

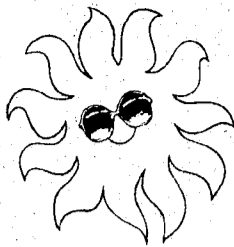

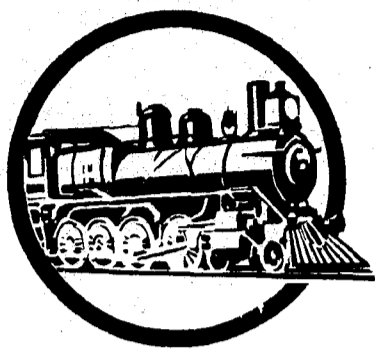

Human Development Committee in discord

A vote to approve the revised K-4 human sexuality curriculum was the climax of a sometimes tense meeting of the East Jordan School Board's Human Development Committee.

At the March 22 meeting, the committee reviewed the curriculum as recommended by the K-4 teaching staff. The teachers have spent many hours researching the outcomes (concepts) and

enablers presented to them by the HDC. (Enablers are statements that give a concrete direction to the outcomes.)

Teachers were to consider community comments and concerns that were gathered in public viewing of the curriculum materials. In addition, many teachers added suggested resources to those listed by the HDC. The committee reviewed many of these additional resources at the meeting.

As part of their review, teachers were to elimi-

nate any outcome or enabler they felt would not be age appropriate. For example, kindergarten teachers recommended that the following outcome be eliminated: "Students will explain that a boy's body and a girl's body are different from each other."

After some discussion the HDC agreed that specific body parts be left for explanation in the context of anatomy at a later grade level. However, the committee directed that physical differences in general (taller, shorter, hair and eye color, etc.) be discussed at the kindergarten level.

Several other amendments were made by teachers in deference to community sensibilities. A children's book about reproduction using a chick as a model has been objected to by some parents. The book has a small picture of mating chickens on one page.

Teachers have agreed to use the book only as a resource. It may be read to students without that page being shown. The HDC approved this compromise.

Members of the committee were in conflict over another book, called *The Frog Book*. Some parents, including committee member Sheilah Warner, have objected to a picture of mating frogs.

Elementary Principal Charles Hershberger supported teacher opinion that the book is illustrated appropriately and tastefully. He stressed that the teachers find it to be a "meaningful lesson."

That view was also supported by Curriculum Director Anne Dingman during the discussion.

Warner feels strongly that the book dwells too much on the act of breeding. She believes other books could be found for the lesson.

Hershberger and committee Chair Tammy Jackson assured the committee that new K-4 materials can be suggested until the full curriculum has been processed.

The HDC was working under the new imperative to make sure all outcomes, enablers and lessons reflect the School Board's intentions as outlined in the recently released Position Statement. At the meeting, they reviewed the revised K-4 outcomes with that in mind.

Members of the committee, as well as grade 5-12 teachers now reviewing the outcomes are obligated to work within the parameters of the Position Statement.

HDC member Judy Meredith called the board statement "positive." She feels that the HDC is not being true to the intent of the statement. "I do not see how our concepts fit into this at all." She

Superintendent responds to slur

To the Editor:

Many thanks to the fans and school officials around Antrim County for their concerns expressed over *Detroit Free Press* writer Mick McCabe's comments prior to Ellsworth High School's appearance in the State Quarterfinal Round of this year's state boy's basketball tournament. I sent the following letter to Mr. McCabe this morning:

Mr. McCabe:

"Good Sports are Winners." I know you have heard that phrase, because I saw you at the Michigan High School Athletic Association (M.H.S.A.A.) Boys Basketball Finals at the Palace of Auburn Hills, and the phrase was repeated over and over and over again. The public address announcer filled all time-outs, as well as pre- and post-game intermissions throughout the day with "good sportsmanship" messages.

The M.H.S.A.A. and its member schools under the leadership of Executive Director Jack Roberts have been stressing sportsmanship as a key component in high school sports for several years through a massive public relations campaign. Sportsmanship is improving with this campaign, but we understand that the issue requires our continued attention.

As educators we know that "sportsmanship," either good or bad, is "learned" behavior. We know that kids will develop their attitudes and behaviors by watching how adults act and speak. We know what good sportsmanship looks like and we know what bad sportsmanship looks like.

Mr. McCabe, you have been "modeling" bad sportsmanship for our kids and I am ethically compelled to bring it to your attention.

