A-Bomb Hits West Michigan

If you read such a headline or heard a newscaster make such a statement tomorrow morning, your first reaction might well be "What can I do? Where do I volunteer to help?"

Charlevoix County Civil Defense Director, Joseph P. Wilkins of East Jordan, announced this week that there will be a meeting in the American Legion Home in East Jordan at 8 p.m. Wednesday, July 29 for people in this area who are interested in Civil Defense. U. S. Air Force personnel will be there to show motion pictures explaining ground observation work. Everyone is invited to attend.

The bomb has already dropped. It fell on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. It exploded over the White Sands Proving Ground. It reverberated around the world when it detonated "somewhere in the Soviet Union."

"But we're protected by radar," you say.

Are we? No. It's a simple statement of fact from the U. S. Air Force that there are very dangerous gaps in our radar screen. To build an impenetrable fence around our country would cost more money than we can afford.

"Then, what are we doing to protect ourselves against a sudden attack if our radar system only partially screens us?"

To cover those blind spots, the Air Force has developed the Civilian Ground Observer Corps to observe and report unusual aircraft activity, and in addition to determine types of aircraft, actions, and other things radar can not see.

"What can I do to help?" Your help is needed. In Western Michigan we need many, many more volunteers, men, women, and teen-agers to enroll in the Ground Observer Corps. And you are needed immediately.

Our Ground Observer Corps in Western Michigan, like radar, has dangerous gaps in it. (Continued on page 8)

Work Would Cost About \$16,000, State Advises Council

The Michigan State Waterways Commission has informed the City Council that a new city dock would cost about \$16,000.

A letter to the council from the commission explains the financing and work to be done to obtain a new dock here. The letter follows:

Gravel Named President Of Bankers' Group

Baker of the Traverse City State Bank, Directors, William VanVorst of the Traverse City State Bank, W. Reed Chaplin of the First Peoples State Bank of Traverse City, H. Elgas of Cadillac State Bank, J. Neumann of heboygan State Savings Bank, C. B. Neeland of the Antrim county Savings Bank in Mancelona, K. Baya of the First State Bank of Petoskey, N. E. Glasser of the Gaylord State Bank, L. Hanson of the Manistee County Savings Bank and W. Stubbins of the Frankfort State Savings Bank.

The work contemplated provides for a dock 104 ft. long 18 ft. wide, with an "L" projecting southerly. This extension is 10 ft. wide and 30 ft. long. In addition, we suggest three catwalks to be placed inside the "L", the first one being located approximately 38 ft. inboard of the extension. Each catwalk would provide for two boat-wells, the total of three catwalks would give space for seven vessels. The advisability of No. 3 catwalk depends entirely upon the depth of the water in the east end of the dock. I do not have this information but have included it in my computation so as to arrive at a maximum figure for material and labor. If this has to be deleted because of the shallowness, space for two boats will be lost and other necessary changes in utilities would have to be made.

Representatives of the Ottawa Indians will be included in the cast along with members of the Heoka-Waapi Society. Scenes to be presented are in five episodes beginning with the Peace Pipe Gitchie Manito; the Mighty One in Council; Hiawatha's Childhood; The Wooling Scene; the Wedding Feast and Hiawatha's Departure will follow in order. The Naming Ceremony honoring incoming white men into the Ottawa is highlight of the pageant which presents original costumes, the dress of the Indians, their legend and story.

Before turning the first shovel of earth, Mr. Willis said that "this is indeed a day of thanksgiving. . . first to God, the source of all good, and then to the good people of Charlevoix, residents and summer visitors alike, who have been so generous in the support of the hospital building program and finally to the federal government, without whose aid it would not have been possible to have as fine a hospital."

Following Mr. Willis, each speaker then turned a shovel of earth to conclude the ground breaking ceremony.

Dr. Louis L. Mann of the Sinai Congregation in Chicago offered benediction to close the program.

Music for the event was played by the Charlevoix high school band directed by C. A. Ormark.

The construction of the new hospital is now underway with the Lake Construction Co. building footings for the 44-bed structure which will cost an estimated \$600,000 when completed and equipped.

Growers May Apply For Loans 30 Days After Storing Crop

Price support at a national average of \$2.21 a bushel to farmers for 1953 crop wheat has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Last year's average was \$2.20 a bushel.

Wheat parity price as of July 1, 1953 is \$2.42 a bushel, as compared with August 15, 1952 wheat parity of \$2.46, which was used as the basis for establishing the minimum support for 1953 crop wheat. Since 90 percent of parity as of July 1, 1953 is lower than \$2.21, the minimum price support of \$2.21 announced last September applies.

Only wheat grading No. 3 or better, or No. 4 or No. 5 because of test weight or because it contains wheat of the classes Durum and/or Red Curum, will be eligible for loan or purchase agreement. The loans will be available through January, 1954, and will mature April 30, 1954 or earlier on demand. Purchase agreements may be entered into and mature on these same dates. Loans and purchase agreements covering 1953-crop wheat are available from Production and Marketing Administration County Committees.

