"But now is Christ risen from the dead." (I Cor. 15:20a) There is a great deal more to Easter than Easter bun-

nies, little fluffy chickens and Easter parades of the latest spring fashions. The deeper things of Easter take us back nearly two thousand years to an empty tomb and the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. So important an beheld Him who had power not only to lay down His life His resurrection is the very foundation upon which the whole structure of the Christian faith has been built.

That Jesus arose from the dead on the third day is a well established fact in history. Luke (the author of the many years is expected here Mon-book of Acts) tells us that Jesus showed Himself alive day when residents go to the polls after His death and resurrection by "many infallible proofs" and continued with His chosen apostles for forty days before ascending into heaven, where He ever lives to make intercession for us at the Father's right hand.





SECOND BENEFIT IS JUSTIFICATION
