Seek Bids For County's New Hospital

The board of trustees of the Charlevoix hospital announced this week that construction of the \$600,000 building will get under way as soon as the bid is let.

Fred Willis, president of the board, told the East Jordan News that bids were advertised this week and will be opened late in June.

Plans for the hospital have been approved by federal and state offices of hospital survey and construction, and nothing stands in the way of construction except letting the bid.

Willis said the \$600,000 represents cost of the building and equipment of which the federal government will put up 55 per cent. The other 45 per cent has been raised through donations.

Donations for the county hospital came from throughout Charlevoix county and from others interested in the territory.

Draw Plans For Prospective Local Plant

Plans were progressing this week toward construction of an East Jordan industrial plant. The local industrial committee is preparing construction plans which are to be checked by the prospective plant officials before the plant is approved.

The best catch of the week was brought in by Pat Steiner of East Jordan. He caught ten native German Brown Trout ranging up to sixteen inches in length. Pat caught these fish in Monroe Creek but he wouldn't divulge the exact location on the stream or what he used for bait. This isn't an unusual catch for Pat though because he does it quite often, especially during a good rain storm such as we had last Monday.

Spin Cihak proved his ability as a trout fisherman last Sunday by taking a limit catch of fish from the Jordan River. He also tangled it to a big Rainbow which broke his leader to escape.

Pike fishermen are still reaping a harvest of fish from the back waters of Lake Charlevoix and around the mouth of the Jordan River. There have been several limit catches of them taken during the past week.

Jess Robinson is back again for the summer and has been giving the fish a good workout. He caught five pike up on the Dam in about an hour's time on his first try at fresh water fishing here in East Jordan this year.

White Bass have been biting but no one has really gotten a good catch of them during the past week. Some seem to think that the abundance of Pike around the mouth of the river has kept them on the run. It is also a general belief that these big northern are also spoiling the trout fishing in the lower end of the river. Several small trout have been caught bearing marks on them which appear to be tears caused by the teeth of larger fish.

Reports coming in say that the Perch and other Panfish are biting fairly consistent in Dutchman's Bay which is about three miles north of East Jordan. Most of them in that area are being caught on Nightcrawlers and minnows.

Working on the East Jordan, Deer Lake road, Wood was electrocuted when the crane hit a high line. The current reached him through a chain he was handling on the ground.

Both Dr. John Savory and Charlevoix County coroner James Stackus were called to the scene. Wood died almost immediately.

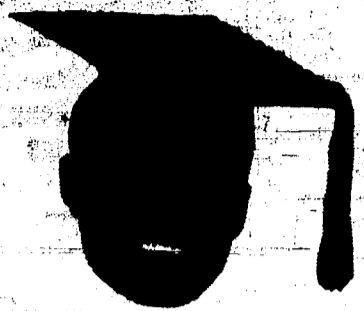

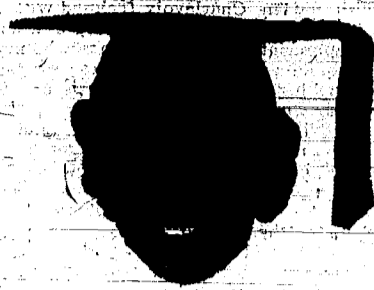

ORCHARD NOTES

By C. Fairman

On May 20, Montmorency cherries were in full bloom. Mr. Dubis, of The East Jordan Canning Co., has a record of full bloom dates and harvest dates over a period of years. This season is slightly later than the average and harvest should start July 20. This should put our earliest sweet cherries at July 4. Schmidt Biggareau, July 15, Tartarians, July 10 and the very latest sweets Aug. 1st. and on.

Generally speaking there should be a large crop of all fruits in this section except in a few marginal spots.

Kenner Hollenlech, of Kewadin reports a complete loss of his peach crop which froze out about April 1st from buds starting too early. Peaches on higher ground and heavier soil are ok. Apples and peaches will need blossom thinning sprays. Hand thinning is more costly and not on time as the earlier apples are thinned the better the chance for a crop the following year.

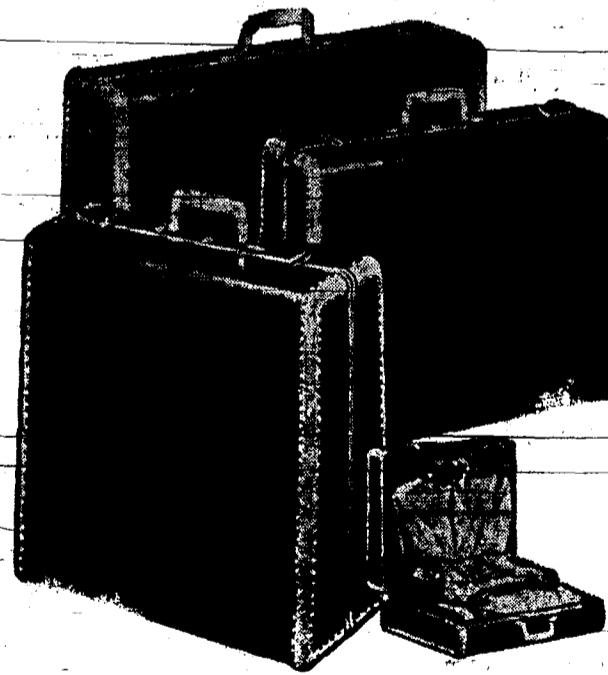

Over the Back Fence

Lumber dealers and contractors say there is plenty of new construction now under way or planned for this area. Bids for the new area hospital at Charlevoix will be opened late this month. A new hospital is being constructed on Beaver Island. Courter Electric Products are putting finishing touches upon their new plant at Boyne City. The East Jordan Iron Works is looking forward to constructing a \$20,000 addition to the present plant.