In your "Son of Swami" predictions of M.H.S.A.A. tournaments over this past year you have, as is your fashion, made fun of the names of various schools. Mr. McCabe, many of these attempts at humor model bad sportsmanship for high school kids.

Jack Roberts and the M.H.S.A.A. staff along with school administrator and athletic officials across the state work hard to stamp out the attitudes of poor sportsmanship and to instill the

attitudes of good sportsmanship. Mr. McCabe, please don't interfere with our mission through your inane attempts at humor.

In your "Son of Swami" quarterfinal predictions, you transposed the letters of Ellsworth High School to read "Worthless." Mr. McCabe we are talking about 15, 16 and 17-year-old kids here. Most aren't old enough to shave. Many aren't even old enough to get their driver's license. How dare you call them worthless. Their team went 23-2 this year; they made it to the final eight in the state in class "D"; your newspaper had them rated as high as number two in mid-season rankings; their coach was named the Associated Press Coach of the Year in class "D." I don't think "worthless" is an appropriate adjective.

Mr. McCabe, your assignment is to cover high school sports in Michigan. I suggest you tune-in to what Michigan's high school sports leaders have been stressing for the last several years. I encourage you to give a call to Jack Roberts or to any high school principal or athletic director in the state to discuss the M.H.S.A.A.'s position on sportsmanship. You have a responsibility to high school sports and to high school athletes to "clean up your act."

High school sports are for kids. They are not for adults. They are provided so that kids can learn lessons like teamwork, goal setting, work ethic and good sportsmanship. High school sports are not provided to sell newspapers or to provide jobs for pompous prognosticators.

Mr. McCabe, juxtapose team names if you must, but do so keeping in mind that being a good sport and not being a bad sport are paramount in the minds of the leadership of high school athletics in the State of Michigan.

In closing, if you are unsure of the gist of my letter, let me make it simple:

School SuperNintendo 1, Mick McCan't You be a Good Sport 0.

Proud to be the superintendent in Ellsworth (not Worthless).

"But those figures were the total amount estimated for 1993-94 recall elections," she stated. Antrim County Clerk Laura Sexton was still compiling an estimate of Central Lake recall election costs at press-time - the first such request she has received on the issue. Current plans call for an article detailing the results of her investigation in next week's *Torch*.)

In addition to conducting ski-borne operations with the Japanese, the U.S. Marines had several opportunities for cultural ex-

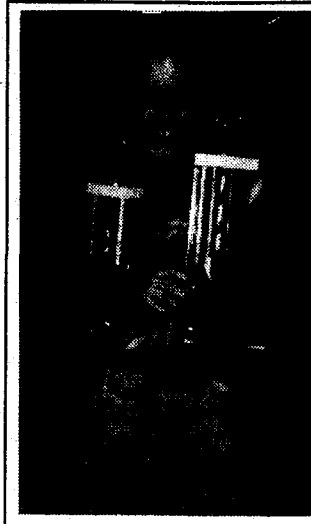
Terpstra chosen for scholarship

AAA says driving costs less

ownership and operating expenses in 1993, or 38.7 cents per mile - .1 cent lower than in 1992. It costs 33.5 cents per mile to drive a Ford Escort LX; 34.5 cents for a Chevrolet S10 pickup; 39.2 cents for a Ford Taurus GL; 41.7 cents for a Dodge Caravan SE and 43.3 cents for a Chevrolet Caprice.

Report Social Security earnings by April 15

If you worked and also received Social Security benefits in 1992, you may need to file a report with Social Security by April 15. Anyone whose earnings exceeded the annual earnings limits must report their 1992 earnings.

The earnings limits for 1992 were \$10,200 for beneficiaries ages 65-69, and \$7,440 for those under 65. People who were age 70 or older for the entire year 1992 do not need to file a report. There is no earnings limit after age 70.

You can file the report

by phone, or by mail. If you file by mail, use the report form Social Security mailed to you, or if you do not have one, request that one be sent. One important reminder - the report must be submitted directly to Social Security. Do not confuse this requirement with filing your tax return with the Internal Revenue Service. One does not take the place of the other!

After your report is re-

ceived, Social Security will compare your reported 1992 earnings with the estimate you provided when you applied for benefits, or when you filed last year's earnings report. Benefits paid in 1992 were based on that estimate. If you earned less than you estimated, you may be due some additional benefits. If you made more than you estimated, you may have to repay some benefits.

