the church of their choice in East Jordan with special services at the churches.

Sunday afternoon will be open to parents and visitors who will be invited and urged to inspect the camp site. Conclusion of the Camporee will be the popular chariot races and other contests staged for benefit of the public.

The final public event will be staged in the oval of the fair grounds.

B. C. Cummins Directs Cancer Crusade Here

Basil Cummins, Insurance Agent executive, directs the American Cancer Society's 1953 crusade here. It was announced here today. Mr. Cummins will be chairman of the joint fund-raising and educational campaign in Charlevoix County which opens April 1st.

The goal for this year is \$1,400. In 1952 contributors gave a total of \$1,320 in this county. The national figure for 1953 - \$18,000,000 or an increase of \$2,000,000 over last year's goal. However, a total of nearly \$16,000,000 was collected in 1952.

"We hope to be able to contribute our full share towards this goal," Mr. Cummins said. Naturally we must raise our sights considerably over last year's contributions to do so.

"This can be done either by more givers or larger donations," the chairman said. "It is my sincere hope that both will ensue."

"The task of directing the drive here, I feel, carries a heavy responsibility. The size of our research program and the extent of service to patients and of our educational activity are governed by funds available. The more money raised, the more lives saved."

"When someone asks you to make your contribution a little larger this year, I hope you will think of this. It the meantime there are a great many details to complete before the campaign can be launched, and I will need the help of many people in this community."

"In the near future we will be asking for volunteers to help in East Jordan. We hope your response will be generous and soon."

A 4-H Achievement event will be held in the Ellsworth Community hall Friday evening, April 10th. Clubs participating will be Ellsworth, Bently Hill and Atwood.

CITY FOLKS HELP

Launch First State Soils Educational Program Here

East Jordan's industrial development activities are being matched in Charlevoix county by Michigan's most intensified soils education program.

Clayton Healey, of East Jordan, chairman, Charlevoix soil conservation district said: "Local industrial development corporations work for increased employment and community development. And friends of agriculture are working for rapid development of our rural areas."

Healey drew the farm-industry activity comparison after a county-wide meeting at the East Jordan high school to launch the state's first soils district "greater service" program.

TO START IN JULY
An educational effort to acquaint all farmers in the area with soil conservation benefits, the program will get into full swing in July.

Friends of farming gathered from throughout the county as committee members to learn their part in the program. They include farm machinery dealers, school teachers, newspapermen, farm instructors, bankers, 4-H club and Future Farmer leaders.

With the theme "every acre to

best use through education" the program was suggested to the districts by the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts.

Although soil districts in other states have started the "greater service" program, the Charlevoix district is first in Michigan to take action, Healey said.

He said 180 Charlevoix county farmers have entered applications to join the soils district since 1948. The district office is in Boyne City.

In attempting to acquaint all farmers with the importance of soils conservation, it was pointed out that the current method is something of a turnabout.

"City cousins are going to tell country cousins how important it is to work with the soils program," Healey said.

SECOND-BENEFIT IS JUSTIFICATION

Christ died for our sins, "but He rose again for our justification." On Calvary, Christ was the Lamb of God laying down His life as a sacrifice for the sins of the whole world. After His resurrection and ascension into heaven, we see Him as "our high priest forever after the order of Melchisedec." There He ever lives to make intercession to the Father for us. THIRD BENEFIT IS IMMORTALITY

The resurrection of Christ is the guarantee of our resurrection. He layed down His life and took it up again, and, in so doing, took on immortality.

When our Lord shall "descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God," the dead in Christ shall rise, be clothed with immortality and go to be forever with the Lord. 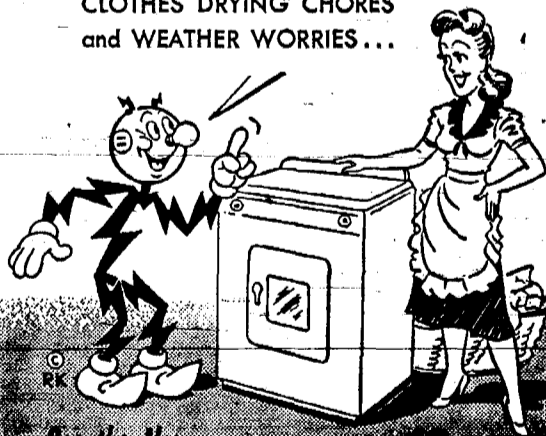

ORCHARD NOTES

By C. Fairman



It's time to spray for peach leaf curl. Although not listed in the spray calendar, use "Krenite", a D. N. Compound sold at your local co-ops. This material is most effective for the curl and also kills many other fungus diseases as well as insects. Follow directions on the can—two quarts to 100 gallons of water.

