Businessmen Told To Sell Area Industrial Advantages

Know all the industrial advantages of Northern Michigan and then sell these advantages to prospective industrialists, was an important suggestion at a meeting of the Northwest Michigan Industrial Development Council in Charlevoix Saturday night.

Ralph Hess, of Charlevoix, Cressy Campbell, council secretary, and Harris Miller, of the State Department of Economic Development, stressed the fact that people in the north country must learn all there is to know about their communities and this area and do an effective job of selling.

Al Hathaway, of the New Home Coach Company, of Central Lake said, "There seems to be plenty of labor up here."

People, Hathaway said, come north to work for a sharp decrease in wages just to be able to live in the north country.

William VanRaaphorst, general manager, American Mold Engineering, of Charlevoix, said: "We find a clean, open mind toward industry up here. The attitude toward industry in general is better here than at any point in the country where we have our plants."

VanRaaphorst added that his company has experienced a decided increase in productivity per man compare to workers in the southern part of the state.

It was reported that 12 new industrial plants have located within in the area served by the industrial council within the past year—one plant per month.

Miller told the group that the State Department of Economic Development has made five plant locations within the last six months.

Council President Ward Stubbs, of Frankfort reported that his city had just signed a lease for a new factory.

Mayor Chris Taylor told council members that East Jordan is very close to signing a contract with a firm which will hire around 150 people.

Dallas Darling, of Darling Motor Freight, Grand Rapids, discussed transportation service in western Michigan. He said every transportation company is more than willing to sit down with plant executives and discuss the industrialists transport problems. Discussing the question of pro-

Civil Service Exam Announce For Post Office Position

A Civil Service examination for permanent appointment in the East Jordan post office to positions as substitute clerk-carriers has been announced by J. A. Connor, Director of the Seventh U. S. Civil Service Region. Starting pay is \$1.61 1/2 an hour with opportunity for advancement. Additional compensation is provided for night work and for authorized over time.

Competition in this examination is restricted to residents of East Jordan and persons now employed in the East Jordan post office who are between the ages of 18 and 50. These age limits are waived for veterans. Persons now holding temporary or indefinite appointments should file for this examination if they wish to be considered for permanent appointment.

A written test is required of all applicants.

Applications should be filed with the Director, Seventh U. S. Civil Service Region, New Post Office Bldg., Chicago 7, Illinois, and will be accepted until the close of business August 24, 1953.

Full information and application cards may be obtained from the Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners at the Post Office.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford L. Bailey, the mishap occurred on the road near their farm.

East Jordan residents and merchants this week were offering contributions to aid the stricken family.

The East Jordan fire department was called to obtain enough men to lift the machine off the boy. It was discovered upside down and resting upon his body. It was not learned how the accident occurred.

Transferred to Charlevoix hospital, the attending physician Dr. John Savory, of East Jordan, said the youth died from the injuries about 3 p.m.

Richard was a senior at East Jordan high school and a member of the track team.

In addition to his father and mother he leaves three sisters: Nancy and Carol, 13 year old twins; and Margie, 3 years old.

Richard's father, who is employed by the East Jordan Iron Works, was in southern Michigan at the time of the accident. He was rushed home but the youth died before he arrived.

Iron Works Construction Well Underway

New construction at the East Jordan Iron Works will be finished in September, Ted Malpass said Wednesday.

The 76 x 171 foot concrete block addition will house pattern storage and offer additional manufacturing space for the foundry.

Cecil Murray is in charge of construction, the foundry's second major expansion in the last two years. The present machine shop was built then.

Footings for the building are in, Malpass said, and workers will start laying block very soon.

Employing 105 men now, Malpass said the new building will also make room available if additional personnel is required in the future.

Would Stop Postal Printed Envelopes

Unless publishers and printers take action to support House Bill 537, prohibiting the post office department from printing envelopes, the measure probably will die in committee, according to G. R. Johnston editor and publisher of the (Missouri) Kirksville Graphic.

Johnston said reports sent him by Sen. Stuart Symington and Rep. Clarence Cannon both of Missouri, revealed that the Post Office department is vigorously opposing the measure, as it has for the past 20 years.