In recipes calling for cake flour, Michigan State college nutritionists believe it is important to follow the directions. They explain that cake flour differs from all-purpose flour in quantity and quality of the protein and, therefore, in scientific combination of ingredients, cake flour is important when called for.

Charlevoix County support rate is \$2.16 per bushel as compared with \$2.15 per bushel in 1952. Only seven of all of Charlevoix county's wheat growers took advantage of the price support program in 1952 by taking out loans and purchase agreements.

Before applying for either a loan or purchase agreement on 1953-crop wheat the crop must be stored for 30 days in a safe storage. A good bin has a tight roof, screened windows, protection from rats, mice and animals, a damp proofed floor and good ventilation.

Any farmer who does not have such a bin or building may obtain a Farm Facility Storage loan up to 80 percent of the total cost and in the meantime use a temporary storage until this is constructed. Inquire about this Farm Facility Storage loan at the Charlevoix County PMA Committee office in Boyne City.

In caring for nylon garments Michigan State college home economists recommend washing machine or automatic washer. They warn, however, that nylon tends to pick up dyes from other fabrics.

Michigan Farmers Urged To Furnish Feed For Drought Areas

Michigan farmers are being called upon to come to the aid of their drought-suffering Southwest neighbors needing hay or pasture.

Work is starting immediately in every Michigan county to find how much surplus hay there is that could be shipped, under government orders, to the Southwest, where cattle are thinning and falling for lack of grazing moisture.

"We need action right now," stresses D. B. "Woody" Varner, director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Michigan State college. "Action in a couple weeks will be too late. The cattle will be too far gone to help," says the former Texan, well-acquainted with the inroads of drought.

Aid of the M.S.C. extension staff, including the county agricultural agents, has been asked by the federal extension director, C. M. Ferguson, an official member of the emergency U. S. Department of Agricultural Committee. Director Varner immediately commissioned E. A. Wenner, district extension supervisor for north Michigan, to head the special project.

"Farmers should contact their county agricultural agents... not wait for him to contact them... if they have surplus hay or pasture," notes Wenner. "The agents will want to know how many tons of hay, what kind and quality it is, and the price. We're primarily interested in hay that it baled and ready to move out now... but also will want figures on hay that will be ready later."

Farmers with excess pasture also should contact agents with the number of acres, kind of pasture and its livestock-carrying capacity. Cattle can be shipped north for grazing on this excess pasture under two plans: (1) Out-right rental; (2) Sharing in the calf sale proceeds on a cow and calf grazing arrangement. Hay sale and pasture contracts will be made between Michigan farmers and individuals in the Southwest who need the aid.

Sagging cottons can be revived with a gelatin solution bath, say Michigan State college clothing specialists. Dissolve a tablespoon of plain gelatin in a little cold water and then add a gallon of hot water to make the solution.

MICHIGAN OUTDOORS NEWS

A year long research program to teach hatchery-reared fish how to survive better and longer in the wild will be started in Michigan soon, the conservation department reports.

Three psychologists from Michigan State College have developed a method which they believe will teach hatchery trout to be less gullible to the angler's hook and also to better adapt to stream conditions after planting.

In the past, one of the most vexing problems with hatchery fish has been their low survival ability under stream conditions. Fish reared in the artificial conditions of a hatchery don't know how to fend for themselves, how to avoid predators or how to keep from being so gullible to angler's lures.

Seek Funds

The Northern District Finance Committee Meeting of the Scenic Trails Council will be held in the Library in Boyne City Monday night. Representatives from the various Communities in the five Counties of the Northern District will be present to pledge support to the Council budget of \$48,350.00 for the next fiscal year. The Northern District's share of this budget is 11,290.00. This is roughly a 20% increase over last year and is necessary to continue to operation with an adequate staff.

The four Districts of the Council have held their meetings and over \$38,000.00 has been pledged to date.

Wheat Growers To Vote On Parity Rule

Wheat growers of Charlevoix county will help decide whether the Commodity Credit Corporation loan on the 1954 wheat crop will be 90 percent or 50 percent of parity. According to LeRoy Hardy, chairman of the Charlevoix County Production and Marketing Administration Committee, this is one of the questions which will be answered in the coming wheat marketing quota referendum.

As the chairman explains, if two-thirds or more of the wheat growers voting in the referendum are in favor of it, the wheat

marketing quota proclamation made July 1 by Secretary of Agriculture-Ezra Taft Benson will be in effect. The present 90 percent of parity Commodity Credit Corporation wheat loan then will continue for the 1954 crop.

