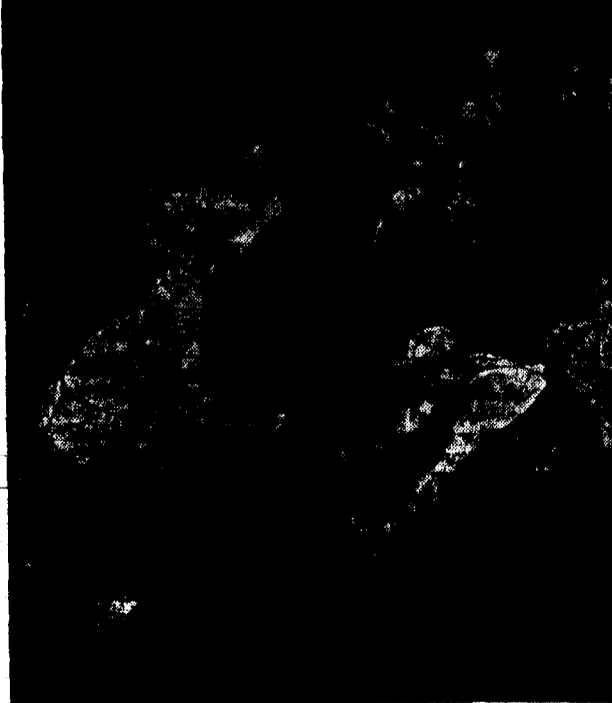
Profits Tax Bad!

Economists, businessmen, and Treasury Secretary Humphrey all agree that the excess profits tax is bad. This tax is a heavy and unfair burden on a large sector of business. It inflicts especially severe punishment on small new companies which prosper and try to expand. They are vulnerable because the law bases "normal earnings" on the average for the best three years in the 1946-49 period. When their earnings in that period were small, E. P. T. stands ready to grab 32 cents of each "extra" profit dollar. E. P. T. is a poor revenue producer. It prevents the creation of new jobs and slows community growth. It holds back the development and manufacture of new products. The sooner we get rid of E. P. T., the better.

Vacation Wrap Help Plants When You're Away

The day when vacationers had to ask neighbors to water their plants for them is gone. A sheet of plastic will do the job these days.

Developed by a Michigan State college graduate student, the wrap will keep a plant healthy for up to three weeks with out watering.

Dale V. Sweet, graduate assistant in horticulture at M. S. C., reports squares of the plastic, either polyethylene or polyvinyl, will keep a plant healthy at room temperature for "two or three weeks, depending on the plant."

"Some plants are more hardy than others," Sweet says. "A geranium will last three weeks without any damage."

Potted plants lose moisture through the porous pots. A sheet of plastic wrapped around the pot stops this—and retains the moisture. Loss of water through the leaves is insignificant, according to Sweet.

He discovered his "vacation wrap" while experimenting with the plastic's ability to grow plants without soil. The plastic is much the same as is used to wrap food in home freezers. The film allows the exchange of gases—oxygen and carbon dioxide—but it prevents the water vapor from passing through.

To use the "vacation wrap" a plant, a sheet of plastic is wrapped around the pot and fastened at the base of the stem with a rubber band, but not tightly. The leaves are left exposed. A hole should be cut at the bottom of the wrap, allowing excess water to drain.

Air layering plastics are now sold commercially for this purpose.

In pressure canning, before closing the canner vent be sure steam pours out for at least ten minutes so all air is driven from the canner.

4,000 To Enroll In State College Summer School

Michigan State College's 40th annual Summer School will begin Thursday, June 25, with an estimated 4,000 students enrolled.

Registration will be held June 23 and 24 for the six-week and nine-week sessions. The six-week session ends July 31 and the nine-week session Aug. 21. The summer faculty will include 50 visiting professors and educators from other universities and colleges.

All college departments will be in full operation during the nine-week session and 24 special work shops for teachers and administrators will be offered during the summer.