The earnings limits for 1993 are \$10,560 for people 65-69, and \$7,680 for those under 65.





continued, "I have a hard struggle with that." Dingman responded that the committee should reserve judgment until they see how the teachers have developed the curriculum.

There was other dissension among committee members. Two members voted against acceptance of the December minutes because of their objection to the content of that meeting. Three opposed approval of the modified K-4 outcomes, although the rest of the group approved the motion.

The time frame for completion of the entire process is August 1993. The committee plans to present the curriculum to the School Board at the September meeting.

Prior to that presentation, the public will again be invited to review the curriculum as it will be presented to students. The state mandates an opportunity for public survey.

The HDC is arranging for extra review times as

it approaches each level of curriculum. The K-4 was already presented. The 5-8 curriculum will be displayed when as many materials as possible are collected, probably in early May. Notice will be published in newspapers and through local churches and other organizations.

The lack of time for public review was one of the criticisms leveled against the committee by Kaye Zitka. She, husband Clare and daughter Amy were the only members of the audience to speak during a 15 minute public forum at the beginning of the meeting.

The Zitkas represent Concerned Parents of East Jordan. Kaye Zitka questioned why all the materials were not available for public review.


Committee member Warner reiterated Zitka's comments about material review. Jackson responded that more time is being allowed than is either common or required by the state.

Some of the K-4 materials were not available at the time of the public survey. All materials are

expected to be assembled for the final display in August.


The committee was in complete agreement in their appreciation of the work of the teaching staff. The teachers have responded in a timely manner with substantial effort.

The next meeting of the committee will be to review the revised grade 5-8 outcomes. The projected date is late May.

Milk production decrease

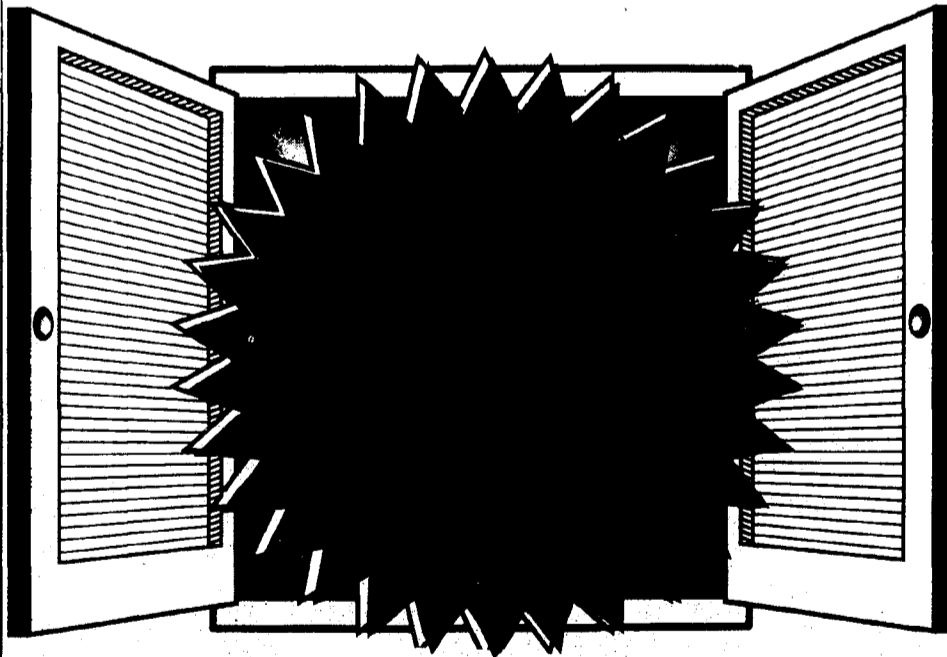
Dairy herds in Michigan produced 425 million pounds of milk during February, down 4 million pounds from a year ago, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service. Milk per cow averaged 1,250 pounds, decreasing 20 pounds from a year ago. The Michigan dairy herd was estimated at 340,000 head, 2,000 more than February 1992.

The preliminary value of milk sold averaged \$12.30 per hundred-weight in February,

Milk in the 21 major states totaled 10 billion pounds, down 2 percent from production in these same states in February 1992. Production per cow averaged 1,218 pounds for February, 20 pounds less than February 1992.

Dairy manufacturing plants in Michigan produced 2.1 million pounds of butter in January, 24 percent more than a year ago. Ice cream output totaled 1.7 million gallons, 4 percent less than January 1992.
