

## Community Band readies for annual holiday concert

But when they gather together, their separate identities fuse into one powerful musical voice.

They are the Jordan Valley Community Band - a 36-member group sponsored by the Jordan River Arts Council that is perforing together for their third year.

The public will have an opportunity to enjoy the fruits of the volunteer group's weekly practices next Sunday, Dec. 13, when they present their third annual Christmas Concert. The event gets underway at 3:30 p.m. in the East Jordan High School auditorium.

"We have some really talented people playing with us," stated band director Rita LaVictoire,

# Sheriff reports

## Week of crime ends in arrests

The Charlevoix County Sheriff Department is investigating a week-long area crime spree that ended Sunday morning in Ellsworth.

The incident began with the Nov. 29 theft of a pad of checks from a relative's house by two male juveniles from the St. Ignace tribal reservation.

The pair, both 16-year-olds, stowed away aboard a Greyhound bus from which they disembarked in Charlevoix Tuesday morning. The following day, one was listed as an escapee by Mackinac County Probate Court, and the other was reported to tribal authorities as a runaway by his parents.

The fugitives made it to an East Jordan residence where, with the help of an 18-year-old brother of the runaway, a 1988 Chevrolet Lumina was taken from their grandparents' Phelps Road home.

The vehicle was used for numerous trips around the area, and Saturday night was driven to St. Ignace to pick up another family member, a 13-year-old sister.

The car, which was reported stolen Saturday evening, was stopped in Ellsworth about 11 a.m. the following morning by the Ellsworth Village Marshall.

The Sheriff Department has arrested an 18year-old East Jordan male, a 16-year-old Ellsworth female, the escapee, runaway and the 13-year-old girl on charges including joyriding, larceny in a building, forgery of checks throughout northern Michigan, carrying a concealed weapon, and defrauding the bus line.

Charges against a 17-year-old Ellsworth male are pending.

## Hunter survives deep-woods fall

Bow-hunting west of Central Lake Dec. 4, Tom Youmans, Jr. of Central Lake had an unexpected adventure.

While climbing to his tree blind, he fell 20 feet, injuring his back. Although he did not lose consciousness, he was in extreme pain.

His first inclination was to just lie still until someone came to help. But he soon realized that it was only 3 p.m. and his wife would not become concerned until after dark.

Somehow, he summoned the strength to halfwalk, half-crawl to his car. It took him 30 minutes to cover less than a quarter mile. That accomplished, he managed to drive himself

An ambulance transported him to Munson Medical Center, where X-rays revealed a fractured vertebra.

Youmans is temporarily unable to walk and is recuperating at home. He will return to Munson next week for further tests and final diagnosis and treatment.

## Ellsworth girl hurt

An Ellsworth teen-ager was injured Dec. 4 in a one-car accident.

Antrim County Sheriff Department officials said Jennifer McPherson, 16, was driving westbound on Kiessel Road, about one-quarter mile west of Buhland Road, when she lost control of her vehicle coming out of a curve.

Deputies said the vehicle left the roadway and

struck a tree.

McPherson was transported to Charlevoix Hospital by Life Link Ambulance Service. As of Dec. 7, hospital officials said she was not listed as a patient.







## Offer televised MBA degree classes in Petoskey

business administration program! Residents of the Petoskey area will be able to take classes toward an MBA degree at Western Michigan University this winter via satellite.

WMU is offering the state's only live interactive televised MBA program through the Michigan Information Technology Network (MITN). During the winter semester that runs from January through April, two courses will be taught on campus and beamed to several sites across the state, including North Central Community College.

The courses being offered are: Economics 600, "Applied Economics for Management," from 6 to 9 p.m. Tuesdays; and Finance and Commercial Law 320, "Business Fiance," from

Live from Kalamazoo – it's the master of 6 to 9 p.m. Thursdays. MITN's interactive key pad system or open telephone lines will allow the students at remote locations to ask questions and share information.

In addition, a third class is being offered during the winter semester by special arrangement. Students will be able to take Finance and Commercial Law 380, "Legal Environment," by interactive videotape. They will view videotapes of the course, which was taught by satellite last spring, at their convenience. They also will participate in interactive discussion sessions with the instructor via satellite or telephone conferencing on designated Mondays.

Persons may sign up for one, two or three classes by using WMU's telephone registration system, currently available through any touchtone telephone.

WMU's 33-hour MBA program is accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. More than 85 percent of the MBA students are enrolled part-time while working full-time. Students who follow the sequence through the full cycle of courses should be able to finish their degrees in less than four years.

Any person with a bachelor's degree can apply to the MBA program. Those who have not previously had business courses may be required to complete up to 30 hours of

undergraduate prerequisites, some of which are offered via satellite. Successful completion of the Graduate Management Admission Test also is required.