Classes will begin on June 23 at Leelanau, in Leland, Michigan for MSC's popular Summer Art School, which will continue thru July 31.

The school, established in 1939 will be directed by Prof. Erling Brauner. The Leelanau studio, donated to the college by the women's club of Leland, is situated on the picturesque channel which connects Lake Leelanau with Lake Michigan and offers a variety of subject matter for artists.

Grass Silage Crop To Boom In Michigan

Grass silage for feeding is growing in popularity in Michigan. Karl A. Vary, agricultural economist at Michigan State college says that about 11,000 Michigan farmers will be harvesting grass silage this year as compared to about 500 in 1948.

Vary reports that a recent survey showed 95 per cent of the farmers putting up grass silage were using field choppers, one of the easiest and quickest methods of harvesting the crop.

Vary believes a farmer can afford a small field chopper if he operates it 80 hours annually. The machines can also be used for chopping straw and corn silage and many owners help pay for their machines by doing custom work.

A new television program aimed at rural families, is being released by Michigan State College to six Michigan TV stations. Called "Country Crossroads," the program features such things as lawn care, fishing, freezing strawberry jam, handling bulk milk, keeping eggs in the summer, and outdoor cooking.

Trout Studies



During recent years, conservation department fisheries workers have been actively engaged in trout population studies on certain streams of the state. Here, two men are censusing Hunt Creek, one of the special streams being used in the continuous study. Trout are easily captured after being momentarily stunned by means of an electrical "shocker." After being weighed and measured, the fish are released where taken. Information gained from such studies helps develop better fishing in Michigan.

Saving Great In Made-Over Duds For Kids

Look at some of those out-dated clothes in your closet with an eye to making them over for children, or grandchildren, suggests Lola Belle Green, clothing specialist at Michigan State college. Out dated clothes can be made attractive and they're a big money saver.

Consider the material in an old garment first, she advises. Is it suitable for the child in color, texture and design? As a general rule firm, closely-woven fabrics that are light in weight and soft to the touch are best for a child's clothing needs. Gay colors are much better than drab or harsh shades that adults sometimes wear (and shouldn't).

Check on the present condition of the old garment. Sometimes the old article is so worn it would not be practical to remake it for a child.

Miss Green recommends making the new garment along the lines of the old one if possible. A small boy's trousers can easily be cut from a pair of man's trousers, but you will have more of a problem cutting trousers from a woman's gored skirt.

Get a good, standard pattern for your make-overs, recommends Miss Green. And remember, children's patterns should be selected by chest measurement, rather than by age. Rip the old garment apart complete using scissors or a razor blade. Wash the material but before that stitch around the edges of the garment pieces to prevent fraying or stretching. Use matching thread and stitch not more than one-fourth inch from the edge of the material. This stitching remains in the material in the construction of the garment.

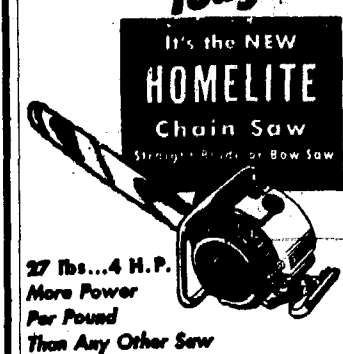


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How To Scald Vegetables For Freezing

Is it better to use steam or boiling water for scalding vegetables before home freezing?

Michigan State College foods specialists say that research shows it depends on the vegetable.

Three green vegetables, peas, asparagus and broccoli, have been tested with both methods by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

On the other hand, broccoli which had been steam-scalded was more palatable and had more nutritive value than water-scalded broccoli. The asparagus was as good scalded with steam as with boiling water.

Proper scalding is most important in preparing vegetables for freezing. Vegetables which are not properly scalded will lose flavor and color in storage.

Scalding vegetables for freezing is a delicate process. It must be enough to stop enzyme activity, but not enough to soften the vegetables and give them a cooked flavor. Steaming vegetables takes about 50 per cent longer than using boiling water.

