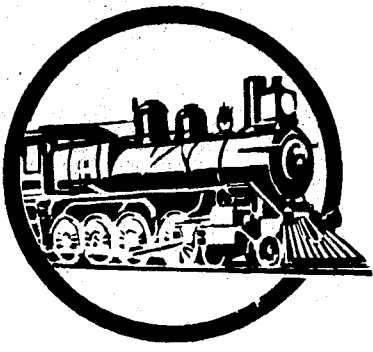


OUR WEATHER

Sidewalk repairs slated

The City of East Jordan will replace a number of broken sidewalks, primarily east of City Hall.

Although sidewalk construction costs are the responsibility of the homeowner, it is city policy to subsidize expenses. City Superintendent Bob Johnson said the city will pay 40 percent for mid-block properties and 70 percent for corners.

Property owners will be assessed for the remaining costs.

Johnson emphasized that the work is necessary for safety reasons.

DDA moves from possible to probable

The East Jordan City Council took the first steps toward establishing a Downtown Development Authority at the May 4 meeting.

The council was approached by an ad hoc committee that has been studying the possibility since November. Composed of representatives from several civic organizations, the committee has become very concerned with the condition of downtown East Jordan.

The disturbing results of a recent tax-base survey were cited by the committee. The report, prepared by Chamber of Commerce Past President Sharon Jackson and former City Treasurer Glendora Gettel, shows an alarming erosion in downtown property values.

The committee asked the council to form the DDA in order to reverse the trend. Jackson said there is a "necessity to empower the downtown to make it look good again."

City Superintendent Bob Johnson and council members Lyle Etcher and Greg Chappuies were in fully support of the plan.

Johnson and Etcher recently attended a workshop on development of a DDA. Johnson said

Central Lake board narrowly supports Proposal A

By a 4-3 vote, the Central Lake Board of Education agreed to support Proposal A, the property tax reform proposition on the June 2 state ballot.

Voting in favor were Tom Persons, Calvin Shooks, John Springstead and Mike McPherson. Opposing were Kevin Gardner, Bob Willson and Dave Carleton.

"Proposal A is not perfect, but it's better than the alternative," stated superintendent Lary Blamer at the May 10 meeting. "If Proposal A fails, it's going to mean more financial pressures on the local school districts."

Blamer later noted that opposition to Proposal A was based mainly on the fact that Central Lake is among the minority of school districts that will not see millage levels reduced to 18. To maintain equal monies, the district must levy a shade over 22 mills. "Because of that difference for our

district, I think the opposing board members were more neutral than negative," he noted.

Blamer reported 26 students went through kindergarten roundup last month, a drop from the approximately 40 youngsters each of the past several years.

The pending retirement of Russ Graves, elementary counselor and athletic director, will require the board to consider staffing needs for the 1993-94 school year, they learned.

Don Morgridge of DEM Architects showed detailed mechanical and electrical plans for the elementary school building project.

Work is proceeding on schedule, he said. Advertising for bids is scheduled for the first week in June with bids due by July 1.

The general fund budget and Truth in Taxation hearings were set for 7 p.m. Mon., June 14 prior to the regular board meeting. Budget revisions for the current school year were adopted.

Norine Holman and Everell Preston were appointed election inspectors for the annual June 14

school election, with a third inspector to be appointed by Holman.

The Bloodborne Pathogens Policy was adopted. It determines which school employees are "at risk" of contracting a disease transmitted by contact with blood and how they should protect themselves.

The policy protects the school district from any liability.

Board members agreed to purchase 25 new lockers for the sixth-graders who will not be in a contained classroom.

Livingston Lawn: "Enhancing what naturally occurs"

For Gary Livingston, being happy at his job means keeping other people's lawns green.

Livingston started Livingston Lawn Improvement Programs in Central Lake last year, after leaving a job he was unhappy with. He now spends his time treating lawns and trees, protecting them from insects and adding nutrients to the soil.

"It's always been a bug with me," Livingston said about lawn care. "This is what I love to do. I'm good at it and I enjoy it. If I can make a little money at it, all the better."

Livingston, who is licensed by the Department of Agriculture, does not do much mowing because of the demand for his treatment program.

He can treat about 15 lawns a day using 1,200 gallons chemicals. Each one usually takes 30 minutes to spray.

"I can do a lawn job as cheap as you can do it yourself," Livingston said. "It's people who care about their lawns that hire me. Most of them have nice lawns already."

Livingston said some people just don't have the time or would rather be doing something else.

Livingston started his grassy career at Schuss Mountain's golf course. He tended the courses for 13 years as the golf course supervisor.

"We were doing this stuff before you had to be licensed," he said.

Although Livingston is currently single, he plans to remarry in the fall. His children, Erikka,



10, and Lyon, 11, live in East Jordan.

Livingston's program includes a free soil analysis. Three spray applications of fertilizer and herbicides are spread over the summer months.

"I just enhance in grass plants what naturally occurs anyway," he said.

