


#### **OUR WEATHER**

The alley in contention is in the block bounded by Maple, Esterly, Bowen and Mill streets. Bill

## K's to stay all day?

Will area kindergarten students attend school all day next year? The East Jordan school system is in the process of making that decision.

An information forum was held April 6 to acquaint parents with the all-day, alternate-day option.

Charles Hershberger, principal at East Jordan Elementary School, began the session by introducing the research committee. The group was formed early in the school year to look at as many of Michigan's 63 all-day programs as possible. Committee members observed in several area classrooms and had phone discussions with teachers and administrators too far away to visit. Members also reviewed a variety of articles and other research. and Gladys Archer made the original request to close one of the two alleys adjacent to their home.

Superintendent Bob Johnson researched the request and several other area alleys that were unused. The city initiated proceedings to close the alleys, this included sending a letter to all effected homeowners and holding a public hearing.

North Maple Street resident Dennis Shea was the only person who attended the hearing. He objected at that time, but did not seem to understand the resolution.

Shea attended the April 6 meeting and once again spoke against the resolution. He was supported by Mill Street resident Franklin Campbell. Campbell is concerned that he won't be able to turn his boat trailer in the remaining open section of alley.

Gladys Johnson, daughter of the Archers, was also present at the meeting. She explained how the dust and noise from the alley had prompted the request. The Archers are also concerned about yard damage from thrown stones and the snowplow.

Gladys Johnson, Campbell and Shea became involved in a rather heated discussion of the issue. Council decided to appoint City Attorney Scott Beatty to research the steps needed to rescind Resolution #109. The issue will be addressed again at the April 20 meeting.

[In a letter issued after the meeting, City Clerk Kathy O'Rear reported to council that the alley in question has been vacated twice before.

The alley was closed in October 1966 and again in August 1985. Both times the closure erroneously failed to be recorded with the Register of Deeds and kept on file.]

In other business:

• Mayor Russ Peck announced a proclamation calling May 23-29 Arson Awareness Week.

In a related matter, council member Greg Chappuies spoke for the council in condemning a recent suspicious fire on Williams Street.

"If the conclusion of the state fire marshall is that the fire was arson, we support every effort to find and prosecute the perpetrator," he stated. The residence has recently been plagued by a rash of fires.

• Council granted Superintendent Johnson authorization to purchase a new office computer.

• Arranged for a burn-off of weeds on Sand Island and for the fire department to burn a large brush pile on private property.

• Reminded residents that feeding birds in certain areas of Sportsman Park is forbidden. This is part of an on-going effort to keep birds away from the picnic areas.

The result of this intense investigation is that the committee will recommend the all-day, alternate-day schedule to the school board at the April 12 meeting.

A panel discussion was the format for presenting the information compiled by the committee.

Viewpoints were shared by two educators presently involved in all-day programs: Lori Finnerty, Central Lake Elementary Principal; and Janie Tavener, kindergarten teacher at Willow Hill Elementary in Traverse City.

Both educators were very positive about their programs. Finnerty noted that transition to first grade is now smoother. A special asset, in her view, is that hot lunch is now available to kindergarten children.



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


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## I AKEN FROM THE TORCH


A snuff box that was passed around while the Declaration of Independence was being signed is a highly prized possession of Mrs. Melvin Smith of Ellsworth.

The Grass Lake Grange Degree team will hold their regular meeting April 17 at the grange hall, officers will be elected. Plans are made to clean up the yard if weather permits.






## Lake trout size limits changed

The Department of Natural Resources reminds anglers of important regulations governing the upcoming lake trout season, May 1 through Labor Day, for Lakes Michigan and Huron and their tributary streams.

The minimum size limit for lake trout in northern Lake Michigan, including Grand Traverse Bay, is 24 inches (see attached map of affected areas). For all other Great Lakes waters, the minimum size for lake trout remains 10 inches.

While not detailed in this year's Michigan Fishing Guide, this size limit for lake trout in northern Lake Michigan has been in effect since June 1992.

Because lake trout mortalities in northern Lake Michigan have routinely exceeded the target of a 45 percent total annual mortality rate, size limits were increased to reduce the lake trout stocks in thevarea. Preliminary fig-Iures indicate the in-mcreased size limit forIthis area is having thetdesired effect.d


In a further effort to stimulate lake trout populations throughout Lake Michigan, the current limit is two lake trout per day. Else-

where in the Great Lakes, including connecting waters and inland lakes, the lake trout limit is three per day.