These support rates will be available, however, only to farmers who do not exceed their wheat acreage allotment. The chairman points out that marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, growers who plant more than their acreage allotment will be subject to a penalty on their excess wheat unless it is stored or disposed of as directed by the Secretary of Agriculture. If quotas are disapproved there is no assurance of any price support for growers who overplant.

Farmers Reminded To Cast Ballots For PMA Committeemen

Farmers of Charlevoix county were reminded today that PMA farmer-committee elections will close July 28, 1953. LeRoy Hardy, Chairman of the county PMA committee, in issuing this final election call, urges all eligible farmers to vote. Community committeemen, a delegate to the county convention to name the 1954 county committee, and alternates will be elected at this time.

Hardy reminds farmers that farming in Charlevoix county has come a long way in the past 15 years and that the work of these committeemen and the programs they administer have played an important part in the program. He cites the soil and water conservation work that has been done under the Agricultural Conservation Program as an indication of the progress.

As the chairman sees it, because the work of these committeemen means so much to farming in Charlevoix County and because the programs they administer are so essential to the welfare of all the people, no farmer who is eligible to vote should allow this election to pass without casting his ballot for the committeemen he thinks will do the best job.

Seedlings In Corn Fields Are Valuable

If you want to use that soil between your corn rows, seed rye or sweet clover, suggests a farm crops specialist at Michigan State College.

Herbert R. Pettigrove says the seedlings will help cut down on winter soil erosion and can be plowed under for green manure or used for hay or pasture.

Seedlings between corn rows can be made in several different ways. Some farmers use a seeder on the front of a weeder. One farmer, recalls Pettigrove, attached a seeder to the front of his tractor so he could seed and cultivate in one operation. Other farmers have adjusted grain drills or different types of hand seeders for the operation.

You get the best stand of a seeding, reminds Pettigrove, if the seed is covered only slightly. This is where a weeder or cultivator comes in handy. But if you use a cultivator, make sure that it runs very shallow.

Recommended rates of seeding include a bushel to a bushel and a quarter of rye per acre, eight pounds of alfalfa, 12 to 15 pounds of sweet clover, or a mixture of 10 pounds of sweet clover and three to four pounds of domestic rye grass.

Before seeding, however, he cautions, make sure the seed will germinate by running a germination test.

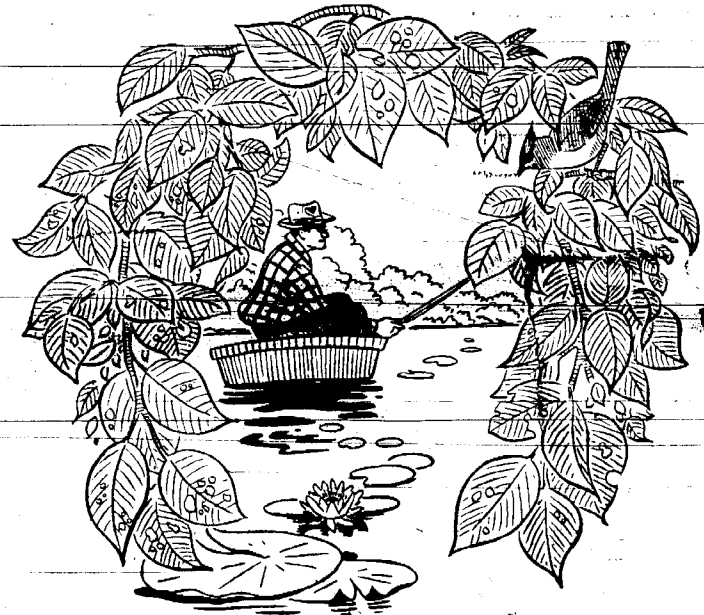

Michigan law requires the project to be checked by a registered engineer. I do not know whether you have an engineer employed so this is a guess at possible costs. Under normal circumstances, where a community in your area does not have engineering services available locally, we would refer the matter to Mr. John Norton at Traverse City.

In regard to financing — our collection of boat license fees have been very poor because of failure of the local law enforcement officers to enforce boat licenses in the same manner as motor vehicle laws are enforced. Consequently we are in no position to advance any moneys and I cannot recommend any expenditure of more than 50% to the Commission, which means that \$8,000 would have to be raised by your community. If this is beyond your financial means at the present time, I would suggest you explore the possibility of constructing this dock next spring.

Please contact me prior to July 17 as our complete construction program for the fiscal year 1953-54 will be established at that time.

Following the meeting the guests were shown through the new Fire Department Building, The Telephone Building and the New Home Coach Company factory which employs 37 people.

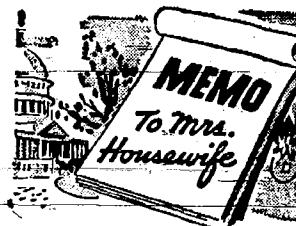

Melon, juicy and ice cold, makes an exceptionally enticing summer dessert. A sherbert glass of melon balls, half honeydew and half canteloupe, topped with Frosted Mayonnaise Squares is a favorite of mine.