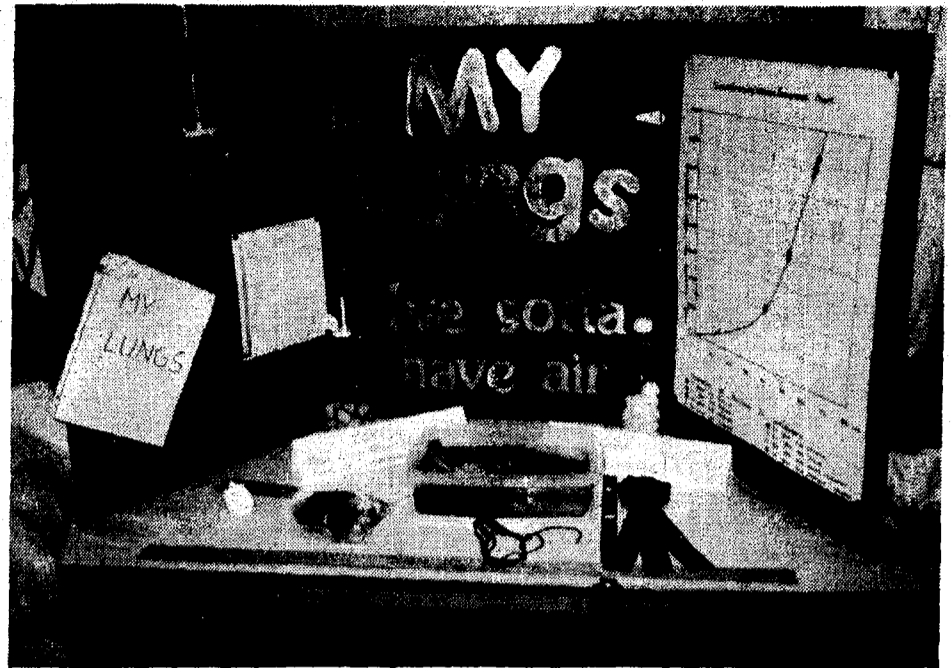

Raffle tickets cost \$10 and are available at the Arts Center and John Horan Clothiers in Petosky. For more information, call 347-4337.

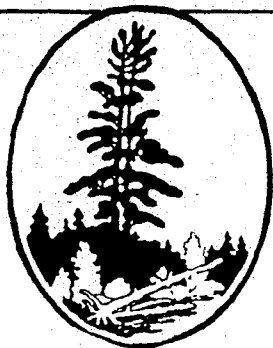

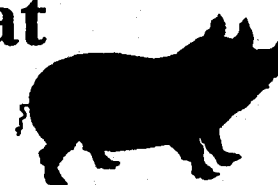

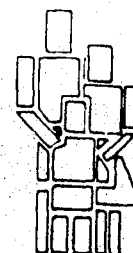

On the other hand, the demand and prices for strawberries are at record levels. The U.S. Department of Agriculture says the value of the crop has doubled in the last 11 years.





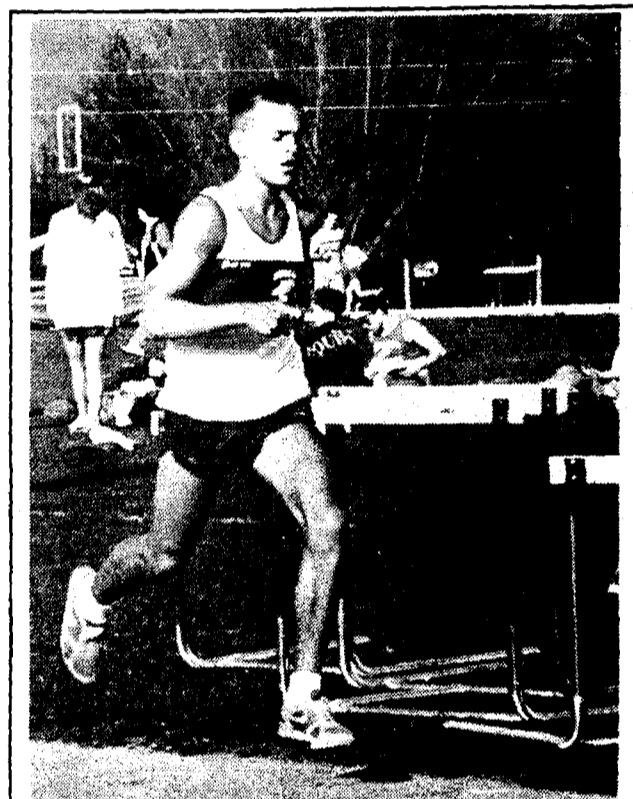

downtown residents "need a mechanism where they can be more involved in self-governing of the downtown area."

Johnson explained that the DDA can take jurisdiction over all or any part of commercially zoned areas.

Funding of a DDA can be established in two ways:

- A tax can be levied up to two mills on affected businesses.
- Financing through tax increments - A base SEV is established. When taxes increase, raising

the SEV, the extra dollars are channeled to the DDA.

A distinct advantage of the DDA, along with self-government, is that business taxes stay in the business district.

Funds are governed by a mayor-appointed board. City council has the right to final approval.

The ad hoc committee is confident that the creation of a DDA will "provide the means to implement the economic revitalization of the area ... and will provide a favorable environment for downtown businesses and all people who reside within the City of East Jordan."

The major and council fully agreed with this

assessment. Measures will be taken to facilitate the necessary paperwork. A resolution of intent to form a DDA will probably be processed sometime this fall.

The committee was pleased with the results of their appeal. "East Jordan is looking toward the future, proud of our past, working in the present," said committee member and chamber of Commerce Executive Director Mary Faculak.

To lesson millage impact, the vehicles are rotated between officers.

A new vehicle was necessary this year to replace a worn-out cruiser. The old cruiser will be transferred to City Superintendent Bob Johnson.

His present vehicle will be auctioned.

The city council believes the present situation to be most efficient in fulfilling needs.

"It's cheaper to have that car on John's driveway than hiring another officer," Councilman Russ Gee said.

Property swap discussed

Council member Greg Chappuies requested approval of a property swap with East Jordan Schools.

The city will exchange property in the Brown Creek area for Boswell Field.

A "pocket park" on the corner of Mill and Maple streets will remain in city hands. The school board did not wish to undertake liability expenses for playground equipment there.
