Working together to bring back the bluebird

The Eastern bluebird, among America's most colorful and cherished birds, has disappeared in many of the areas it once brightened.

But thanks to the efforts of two Central Lake Elementary School teachers, a group of local seniors and dozens of eager third-graders, that unhappy fact is being reversed in this area.

Why? Because construction of specially tailored bird-houses has become an annual project for local school children.

"We've had wonderful success," said teacher and project innovator Nancy Ewald. "The chil-

It all started back in 1990, when Ewald attended a DNR workshop titled "Bring Back the Bluebird." Excited by the possibility of getting students involved in the project, she soon made contact with two men who have been instrumental in helping her vision succeed.

"So much credit goes to Ed Pepke and Jerry Simowski," she said. "They got other volunteers, purchased lumber, made special jigs and templates and donated their time to help with the actual building project."

This is the third year her students have constructed the bluebird boxes, Ewald said. Kari Groll's third-grade class also participated in the project, which is timed for the return of the migrating birds.

Essential to the box design is a small hole that permits bluebirds but keeps out the starlings that frequently displace them, Ewald noted.

The box also features a removable side, important because "Bluebirds are not very good housekeepers," she said.

"This means that the students' responsibilites don't end with putting up the boxes," Ewald added. "They know they must be cleaned out each fall, or the bluebirds won't come back the next spring."

Her plans for the rough-sawn cedar boxes will be cheerfully shared with interested readers, she said.

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

Art lovers also had an opportunity to view her work during the Jordan River Arts Council exhibition of Native American Works in 1992.


The current exhibition, titled Voices of Mackinac, is open from noon to 4 p.m. daily. The Arts Center is located at 301 Main Street.

Program will train **Hospice Volunteers**



"There's somebody in here every night," he noted from his desk at Cary's Trading Card Shop last week. "I'm really enjoying the opportunity to work with young people again."



"I'll tell you what they're real little business people. They know what's hot, and they know what they want. They'll bargain and trade with the best


of them. Where else can a kid go nowadays and for as little as a dollar investment have a chance at a card worth hundreds?"





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

Disputed alley to remain open

The East Jordan City Council will rescind Resolution 109/1993 to vacate alleys in the Mill Street area. The decision came in the midst of contention between involved residents at the April 20 meeting.

Although several alleys are listed in the resolution, only one has been contested. The alley runs east-west and is bounded by Maple, Esterly, Bowen and Mill streets.

The council made the determination because a majority of residents in the area wanted the alley left open.

At the same time, council acknowledged the need to address problems caused by the alley's presence.

Bill and Gladys Archer and daughter Gladys Johnson had requested the closure because of noise and dust. The city will survey the alley with the intent to blacktop, somewhat alleviating the problem.

Johnson was unhappy with the decision. She felt it had been unfair to close the other end of the

alley (in 1985) while leaving the end adjacent to her property open.

The resolution will be redrafted excluding the disputed alley. Council will then readopt the resolution.

Charter revision process initiated

The City of East Jordan is operating on a charter which, with only a few amendments, was adopted in 1911 when the city was incorporated.

Council adopted a resolution to set the process of revision in motion.

In November, voters will decide if they want the charter revised. If affirmative, a charter commission will be elected on the same ballot. The commission will draft the revision, then present it to voters for a final judgment.

In discussion of the issue, council will not recommend a change in the present form of city government. They agreed that charter commission member are to be paid.

Authorization was given to Beatty and City Clerk Kathy O'Rear for hiring a consultant as needed in handling charter revision efforts.


She may also consider going into nursing as a career.

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