"This opposition, coupled with lack of support from publishers throughout the nation," said Mr. Johnston, "will prevent hearings unless publishers of weeklies and small dailies who depend upon

commercial printing to supplement meager advertising revenues, do something.

"There is no more flagrant example of government competing with private business than this," he declared. "In our town, the three banks alone buy \$1,000 envelopes annually. All over the country merchants use the slogan 'keep your money at home,' but buy their envelopes from Washington. Supporting a huge number of printers in Washington does little to help the taxpayer at home."

To encourage support for HR 537, Mr. Johnston has started a mail campaign, asking five publishers each, writing five other publishers to urge them to write the bill. In this way," he said, "no one published would be put to great expense in furthering the campaign."

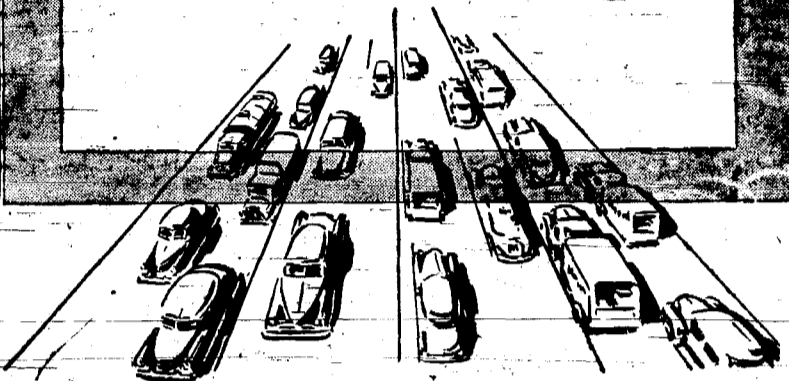

Set Hearing For Milk Laws

The Commission of Agriculture has set a public hearing for July 6, at 1:30 p.m., in the chamber of the House of Representatives in the Capitol Building, Lansing. Charles Figy, Director of Agriculture said the hearing was for the purpose of receiving testimony on proposed amendments to Department of Agriculture Regulation No. 403, commonly known as the Fortified Milk Regulation. Proposed amendments to the regulation concern the addition of vitamins, minerals and non-fat milk solids to milk and skimmed milk.

A 1952 amendment to the law provides for adding additional vitamins, plus minerals and non-fat milk solids to milk and skimmed milk. The amounts of these vitamins, minerals and non-fat milk solids to be added must be approved by regulation of the Department. Present regulations and laws permit the addition of vitamin D to milk and the addition of vitamins A and D and non-fat milk solids to skimmed milk.

According to Ted Stebbins and the Press, we may get from 7 1/2 to 9 cents per pound for red tart cherries, and of course, most of us are hoping for 8.

For sweets marchino, men say from 8 to 10 cents. No prices quoted for canning sweets except that more growers will take more sweets to factories this year as the price will warrant it.

Our danger on red tart cherries at this time is hail, wind and yellows. On the sweets, excessive rain during harvest time may crack too many. So we cannot count our chickens before they are hatched. The actual tonnage will not be known until after harvest. After federal grading, there may not be as many cherries canned as are now estimated, although the crop looks good at the present time.

It is time to stop cultivating. It was found that too many cherry trees grow too late in the season to fully ripen up for some early freeze in November. Especially where manure and green cover crops were used.

This is a truly good cherry section. Much better than Wisconsin or Southern Michigan. Either for sweets or tarts.

With Your COUNTY FARM AGENT

You can protect your wheat from grain insects during storage by use of a new chemical, but it should be used only when granaries have been thoroughly cleaned and treated with an insecticide before storage.

That's a tip from Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

The chemical is a pyrethrum-piperonyl - butoxide - combination insecticide. It doesn't poison the wheat when instructions are followed on the label, Rebman says. There are various methods of applying the wheat protectant, and detailed descriptions of how to do it are available at County Agent Rebman's office or from the entomology department at Michigan State College.