For asparagus the time required is three minutes in boiling water, or five minutes in steam.

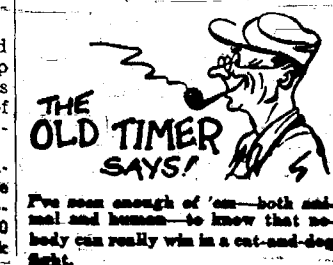

Continued from Page 1 replace with the present brick warehouse, 80 feet wide by 240 feet long.

In 1927 a string bean line for whole and out wax and green beans was installed which was completely modernized in 1936. Now the progress of the string beans through the plant from storage floor to boxing of the cans is continuous with the exception of one stop.

In 1930 a complete beet and carrot canning line was set up to take care of about 50 acres of beets and about 20 acres of carrots. The company began canning asparagus in 1944.

Through expanding and developing new canning processes the company has grown to where today it employs more than 200 people from this area at peak seasons.



The film was produced by the conservation organization with help from the department.

Outdoor Work Shop Starts At Soo Next Monday, June 22

Enrollment has started for the annual Munuscong conservation laboratory sponsored by the Northern Michigan College of Education.

The nature workshop is located 25 miles south of Sault Ste. Marie where, each year, two conservation sessions are held. Last year a class of about 30 teachers and college students interested in the out-of-doors earned college credits at the camp.

Staff and lectures are professional conservationists from the department, the U. S. Soil Conservation Service and from Northern Michigan College.

Graduate credit may be earned for work at the camp for the first time this year. Undergraduate credit will also be given again this year, as usual.

In an ideal area for conservation study, the Munuscong camp is close to a number of rock and land formations, plant cover types and wildlife areas. Field trips are made to state and federal research projects in the area and to Drummond Island.

The first session, lasting six weeks, starts June 22. The final three-week session begins August 3.

Further information may be obtained by writing the registrar at Northern Michigan College, Marquette, or to George Butler, director of the laboratory.

When there is a heavy sprinkling of bloom in the field, alfalfa should be cut as soon as possible, according to Stephen T. Dexter, a farm crops specialist at Michigan State College. The hay then will have more protein than later cut alfalfa.

Detailed drawings of each fish type will give anglers a ready identification key for use while fishing.

A central two-page fishing map indicates location of fish types by regions as found within the state and types of baits generally used in taking the fish are listed in the text.

The booklet was released for distribution early this week.

Small Scale Potato Growing Doesn't Pay

Small scale commercial potato growing no longer is economical in Michigan since new techniques in production have become common according to a Michigan State College potato specialist.

MORE SPUDS — LESS GROWERS
D. L. Clananhan says potato production has become concentrated

in fewer hands and it has become a specialty with growers. Now, less than 4 percent of the growers are producing 60 percent of the crop.

Acre costs have gone up Clananhan points out, and present day producers can't hazard the lower yields of their forefathers. The efficient producer, he reminds, helps his crop along.

HOW THEY DO IT
He selects the best variety for quality and yield and seed stock that is free of disease and in good condition.

He uses as large an amount of the right analysis fertilizer as possible.

He prepares the right kind of seedbed with the use of green manures and early planting for maturity quality.

SPRAYS OFTEN

He protects his crop from disease and insect injury by frequent and careful spraying. This may mean spraying every few days instead of every week or 10 days.

He uses careful harvesting and storing methods so that, through grading and packaging, the consumer will receive a satisfactory product.

ORCHARD NOTES

By C. Fairman

Working about the orchard, it is quite noticeable that fruit trees on the outside rows are larger, better—especially old trees; also trees that stand singly out by themselves perform better and produce better fruit.

According to this there would be an advantage in planting trees at a greater distance apart.

We have montgomery trees 50 years old and sweets that are 36 years old.

We note that the cherry growing industry is growing considerable in the East Jordan district. Crops of cherries are more regular here than in southern Michigan or even New York state. Their crop in New York is reported to be light this year.

