





# Seedlings In Corn Fields

If you want to use that soil between your corn rows, seed rye or sweet clover, suggests a farm crops specialist at Michigan

Herbert R. Pettigrove says the seedings will help cut down on winter soil erosion and can be plowed under for green manure or used for hay or pasture.

Seedings between corn rows can be made in several different ways. Some farmers use a seeder on the front of a weeder. One farmer, recalls Pettigrove, attached a seeder to the front of his tractor so he could seed and cultivate in one operation. Other farmers have adjusted grain drills or different types of hand seeders for the operation.

reminds Pettigrove, the seed is covered only slightly This is where a weeder or cultivator comes in handy. But if you use a cultivator, make sure that it runs very shallow. Recommended rates of seeding


include a bushel to a bushet and a quarter of rye per acre, eight pounds of alfalfa, 12 to 15 pounds of sweet clover, or a mixture of 10 pounds of sweet clover and three to four pounds of domestic

Before seeding, however, cautions, make sure the seed will germinate by running a germination test.