Where orchards are cultivated, early cultivating helps to conserve more moisture, helps to destroy shot hole on old leaves laying on the ground and helps to destroy cherry fruit fly and other insects.

Clean up fence rows and cut

all wild cherry trees in your vicinity.

Early cultivating helps to prevent shot hole bores and also starts weeds and cover crop to rot down sooner for more benefit to the crop.

Floyd D. Rice Starts Serving Life Sentence

Floyd D. Rice, 61, of Ferndale, was taken to Southern Michigan prison Tuesday to begin serving a life sentence for the murder of his good friend and hunting companion, Clyde Hughes, 47, also of Ferndale, at Boyne City November 30.

A jury of 10 men and two women found Floyd D. Rice guilty of murder in the first degree at an early hour Friday after deliberation for five hours and 45 minutes. The jury, with Harry Paddock of Walkon Lake serving as foreman, returned the verdict at 12:35 a.m. and immediately afterwards Judge Charles L. Brown sentenced Rice to spend the remainder of his natural life in prison, the mandatory sentence for first degree murder.

Residents Warned Against Spring Fire Hazards

Machinery of Michigan's important forest fire control system has been put to work as the spring fire hazard season approaches.

Already, 1,000 "keymen" have been appointed to keep sharp watch on forest lands in their areas.

Keymen are generally farmers, loggers and land owners, persons with a vested interest in forest protection. They are provided with basic fire fighting equipment to keep at home. When fires occur nearby, keymen are often first to arrive and may take quick action toward halting the blaze.

Also, keymen serve as a reserve fighting force for the conservation department when big fires threaten.

The 140 fire towers in Michigan also soon will all be manned and operating. About 30 men will be hired as lookouts this year for work in these towers, many to be hired without need of civil service exams. The department's field administration division is accepting applications now for this work.

Department airplanes also have been up this year flying smoke patrol. Most flying has been done in the southern lower peninsula, but as the spring hazard develops, planes will go to work in the north also.

Spring is generally the most hazardous time for forests. Woods are tinder-dry and fires that develop often race through large areas in short order.

Forest users are urged to use extreme caution while in the woods this spring.

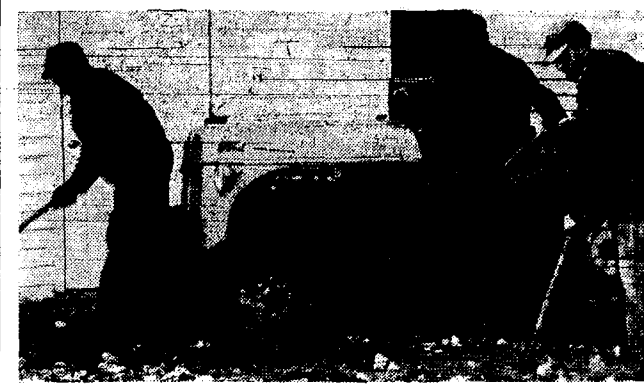
In 1911 there were 696 students in the public schools, 110 of them in kindergarten.

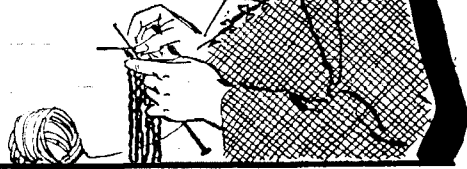

the closing days of the deer hunting season. After the shooting Rice left the scene and was captured several hours later near Grayling by state police from the Gaylord post.

Rice admitted the shooting but contended then and all through the trial that he shot Hughes in self-defense.

