



OUR WEATHER

Downtown to have facelift?

The East Jordan Chamber of Commerce has launched a campaign to spruce up the downtown area. The April 19 motivational meeting was stage one in what the Chamber hopes will become "Operation Facelift."

East Jordan merchants and civic organizations were encouraged to send representatives to the meeting. A group of 24 that included some city council members attended to hear a presentation by Fran Pletz.

"I do not come tonight as an expert, but only as a person who cared about her community," Pletz began. As Chamber of Commerce President, Pletz was instrumental in organizing an "Operation Facelift" for the town of Williamston, near Lansing.

Williamston and East Jordan are very similar in size and profile.

Pletz is now an active member of the East Jordan community. She showed a video which described the renovation of downtown Williamston.

The Williamston program began with a two-week Paint-Up. Painting

is a quick, relatively inexpensive way to cosmetically improve appearances. Williamston merchants chose from a color scheme in order to integrate the downtown buildings


During the Paint-Up weeks, volunteers helped with the painting at street level. Some groups, such as Girl Scouts, planted shrubs and flowers.

Church earns Historical designation



RECENTLY GRANTED historical site designation, St. John Nepomucene Catholic Church in Jordan Township can look back on a proud history of service to local congregations.

Well over a century ago, in 1869, a group of farmers left the countryside of Bohemia to homestead in America. They settled in the scenic hills of Antrim County, overlooking the Jordan River valley. Their new community was named Praga, for the Bohemian capital of Prague.

A strong Catholic faith bonded the immigrants. They took turns celebrating mass in their homes, served by a traveling priest.

The growing settlement soon overflowed modest parlors, so the congregation began a formal church structure in 1885.

One of the farmers sold an acre lot to the Diocese of Grand Rapids for \$25. Located at the corner of M-32 and St. Johns Road, the frame building erected on it was completed in 1890. The steeple and bell tower were attached in 1893.

The names Votruba, Kotalik, Haney and Josifek filled the membership rolls of the new church, now under the patronage of Saint John Nepomucene.

Saint John was a court chaplain martyred under King Wenceslaus IV of Bohemia in about 1393.

By 1905, about 50 families shared communion at St. John's. The alter was in place, as were statues of Mary and Saint John Nepomucene. The simple, lovely interior looked much the same as it does today.

St. John's continued to be ministered by traveling priests. They came, at various times, from Harbor Springs, Petoskey, Elmira and finally, East Jordan St. Joseph Church. The congregation remains affiliated with St. Joseph today.

In 1926, fieldstone was added to the original structure. This unusual veneer is one of the rea-

sons the church was accepted on the Historic Register, explained Charles Cotman of the Michigan Historical Commission.

Cotman, of Lansing, is the State Register Coordinator of Historic Preservation.

Cotman worked closely with longtime church

member Lucille Lercel. He cited her year-long endeavor to gain the listing and the energy she devoted to the necessary paper chase.

The church was named a state historical site on Feb. 18.

Considered a mission by the Archdiocese of Detroit and now Gaylord, St. John's has never been "promoted" to parish status.

That is just fine with the worshippers of St. John's. They enjoy their independence and, according to Lercel, "We take care of ourselves." About 25 families still worship weekly at St.



John's. When decisions need to be made, members gather together for group discussions.

Every Sunday at 8 a.m., the small church is full. Many of those present are descendents of the original Bohemian settlers. This rich ethnic history was another significant factor in receiving the state distinction.

Graced by the serenity of the Jordan hills, St. John's Church stands in silent tribute to a strong, lively people. With God's blessing, it will continue well into the next century.

Spring cleaning? **Proceed** with care

Cleaning products, medicines, used oil, old batteries, mothballs, antifreeze, and lawn care products all require special care in disposal. Some cleaning products and old medicines can be safely washed down the drain with plenty of water. Old batteries and used oil can be recycled. Some lawn care products and paints may need to be saved for special hazardous waste collection days.

If you are unsure of how to dispose of a household item you think is toxic, you should first read the label, as this may describe the best method of disposal. If this doesn't provide adequate information, contact the Tip of Mitt Watershed Council at (616) 347-1181.

Motorists encouraged to give the Gift of Life

Every year the Michigan Department of State distributes up to two million donor labels to motorists for placement on the back of driver licenses and personal identification cards as a way to encourage organ and tissue donation.

This year, in addition to issuing the labels, Secretary of State Richard H. Austin is joining with Gift of Life, the organ procurement agency of Michigan, to remind motorists to use the labels.