Locally, Dahlquist's variety store is nearing completion, Dr. Savory and Dr. Bechtold are constructing new offices. The Dress & Gift Shoppe has finished remodeling. Road construction includes present improvement between East Jordan and Deer Lake and planned improvement of part of M-32 in East Jordan.

The East Jordan Industrial Development Corporation's construction committee is pushing plans for a prospective plant near M-32 and M-86. Work is going forward for construction of a manufacturing plant near the old Sugar Beet factory site at Charlevoix.

It was reported to the News that widening of M-31 between Traverse City and Petoskey will cause north and south bound M-31 traffic to be temporarily routed along through East Jordan.

Operation of the proposed factory in East Jordan would raise the number of major employers here to eight and boost combined local payrolls to more than one million dollars per year. This does not include local retail clerks or teachers' wages.

Retail customers spent more than \$40,000 per day in Charlevoix county last July. Their total spending for the month was more than \$1,250,000. These figures are from state sales tax reports which also show that Emmet County to the north of us nearly doubled our county's total for the same month. Antrim county to the south was slightly lower and Osego County to the west was still lower.

However, a close study of summer spending from all sources shows that locally we have in the past received a far too small amount of money spent in this area.

A sound program to attract more customers to our city is needed, according to all figures. Such a program would not have to be designed to invite customers to spend more of their money, but rather to attract customers who are already buying liberally all around us. State sales tax reports prove this.

Those eight state policemen who decended upon Bader's Standard Service Sunday afternoon were not interested in Harold. They wanted ice cream.

TO SPEND \$100,000 ON DEER LAKE ROAD

Road Commission Plans Listed For Summer Work In County

The Charlevoix county road commission is spending more than \$100,000 to improve the East Jordan-Boyerne City road through the Deer Lake area this summer.

Other commission plans include work on the Peninsula road north of Grandvue hospital, a small paving job south of Charlevoix, work on the Wildwood Harbor road near Walloon Lake, finishing up of the Advance, Boyne City road and complete improvement of the Boyne City, Charlevoix road.

Latest road bid let by the commission went to Dan S. Parr, of Menistee, for \$38,495.16. Parr will start in about two weeks on the grading and drainage structure work on the Deer Lake road two miles south of M-75, continuing from where the project ended last year. This work will run three miles into South Arm and Wilson townships toward East Jordan.

Already completed is the two miles of improvement from the Boyne City limits south on the Deer Lake road. It was done last year by Carothers and Dhalstrom of Fremont, at a cost of \$27,835.40. These two miles of improvement will be blacktopped by the end of July.

Nearly completed is the work now under way by the Vinton Construction Company, Coldwater. The firm is improving two miles of the Deer Lake road from the East Jordan city limits east. June 30th is the deadline and the cost was set at \$44,091.45. The commission this week was to gravel that portion completed nearest East Jordan.

Future plans include blacktopping the entire Deer Lake road between here and Boyne City.

Largest county road improvement job now in the planning stage is work to be done on the Charlevoix, Boyne City road, long a motorist sore spot.

Plans include complete improvement of the road bed with new black toping at a cost of about \$25,000 per mile. The road

is 14 miles long. The commission hopes to start the work next summer.

Still in the "talking stage" is the improvement or relocation of the north approach to East Jordan from Boyne City. If the improvement takes place within the city limits, the city will handle the work, but if a future decision is made to change the road and lay it straight into city from Rhulung's corner, about a mile out, the county will be doing part of the work.

It was reported that the State highway commission's 1953 budget includes funds for improvement of part of M-32 from the railroad tracks in East Jordan, east to where the improved M-32 now ends, a few blocks.

The county commission knows of no immediate plans by the state to improve M-66 south of East Jordan. It was said that a new road bed and extensive work would be required to re-construct that portion of the highway, which would be a state job.

Youth Sentenced

Martin Rebec, 17, of East Jordan, received a 15-day county jail sentence from Justice Charles Murphy Monday following his arrest by Police Chief Harry Simmons, who said Rebec was convicted of taking \$15 from the Grace Carney house on Garfield street, May 22.

Justice Murphy gave Rebec six months to repay the \$15 dollars or serve another 30 days.

STRAIGHT FROM THE FIELD FARM GOSSIP COLUMN

Prospects are that the overall economic outlook for farmers will remain quite stable during the balance of 1953. U. S. consumer demand will continue high. Foreign demand will change little. Farmers will market about the same total quantity of products as last year. The net earnings of Michigan farm account cooperators declined about one-third from 1951 to 1952. Cash incomes were just as high as for the year earlier, but inventory-value declines caused the drop. Net earnings will drop further in 1953, reflecting a continuation of the cost-price squeeze.

Flush June milk production will prevent any strengthening in dairy product prices. However, there should be some seasonal price increase beginning in July.

Prices will continue high during June, especially for good quality eggs. Lower quality and ungraded eggs may show some price weakness.

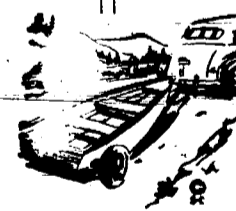
