

Actually there are two 73 year olds in Ellsworth this year, the farmers exchange and Fred Van Stedum who retired from there in 1982 after 25 years.

Coincidentally the exchange traces its roots to 1919, the year Van Stedum was born. That was the year a group of farmers formed a farmers warehouse and named the co-operative Banks Township Marketing Association.

John Boss of Atwood was hired as manager. He and his family moved to Ellsworth and resided in the Peter Weiland home. The Board of Directors rented the Tom Routley store from F. H. Skow, and started the business of dealers in feeds, grains, fertilizer and all the other commodities farmers use.

New signal to ease intersection woes

The intersection of M-66 and M-32 will soon be controlled with a new stop and go traffic signal installed by the Michigan Transportation Department.

According to East Jordan City Superintendent Bob Johnson, the city requested the state take the necessary steps toward installation because of a history of accidents at the intersection.

After a study revealed marginal need contingent on state criteria, an appeal by the East Jordan Police and Department of Public Works (DPW) persuaded the state to approve the signal.

Also at the Jan. 5 city council meeting, Superintendent Johnson reported progress on a spill investigation. As per DNR regulations, the Otwell Consulting firm of Traverse City investigated the spill of gasoline that occurred in the city garage. The final report found that contaminants were below the level of DNR concern and further action should be unnecessary.

A sampling of East Jordan households will be selected to provide testing of tap water. The EPA has required all communities in the United States to test water systems for lead and copper.

The request and test directions will be included with the next water bills. No inappropriate levels of the metals are expected to be discovered.

Mayor Russ Peck presented his recommendations for 1993 appointments to City Council for approval. Serving as Mayor Pro-tem will be Councilman Greg Chappuies.

Several suggestions were made for nominees to the vacancy on the Board of Review. Betty Nessel and an appointee to be announced will be the members in 1993.

The Chamber of Commerce requested use of various city areas for the annual Sno-Blast events Jan. 22-24. The council had concerns about one of the planned activities, a tough truck competition.

Superintendent Johnson has met with the Chamber to discuss council concerns. The city has assurances from the Chamber of Commerce that the contest will be organized to prevent damage to the field and danger to spectators.

The Central Lake Board of Education will ask school district voters to approve changes to the elementary school in a special bonding election scheduled for Tues., Feb. 2, 1993. If the approximate \$1,450,000 project is approved, taxpayers would realize very little, if any, increase in taxes.

This is possible for two reasons. First, the bond market is very favorable at this time, and through restructuring the 1987 bond debt, considerable savings would be realized. Second, at the present time the school has voter approval for a one mill building and site millage (presently rolled back to .8615 mills due to the Headlee Amendment).

If the bond issue passes, the board has pledged not to assess this building and site millage which then would be a trade off for the one additional mill needed to cover the cost of this project. The entire debt requirement would be financed over a 20 year period.

A comparison of present and proposed millage needs shows: the 1992 actual 2.51 mills for debt retirement plus .8615 mills for building and site equals 3.3715 mills; and the 1993 proposed 3.48 mills for debt retirement plus no additional for building and site equals 3.48 mills.

Using the latest assessment figures, the bond issue would require a minimal millage increase


Lake shore keeps going, going

FOLLOWING IS A copy of a letter sent to the Antrim County Board of Commissioners Jan. 6:

My Intermediate Lake shoreline is like an Eveready Battery: it keeps going, going, going, I would like to know what can or is being done about the illegal level of Intermediate Lake? Mr. Harold Myers, drain commissioner, assured me that the gates of the Bellaire Dam have been wide open since the middle of October 1992.

As of Jan. 3, 1993 the lake level was 607.05; on March of 1990 it was 608.10; and March 1991 was 607.60. To my knowledge, the winter level of 606.54 has never been achieved since it was ordered in January 1986. Mr. Myers' log book may confirm these figures. The summer level is usually maintained, unless it rains of course. Now unless I am a complete wacko, this indicates to me that something might be wrong with the design of the recently reconstructed Bellaire Dam. May I suggest you contact the engineers that designed the reconstruction of the Bellaire Dam to find out why the established lake levels cannot be maintained? This lake level hassle has been ongoing since the Bellaire Dam was reconstructed in 1918, and I think its time it was resolved once and for all. Your consideration in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

Then the roof caved in and - through a combination of superb Red Devil play and everything going wrong for the Trojans - East Jordan gained a second game victory 15-0.


Some booming serves by East Jordan and the

Ellsworth delivered the ball to the basket with continual success. The Lancers took a 15-4 lead after a period, and led 28-18 at the half.


In the third quarter Ellsworth took the ball to a 52-25 lead and finished up winners 65-38.



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



continued from front the warehouse. In 1940 another warehouse was erected over the potato basement.

Sometime around 1944 the co-operative changed it's name to the Ellsworth Farmers Exchange.

Van Stedum started working in the feed room grinding and mixing seeds, in 1956. He then was moved to the potato room in the base-

ment. He remembers that potatoes were the major crop they handled. The entire basement would be full of potatoes to be shipped all over the country.

Fred was in charge of sorting the potatoes certified seed potatoes would be packed in 100 pound bags - table potatoes in 15 pound bags - for shipping. He remembers one occassion when a crew of eight loaded an entire railroad freight car with the 15 pound bags. They did not have the luxury of a forklift it was all by hand.


At that time they served a very wide area with farmers coming from Traverse City and other places. Operations are currently restricted to Antrim and Charlevoix counties.

Another exchange retiree, Jack McPherson of Ellsworth started in 1946 delivering fuel. Van Stedum remembers McPherson as a diligent, tireless worker and one who kept the fuel tanker spotless.

That activity could be considered the forerunner of the current liquid propane service. Started in 1987 they already serve 3,000 customers using four tank trucks. The service area ranges to Kewadin on the south and near Walloon Lake on the north.

The current manager, Jay Essenberg, a 22 year employee was named to his position in 1984. He reports that business is very good in fact, in 1992 business volume exceeded \$4.2 million.

Van Stedum talks of the exchange with a great pride, almost with a sense of family. "The exchange provided me with a nice living. I still live in Ellsworth in a house we built over forty years

and Bill Alward - grandson of former manager Harold Jansen - are among the 12 employees.

Based on the current success, one could say that the Farmers Exchange will continue to be an Ellsworth fixture for a long time.

Over the years Huckle shot news photos for not only local papers but for the Detroit papers and the Grand Rapids Herald. His late wife Doris was a news correspondent for the same papers and worked as a historian. She was very active in the East Jordan Historical Society.

Huckle remembers that Marsha and Wilma Sales bought out Paul Lisk and published the East Jordan News Herald around 1950.

In that same period he was instrumental in forming a local businessmens association dedicated to generating business renewal. That activity led to a renewal of The East Jordan Chamber of Commerce, of which he was president for two years during the 1960's.

Huckle stopped doing portrait and news work around 1987 but still does restoration of old prints. In fact, he has a collection of over 250 photos taken over the years. He has taken photos of murders, drownings, jury trials and car and airplane crashes. As he said "there probably isn't anything I haven't taken a picture of."

He also has a collection of old cameras, some dating back to 1890.

Huckle maintains an interest in a lot of things, especially cameras and automobiles and as he related with a smile "I even operated a used car business in the basement of this building for several years."