Our crop report on this farm at this date is as follows:

Cherries, Sweet and Tart, very good; also apples, pines, pears and plums.

Peaches, fair and not heavy. Quince, crabapple, fair. Apricots, very light.

Michigan State college specialists recommend that eggs be washed just before using—not when they are stored. Egg shells are porous they say.

With Your COUNTY FARM AGENT

Farmers from Charlevoix county, Ed Rebman county agriculture agent said today, will attend the Grass Day on Wednesday, June 24th in Kalkaska county. It will start at 9:30 a.m. and will be at the Jenkins Brothers farm, located 2 miles south of Kalkaska on road 66 and two miles east.

Seeding, fertilizing and management practices will be stressed during morning tours and there also will be discussions and inspections of emergency pasture, special crops and silage. Insect and disease and weed control will be other features. A special feature will be a demonstration on liquid nitrogen and also the erection of the up-right silo.

Farm equipment displays and machinery operation will be very worthwhile for farmers to see, points out Robert G. White, Michigan State College extension specialist in agriculture engineering. Mr. White, member of the MSC Grass Days Committee, has been contacting the various farm equipment companies and expects a good turnout. An interesting feature, he notes, will be a wagon complete with cross-conveyor unloader — "all automatic, just turn on the power take-off and go sit under a tree."

White expects most machine units to make the tour of all seven Grass Day locations and lists those slated for field demonstration as balers, haycrushers, field choppers—both from the swath and direct, with cutter bar, wagon unloaders and blowers.

Even though it may seem just a short time since spring fertilizer was applied, the grass may

need another booster now. If your grass isn't dark green and growing rapidly, one pound of 12-6-6 or 10-6-4 per 100 square feet will help, according to James Tyson, a Michigan State college soil science specialist in turf grasses.

He advises applying fertilizer evenly over an area of 200-500 square feet at a time. The grass should be watered immediately after application of the fertilizer to prevent burning.

If the lawn is shady, Tyson recommends that the fertilizer should be added once a month during the growing season. Here are some of his other recommendations:

Mowing is important to good lawn care. If you have a one-inch lawn, it shouldn't grow to more than one and a half inches before it is mowed.

Kentucky bluegrass and red fescue lawns should be kept at about one and one-half inches on sunny lawns and from two to three inches in shady areas.

Water grass only when it needs it. Water when the leaves are slightly wilted and one good soaking is enough until the grass starts wilting again.

If you want your ceiling to seem lower, paint it with warm or dark hues

State Bank Helps Farmers At College

Michigan banks including the State Bank of East Jordan are offering \$100 scholarships to boys and girls who want to take a short course in agriculture or economics at Michigan State College this fall.

This is the fourth year the bankers have donated money for the eight-week course. This year Michigan Banks are offering 234 scholarships for the term which starts October 26.

Robert Dennis, MSC short course instructor, says those attending will spend about two thirds of their time on either agriculture or home economics. Remainder will be devoted to rural leadership, family living, parliamentary procedure and public speaking. They are also entitled to see Big Ten events like football and basketball and participate in other campus activities. Applications are available at the county farm Agents office.

Don't Cut Foliage On Hardy Bulbs Farm Agent Says

Don't cut the foliage of tulips, hyacinths, lilies or other hardy bulbs until it turns yellow.

That's a tip from Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent. He explains that cutting the foliage of bulbous plants too early injures the bulb and lessens the chance of flowering the next year.

County Agent Rebman also passes along these other tips from C. E. Wildon, Michigan State College horticulturist:

Don't cut the green foliage German iris unless you are digging for transplanting. Digging and transplanting iris should be done between August 1 and 15.

Wait until August, too, for transplanting oriental poppies.

Spray or dust your roses for control of mildew and black spot. Do it often to keep the foliage covered throughout the season. A fast containing ferriate, sulfur, DDT and rotenone should be used.

Don't let the delphiniums go to seed after flowering unless you want seed. Cut the delphinium stalks back to the basal leaves. New growth will start and give you a second crop of flowers. Do not fail to water them during dry spells.