How to make mayonnaise squares: Combine 1 cup real mayonnaise with 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped. Fold in 1/4 cup maraschino cherries, chopped, and freeze in a refrigerator tray. Cut in squares and serve on melon balls or other fruit dessert salads. P.S. If you've no melon ball cutter, use one of the spoons in your metal measuring spoon set.

Jewelry experts say "never" to the idea that pearls should be cleaned by dipping them in soapy water. The best and safest way is to carefully wipe them with a damp cloth.

A tip to teen-agers! Did you know your sneakers can be dyed to match your favorite sports ensembles? Just make an all-purpose dye solution of the desired color and apply with a small brush or sponge. Many of the younger set have several pairs dyed in their favorite shades. And occasionally I've seen them wearing two colors.

It's a neat trick to frost a cake without messing up the plate. Arrange squares of waxed paper on cake plate so they will extend about an inch under cake and completely cover plate. Frost, then carefully pull out papers, leaving plate perfectly clean.

Refrigerated Food In Cans Safe To Use

Homemakers are often in doubt about certain factors regarding canned goods.

For instance, the idea that foods spoil when left in opened cans has no foundation, points out Mrs. Hazel C. Amen, nutritionist at Michigan State College. In fact, she states that in some cases it may even be safer to store unused portions in the can in the refrigerator rather than to remove the contents to another container.

However, a refrigerator full of opened, partly filled tin cans doesn't represent very high house-keeping standards.

Any cans of unopened food with bulging ends, known as "swells", should be discarded, stresses Mrs. Amen.

The homemaker may be confused by gradings of canned foods. Price difference are caused by differences in appearance, color, flavor, etc.

It may be more economical to purchase lower grades of canned foods for dishes where the orig-

inal appearance of the food is unimportant . . . as in soups, creamed dishes, scalloped dishes and salads.

Higher grades are desirable when the food is to be served as it comes from the can . . . as in the case of stewed tomatoes or fruits for dessert.

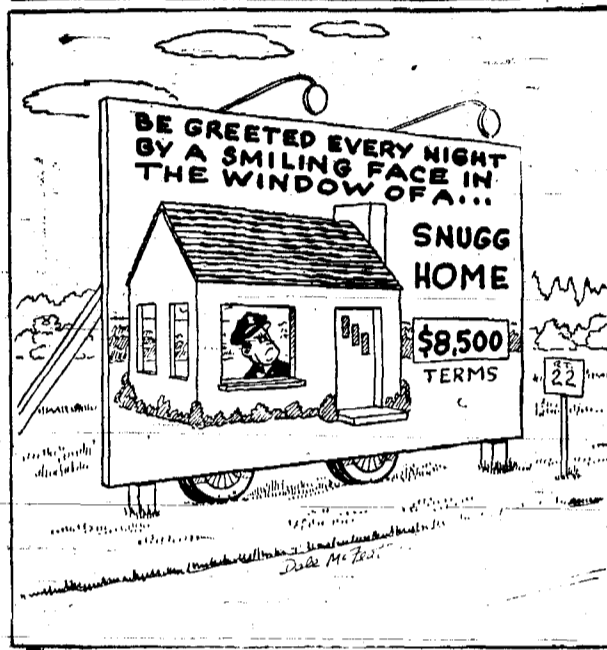

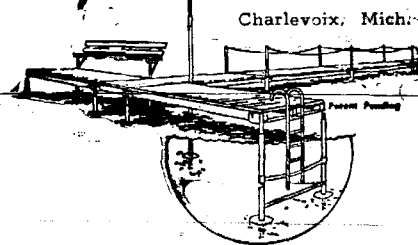

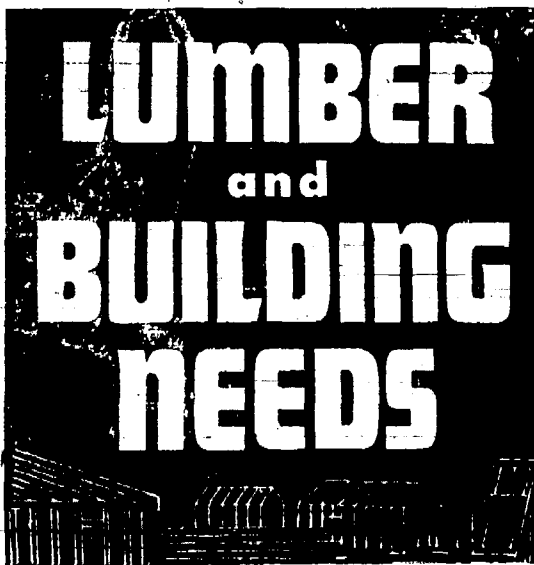