Extension Entomologist Ray James of MSC says that there are "things still to learn" about wheat protectant. But, he adds, the material has been used successfully in Michigan and other states where it has been tried.

He advises that you use care in applying the chemical and be sure it is mixed well with the wheat. He suggests using a little extra chemical on the floor, especially at the edges of the bins and also in the top foot of the piled wheat.

And, he cautions, farmers using the material need to inspect their grain once a month to see whether there are insects in the grain. He says the chemical is not very effective once the insects are found in the grain. When insects are in the grain, he adds, use of fumigant.

Chlordane is the best thing on the market today for the control of crabgrass in your lawn, reminds Ed Rebman, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

Rebman says it's much better than straight kerosene because oil - base chlordane will wipe out the lawn pest with one application. Three applications are needed with kerosene.

B. H. Grigsby, Michigan State college plant physiologist, recommends applying the chlordane about July 1 on established lawns. For the 40 per cent concentrate it takes one pint in a gallon of oil—a water-white grade of kerosene. If you use the 72 per cent concentrate only a half pint is needed per gallon of kerosene. Both will cover 1,000 square feet of lawn. The MSC specialist advises that the chemical should not be used on new seedings of grass until the last part of July.

Some of the fescue grasses, especially chewings fescue, will whiten after the application but they will not die out. White clover will be defoliated but not harmed otherwise. It comes back quickly. The chemical does not affect grasses like Kentucky bluegrass and bent grass, however. Chlordane has other advantages.

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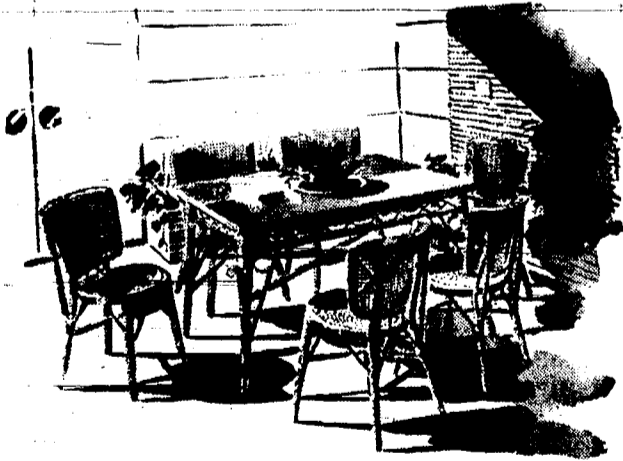
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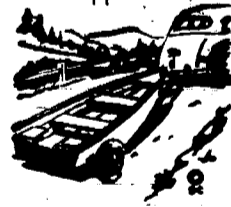
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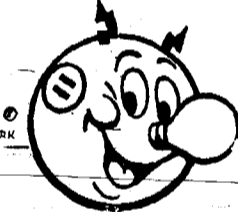
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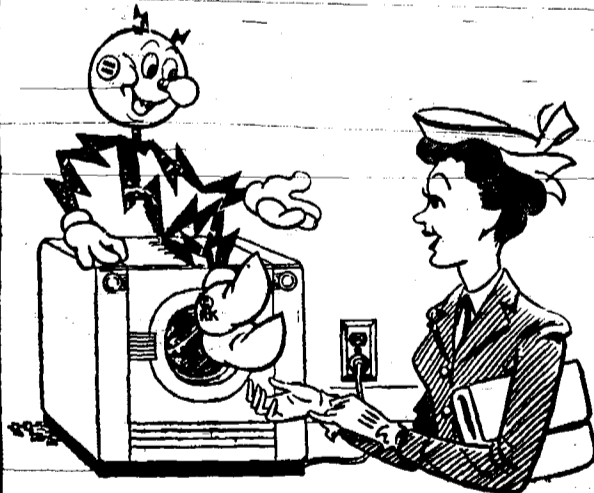
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Dora Dougherty Married To Glen Murray Here

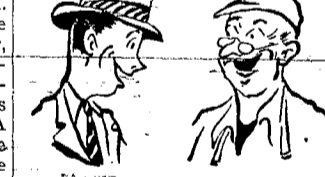