Don't let sweet Williams go to seed if you want it to survive the winter.

Hog Market

The summer hog market looks good. Slaughter probably will continue to run 10 to 15 per cent behind last year. In addition, there was one-third less pork in cold storage in March than a year ago, Michigan State College farm economists point out.

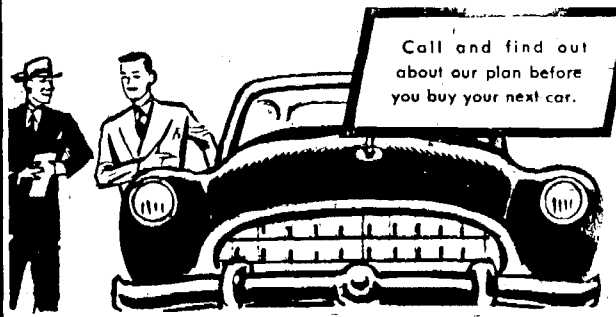

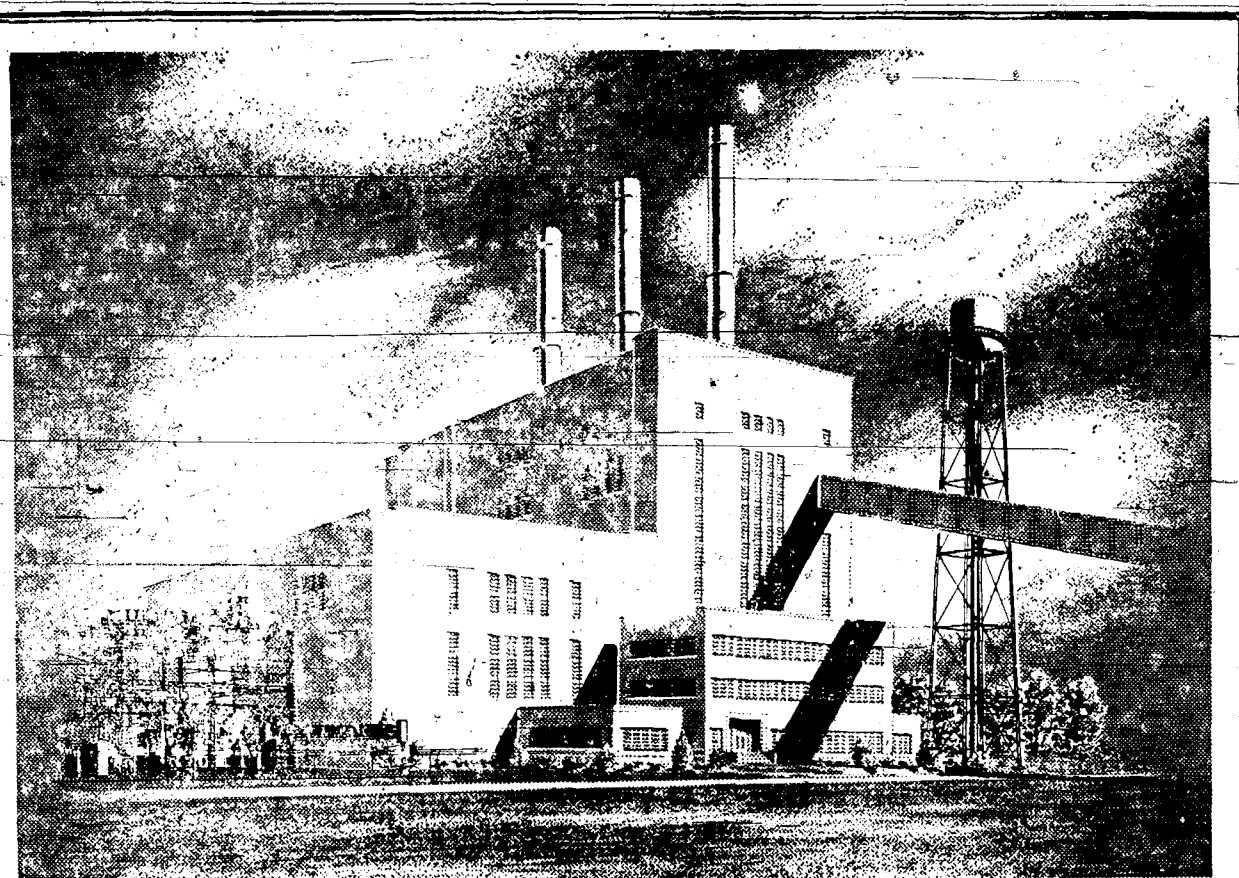

Know Fabrics Before Going To Cleaners

Forewarned is definitely forearmed when it comes to the problem of dry cleaning certain kinds of fabrics, advises Sarah Brier, textiles researcher at Michigan State College.

She reminds that Americans spend over a billion dollars annually for dry cleaning services and yet know very little about the reaction of different fabrics and trimmings to the processes necessary in cleaning them.

Trimming often causes trouble, she points out. Some plastic buttons melt and some fade on the garments and the dye cannot be removed. Often metal backing on covered buttons will rust. Miss Brier believes it is wise to remove those questionable trimmings before sending the garment to the dry cleaners.

Stiffness is a characteristic of many fabrics today. Unfortunately that stiffness is often lost in cleaning because it is merely applied to the surface of the fabric. Embossed designs on fabrics sometimes are bugbears for the dry cleaner, too. Often, use of standard dry cleaning procedures causes the embossed design to fade, even though it has been labeled "permanent."

Silk organdy, or "organza," sometimes causes trouble because the light weight silk or highly twisted yarns loses its stiff, crisp feel in dry cleaning.

There is a loss of body in cleaning most shantung, Miss Brier advises, unless the shantung is of good quality.