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Reduced pressure on the lake trout stocks, combined with increased stocking efforts of lake trout and similar reductions of tribal catch should restore a highly-valued sport fishery for lake trout in northern Lake Michigan waters.

Lake trout may be taken year around from Lake Superior, inland lakes, the St. Marys, St. Clair and Detroit Rivers and Lake St. Clair.

## Thanks to Green Thumb, Inc. It's "Thumbs-up!" for area seniors

Stop by the East Jordan Police Department on a weekday afternoon and you'll be greeted by the smile on a new face. Behind the smile is Jacqueline Ream, the new department receptionist.

Ream began her job March 29. She will answer the telephone, do some filing and typing, and eventually work with the computer.

Police Chief John Imeson is guiding Ream as she learns the routine. He is particularly pleased to have her services because he is the former afternoon receptionist!

Ream, 55, was placed in her new post through the efforts of Green Thumb, Inc.

While the first image may be of the local garden club, Green Thumb, Inc. is actually one of the prime contractors for the U.S. Department of Labor. The mandate of the organization is to administer funds designated by congressional Title V, the Senior Community Service Employment Program.

Of the organizations that manage Title V funds, Green Thumb is the oldest and largest. According to area supervisor Ray Askins, the organization has placed nearly 30 percent of the 65,000 seniors employed. Green Thumb works in 44 states and Puerto Rico, mainly in rural areas. Other states and communities are served in the same capacity by such diverse groups as Association of Retired Persons, National Indian Council on Aging, National Urban League and the U.S. Forestry Service. Green Thumband the other organizations use Title V funding to train and employ persons 55 and older who met income guidelines.



HAPPY TO BE BACK in town again is East Jordan native Jacqueline Ream. She's the new receptionist at the East Jordan Police Department.

Many have been displaced by forced early retirement, layoffs, death or disability of a spouse, or like Ream, a business failure.

Until 1986, Ream worked as a secretary for Weathershield in Charlevoix. When owner Paul Oleson died, the business closed and Ream was out of a job.

The collapse of Weathershield came about the same time Ream was recovering from the death of both parents and a bout with cancer. She needed a respite and took a break for herself. But when she was ready to reenter the workforce, Ream found herself edged out by younger, more skilled applicants for the few available jobs. Ream heard about Green Thumb, Inc. as many do – through word of mouth. A friend and a cousin were both Green Thumb enrollees and helped Ream connect with supervisor Askins. Askins is the mainstay of the program in the 15 counties of northern Michigan that make up his area. He is careful to match enrollees to an appropriate host agency. Driving distance and skills are important criteria. Askins assesses enrollees on employment

strengths, then connects them with the host.

The host agency agrees to provide a supervisor and at times. extra training. Positions are generally 20 to 22 hours per week and are limited to minimum wage.

In general, enrollees can expect the same treatment they would find in any good work

relationship. Unlike most positions, though, Green Thumb sponsored placement is fully funded by the Department of Labor at no cost to the employer.

The part-time hours fit perfectly into Ream's lifestyle. She spends a great deal of time caring for an elderly aunt.

Ream is also pleased to get a position so close to her Charlevoix Home.

Being back in East Jordan is a special treat, she said. Ream who attended E.J. schools


through 12th grade.

At intervals, Askins will visits Ream at her job to monitor progress. just as he does with all enrollees.

The placements are considered temporary and "vegetating" is seriously discouraged. Enrollees are expected to be registered with the Michigan unemployment office and encouraged to actively pursue other employment.

Green Thumb also hopes the host agency will foster the program continued on page 9

Applications are now available from the Department of Natural Resources for the seventh round of funding under the Solid Waste Alternatives Program(SWAP) funded by the Protecting Michigan's future Bond.

Grants and loans will be available for fiscal year 1994-95 for projects in 10 categories: recycling (collection and processing); composting; resource recovery education; marketing; market development; market development research and demonstration; waste reduction research and demonstration; household hazardous waste centers; waste-to-energy; and transfer stations.

Both public and private entities are eligible to receive a grant or loan. All projects must be located in a Michigan county that has an approved solid waste plan. For most categories of funding, grants and loans are available for capital parents Dale and Dora James and other relatives.