"Since 1976 donor labels have been issued to motorists to promote organ and tissue donation," Secretary Austin noted. "Last year 432 lives were saved in Michigan because someone was willing to donate an organ upon their death.

"Unfortunately, there are thousands of Michigan residents who will not survive without a transplant and this is why the donor label is so important," Secretary Austin added. "If a motorist has a signed label affixed to the back of their driver license they are more likely to have their wish for organ donation fulfilled in the event of their unexpected death."

Every Secretary of State office will have available to the public printed materials on donation during Organ Donor Awareness Week April 18 - 24.

The donor label is designed to encourage individuals to discuss organ and tissue dontion with their family and friends. Once signed by the motorist and two witnesses, it is placed on the back of the driver license or I.D. card. New labels are provided when driver licenses and I.D. cards are renewed and are also available at any Secretary of State branch office.

Organs and tissues may be recovered from anyone 75 years of age or younger at no charge to the donor or their family. Organ and tissue donation is supported by all major religions and does not affect customary funeral arrangements or alter body appearance. Among the organs and tissues that may be transplanted are heart, lungs, kidney, liver, pancreas, bone, eyes and skin.

The Gift of Life Agency estimates more than 1,400 people are awaiting transplants in Michigan. Last year, some 72 people passed away who were awaiting a transplant. Nationwide the numbers are more dramatic with more than 30,000







The bride is the daughter of Dorrie and Russ Neighorn of Remus.


The groom's parents are Reta and Ron Zielinski of Kalkaska and Allan Potter of Ellsworth.

A Panther rally in the bottom of the sixth netted a pair of runs and put Central Lake on the low end of the score for the first time this season, 4-2.


Dawson, Boatwright, the Lockharts and Laura Murray all provided opportunity for the Trojans, the Panthers simply making better use of a break.

Portside Society requests lease extension

After discussion at their April 20 meeting, the East Jordan City Council decided to stay with the one-year lease that has been their policy.

Portside requests lease extension

The issue was raised when Robert Veryzer

approached the council on behalf of Portside Art and Historical Society. The Society was hoping to extend their lease at Elm Pointe from one to 10 years.

The preservation group is planning some lighting changes and expansion of present exhibits. Members are concerned about the security of the group's future at Elm Pointe.

Veryzer noted that a longer lease would "give membership assurance that what we put our money into is going to be there for awhile."

The society would also like to expand into the second level of the building, he noted.

Council member Lyle Etcher felt that a 10-year lease was too long. He also expressed concern about the state of the upper level.

Mayor Russ Peck agreed that the city needed to deal with the condition of the roof and back stairway.

Providing handicap accessibility must also be considered before the second floor can be opened to the public.

City Attorney Scott Beatty reported that it is city policy to maintain one-year leases. This guarantees an annual review. Council member Ruth Gee assured Veryzer that the city wants Portside to remain at the Elm Pointe building. Although the city opted to keep the lease as is, council felt there would be no problem with continuous renewal.

Ruth Gee also commented that she would like to see the Society expand into the second floor as soon as the city addresses the concerns.

In other business ...

Regular meetings will now be a requirement for all council committees. Meeting times will be publicized more vigorously. Whether the meetings should be monthly, quarterly or biannual will be left to the discretion of committee chairs.

Mayor Peck designated May 16-22 Community Pride Week.

There will be leaf and brush pick-up as well as street-washing by the fire department.

Council member Russ Gee requested that the city enforce the junk ordinance more strictly. Ruth Gee agreed that East Jordan needs to stick more to "our resolve to be aggressive" in this issue.

Police Chief John Imeson assured that action is being taken on several cases. Superintendent Bob Johnson explained that the process can be slow, especially if litigation is involved.

Peck suggested enc o u r a g i n g homeowners who make an effort to spruce up their property. He would like to send a letter of appreciation and a citation for efforts to beautify the community.

A May 1 five-school meet at Suttons Bay saw East Jordan finish fourth.




The 3200-meter relay team continued in the fast track by running down another first.

Local talent agency wants you!

Would you like a career in the entertainment industry? Got a yen for modeling?

Of course, if you're a statuesque, attractive young person, your chances are pretty good.

But if you're a child (especially male), a man of just about any description, a woman over 40, or a size 18 or larger, Kross Talent Agency would definitely like to talk to you.

"It's not about glamour." Kross owner Bev Christian stated emphatically. "Many types are needed to fulfill our clients' needs short, tall, young, old, gap-toothed, frecklefaced - you name it."