WATCH OUT FOR TRUCKS

Watch out for trucks! That warning sign along the highways would be a good slogan for anyone who owns and operates an automobile to adopt right now. Watch out for trucks or they are apt to hit you square in the pocketbook!

Have you noticed how active the Michigan Trucking Association has become in the past few weeks—buying billboards, radio time and newspaper advertisements to tell what a tremendous public service the trucking industry is rendering? It is not mere coincidence that this expensive advertising campaign comes just at a time when lawmaking bodies, which will have to vote new taxes to build more and better roads, are going into session. It all looks like a well-designed program to convince the lawmakers that the trucking industry should be exempt from any new taxes.

Who's going to pay for the new highways, then? Why, you, Sucker! You've been walloped with ever-higher state gasoline taxes and federal excise taxes on cars so often that you're numb and don't even holler when you're hit anymore. Suppose you squawk a little? You don't have organized lobby like the Michigan Trucking Association or Good Roads Federation in Lansing or Washington to make yourself heard.

In a lead article in the December issue of Automobile Facts, published by the Automobile Manufacturers' Association, the claim is made that in 1951 there were 9,200,000 trucks registered in the United States. These trucks traveled a total of 95 billion miles and their owners paid "special truck taxes collected by federal, state and local agencies" of \$1,400,000,000. There is no explanation of these "special truck taxes."

Now those are pretty big figures. Broken down, however, they appear to show that the average trucker paid \$141.30 in these "special truck taxes" for the privilege of driving his truck about 10,300 miles over the nation's public roads that year. Figured that way, our truckers paid less than a cent-and-a-half a mile for the use of our roads.

That cent-and-a-half doesn't seem overly much when experts tell us that the U. S. highway system represents a 50 billion dollar investment, most of which was paid for by the 63 million car owners in this country. What we need, it seems, is not somebody to lobby in Lansing and Washington for the owners of 9,200,000 trucks, but for the owners of 68,000,000 private automobiles.

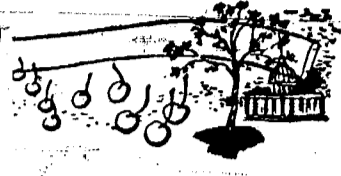

ORCHARD NOTES



By C. Fairman

Here at home we have sprayed our peaches and are cultivating cherry and peach orchards. At a trimming demonstration on the Jerry Ardema farm near Central Lake the specialists noted that the soil had been highly fertilized in his older cherry orchard and

that the trees had been frozen during the November freeze of 1951. During 1952 the cherry trees had not made any new growth and the crop was cut considerable last season.

The specialists thought that many orchards were affected and

that was the reason for the over estimated of the crop last June. It does not pay to overdo any one orchard operation such as over fertilize. It pays to cultivate early and let a cover crop start June 15th to July 1st. The cover crop is not very high during harvest and comes on well in August and September to ripen up the trees. All fruits seem to be budding well this spring. The buds of the Montmorency, are the most tender to frost the first three days they start to swell.

East Jordan Survey

Questions on consumer income and family characteristics will be asked of a sample of East Jordan area families in the April Census Survey, according to District Supervisor Donald P. Watkins. The Current Survey will be conducted here and in 67 other areas of the country during the week of April 12. Supervisor Watkins emphasized that all information about individuals furnished to the Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law.

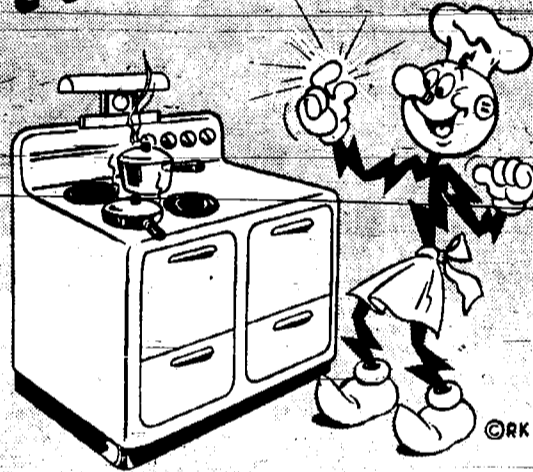
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