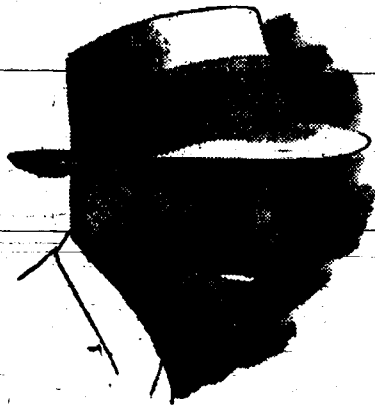

Lighting Safety Tips Are Offered

Do you know what is the safest place during a thunderstorm?

These suggestions on what to do when a thunderstorm comes are from Harvey E. Kappahn of Michigan State College's agricultural engineering department.

Don't go out of doors or stay out unless it is necessary. Stay inside a building where it's dry, preferably away from fireplaces, stoves and other objects made of metal. In all cases stay away from open doors and windows.

If you're outside and have a choice of shelter, the best place to go is a large metal or metal frame building. In line of choice the next best is a house or other building that is protected against lightning. Next best is a large unprotected building and last, a small unprotected building.

If you have to stay out of doors, keep away from small sheds and shelters—if they are in an exposed location. Also, keep away from isolated trees, wire fences, hilltops and wide open spaces.

It's a good idea to seek a shelter in a cave, a depression in the ground, a deep valley or canyon, the foot of a steep overhanging cliff, dense woods or a grove of trees.

If you are in an automobile with an all-metal body, you're practically safe from lightning.

All these products are processed, put into containers, packaged and tested by the State Health Department and then made available to all residents of this county through their attending physicians any place in the state.

Local doctors join with the Michigan Health Department in urging that residents of this community volunteer now so that sufficient plasma and fractions will be available to Charlevoix county during the next year.

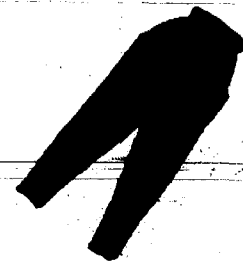