Christian ought to know. Her Central Lake business, started in late 1991, has seen bookings multiply in recent months. In 1992, the agency handled 15 assignments. So far this year, 11 bookings have already been completed.

"There's no end to the possibilities," Christian stated. Kross Talenthandles them all, including movie, commercial, video, theatre and modeling assignments - live and print.

Currently, about 50 area residents are in training or under con-

tract, she said.

While Kross Talent is not a school, training is provided for models in exchange for 15 to 20 unpaid hours of their services.

After that, runway and mannequin models are paid from \$10 to \$22 an hour if they are under contract and the job itself is a paid one.

"We anticipated that about 50 percent of the work we handled would be unpaid," Christian stated, adding that so far only one "benefit-type" show has actually been scheduled.

Models are expected to provide services free of charge when the agency does make such a commitment, she noted, adding that even unpaid work offers excellent exposure and experience.

"Reliability is everything," Christian stressed. "We place a great value on that. Ability, availability and willingness to try different things are also important."

Virtually every applicant who possesses such qualities will be offered a contract. Christian stated. Each must provide a resume and photo for their Kross portfolio. Costs for photographs range from \$65 to \$350, depending on how much models wish to promote their abilities, she said.

While there is no charge for lessons, models can expect to devote at least 12 hours to learning the craft before they begin to discharge their obligatory hours of free services.





Canola could be a good spring crop given a chance

An oil crop that could provide northern Michigan growers upwards of \$200 gross return per acre may be worth looking into.

The crop is spring canola, and there are several reasons why it could be fitted into northern Michigan crop rotations, according to Larry Copeland, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service agronomist.

"Spring canola does best in a cool climate, which is characteristic of northern lower Michigan and the Upper Peninsula," Copeland says.

He believes that farmers in northern Michigan can produce canola crops as abundant as those in Canada, where canola is a major oilseed commodity.

Field trials in 1990 at MSU's Lake City Experiment Station on 17 varieties of spring canola showed yields ranging from 2,260 pounds to 3,474 pounds per acre.

"With good market planning and proper crop management, canola should provide a return of 40 bushels an acre," Copeland says. "With current prices at about \$5.67 per bushel delivered to Windsor, Ontario, that's a fairly good return on investment."

Canola has become a sought-after crop because of its oil and protein content. Canola typically has 40 to 44 percent oil and 23 percent protein. The soybean typically has 18 percent oil and 37 percent protein.

Canola debuted in southern Michigan in 1988 on about 100 acres. The estimate for the 1993 crop is about 10,000 acres, down about 3,000 acres since 1991.

Copeland isn't too concerned about that acre-

age fluctuation, but he hopes farmers won't give up on canola because of one or two years' bad experience.

"Canola has not found stability in Michigan agriculture, but it needs to be given a chance," Copeland says. "While I encourage farmers to try to crop, I also urge them to remain with it for at least three years because we are still on the up side of the learning curve for this crop."







For Williamston, the new look was a psychological boost. Many home-owners were stimulated into refreshing the outside appearance of their home. Businesses beyond the downtown area also began to make improvements.

Major renovations of building fronts was a much slower process, but as the video demonstrated, results were dramatic. Preserving architectural character was considered a priority. Details such as signs, lighting and the backs of buildings received attention.

To show appreciation, the Williamston Chamber of commerce awarded handsome wooden plaques to businesses that renovated.

Pletz emphasized the opportunity East Jordan has to take advantage of its unique character. The area's beautiful natural scenery, along with specialty shops and restaurants, should draw many visitors, she noted.

"But the town has to look attractive if you want people to stop," she added.

Because the cost of renovation can be daunting,

East Jordan Chamber of Commerce sponsors a re-investment program.

Through the cooperation of local FMB Northwestern and Charlevoix County State Banks, a special loan fund of \$100,000 with a payback term of up to 10 years.

Merchants should have enthusiasm and a takecharge attitude for the renovation to be successful. "We can't sit back and wait for someone else to do it." said Pletz.

East Jordan Chamber of Commerce President Jean Pardee was very pleased with the response to Pletz's program. She said the Chamber of Commerce will plan their strategy for pursuing "Operation Facelift" at upcoming meetings.

The organization also plans a flag display on Main Street in the coming weeks. "That should get everyone's attention!" said Pardee.

The Chamber of Commerce hopes that attention will develop into enthusiasm for "Operation Facelift," so that East Jordan merchants and residents can once again view their downtown area with pride.

"She is a jewel," Swan said. "There is no end to her creativity. We have so many kids that eat hot lunch because it's good. The kids love it."