Although Askins mainly works with public sector and nonprofit private host agencies, there is some flexibility. Green Thumb may work with some private businesses using special funds to share the cost

of training.

"We're there to help the senior population," Askins said. "Older people can serve." Askins' own assistant is a Green Thumb, Inc. enrollee.

Those interested in connecting with Green Thumb only have to go as far as their nearest senior center. As Askins says, "There

probably isn't a director in any area senior center that doesn't know me." In fact, many senior centers are host agencies for Green Thumb enrollees.

## Live satellite class for MBA offered

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## DNR urges: give docks wide berth

Department of Natural Resources Director Roland Harmes today urged sports enthusiasts to avoid outdoor activities near public or private docks and marinas at this time of year, particularly where aerators or bubblers are being used.


"Winter sports enthusiasts should give a wide berth to open water and thin ice created by bubblers," Harmes said. "In addition, with the warmer spring weather on the way, the ice is

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starting to melt and break up. Promoting a greater public awareness will hopefully prevent serious accidents."

Bubbler systems have been installed more frequently in recent years to prevent ice from damaging pilings and other structures. Waterfront property owners may be held liable should citizens be granted lawful access to lakes or streams and are subsequently injured by falling through thin ice caused by bubblers.





## Warmer temperatures usher in tornado season

Though the approaching warm weather brings the threat of tornadoes to Michigan residents, twisters don't need to be killers. According to Antrim County Emergency Services Director Bill Drollinger, of the 21 tornadoes reported in Michigan in 1992, no one was killed as a result. Those tornadoes, however, damaged property valued at approximately \$6 million.

"Every household, school and business should have a plan just in case a tornado strikes in the area," said Bill Babcock, warning and preparedness meteorologist for the National Weather Service.

Tornadoes generally develop from severe thunderstorms. Although not all severe thunderstorms spawn tornadoes, twisters are more likely to occur when there is unseasonably warm and humid air at the earth's surface and cold air at middle atmospheric levels with strong upperlevel jet stream winds.

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Annually, Michigan experiences an average of 16 tornadoes. Since 1950, twisters killed 237 people. Tornadoes can hit anytime of the day or night in almost any month of the year. Most, however, occur in April, May, June and July during the late afternoon and evening hours, generally between 3 and 7 p.m. Tornadoes develop and move rapidly, often with little notice or forewarning.

When a tornado watch is announced, residents should gather a first aid kit, flashlight and portable radio. They should stay tuned to local radio and television stations. A watch means that conditions are right for development of a tornado.

A tornado warning means that a tornado has actually been sighted nearby and everyone in the area should take action. Go immediately to the basement, taking cover under something sturdy. If there isn't a basement, move to the lowest floor possible, in a small room or closet. Again, stay low and if possible, under a heavy object. Stay away from windows.


At work or school, if a basement is not available, move to an interior hallway on the lowest floor possible. Avoid rooms with a large, freespan roof, like gymnasiums.

If caught in the open during a tornado warning, seek shelter in a ditch, ravine or other place below ground level and stay as low as possible.


If anyone spots a tornado, they should contact the Antrim County Sheriff Department only if they have time, Drollinger said. Give name and address and the direction the tornado is traveling.





Tavener is most enthusiastic about the expanded amount of learning time. The all-day, alternate-day program actually extends the halfday schedule approximately 12 days over a school year. More time is available for stories, longterm projects and most importantly, getting to know the children better.

"Plus," Tavener chuckled, "their paintings go home dry!"

Other panel members supported the concept with positive remarks. East Jordan Exploratory Arts teacher Barb Noirot discussed how the kindergarten would fit into the Music, Art, Physical Education and Exploratory Arts (MAPEX) program already offered to the rest of the elementary.

East Jordan kindergarten teachers Nancy Trumble and Diane Frykberg discussed the proposed schedule in terms of daily routine.

Time constraints now keep kindergarten students form taking part in most MAPEX activities.

Kindergarten preparatory teachers Sheri Fitzpatrick and Carolyn Downton were on the panel to provide assurance that their programs

Service Director Arlene Hammond completed the panel. They discussed logistics of the all-day program, especially Friday half-days. Hammond also stressed Finnerty's earlier point that kindergarten students could now qualify for the hot lunch program.
