Board says yes to Proposal A

The East Jordan School Board endorsed Michigan Proposal A at the May 10 meeting.

Superintendent Chip Hanson explained the rationale for the endorsement.

"There is presently tremendous disparity in state-wide student spending," he said, noting that the inequity is directly attributed to tax-based funding of schools.

Proposal A reduces reliance on property taxes Hanson said. It also rolls back 1993 assessment increases to three percent.

History comes alive at rendezvous

They seem to have stepped from the pages of a history book. Looking like companions of Daniel Boone, they wear the simple clothing of pioneers.

Their tools are of the 18th century. They carry muskets and powder horns. Tomahawks are in their belts.

They keep off the cold with coonskin or wool flannel hats. Their faces are protected by beards.

These frontiersmen and women gathered May 14-16 as they do every year, for the Cabin Fever Rendezvous. Sponsored by the Jordan River Sportsmen Club, the event is a portrayal of the great rendezvous of the late 18th and early 19th centuries.

Posing as hunters, trappers, traders and settlers, many of the participants are serious history buffs. They camp in the primitive style of 200 years ago.

Their living quarters reflect the simplicity of the times. Cooking and eating utensils, bedding, even the tents are no more than a settler in 1793 would have available. Many recipes are in historical context. Matches and newspaper for starting a fire? Not when you're a pro with flint and steel.

But what they are really here for is the competition! Muzzle loaded firearms are required in all the shooting matches. Only traditional style guns are used, many handmade by their owners.

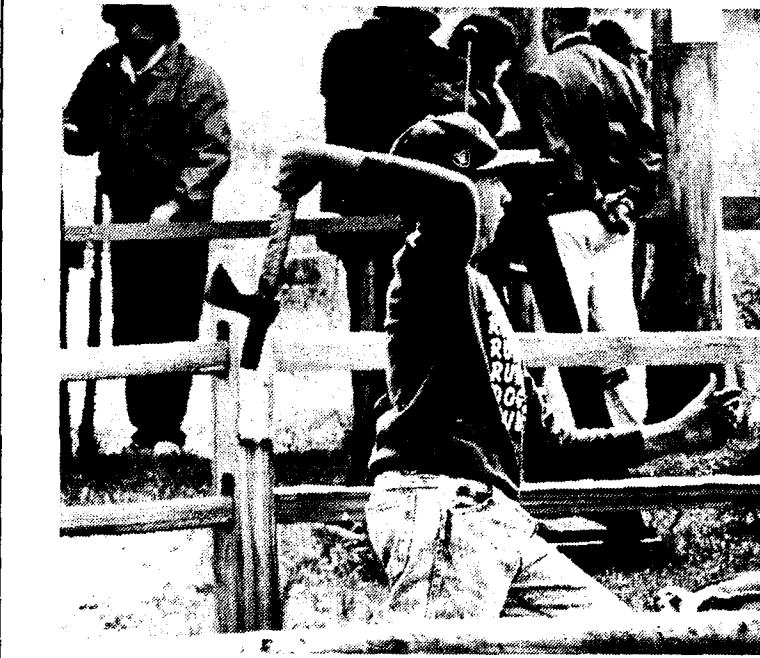
Men, women and children can test their shooting skills in two days of matches. There are several classifications to compete in, including flintlock, smooth bore and pistol.

Contestants may also try their hand at tomahawk and knife-throwing.

Ladies can improve their aim for those marital disputes by competing in a frying pan or rolling pin throw. The gentler skill of apple-peeling can also be proven in competition.

As president of the Sportsmen's Club, East Jordan resident Paul Beauvais has organized the rendezvous for many years. This is the eighth year for the spring rendezvous and the August gathering is 15 years old.

Beauvais said people come back year after

year. Many travel from across the state and Canada to attend.

The event is very family oriented. Along with historical activities for all ages, educational opportunities are provided. Teaching proper handling of firearms, especially to young people is an important aspect of the rendezvous.

"We are very safety conscious," said Beauvais. In youth shoots, a parent stands beside the youngster at all times, monitoring the preparation as well as the actual shot.

"We've never had an accident," Beauvais is proud to say.

The sportsmen love having visitors come out and watch or take part. Once in awhile, according to Beauvais, someone will be inspired to become a member of this "family" of historians.

The next rendezvous will be the second weekend of August.

Beauvais calls the "frontiersmen" good, honest, fun-loving people. They are also people working hard to preserve tradition - a piece of the past for all our children.

Local Tiny Miss is national finalist

Only 10 of the 24 Michigan Tiny Miss contestants hoping to move to the national level of the 1993 Little Miss of America pageant got the go-ahead last month.

Ellsworth's Breanna German was among them.

Not only did the talented 4-year-old place eighth against strong competition in that state final (all contestants were winners of earlier pageants) - she captured photographers' hearts as well.

Proof? A five-photo spread on the April 24-25 event in the *Detroit Free Press* featured Breanna (alone and with an adult) in two of them.

Her top-10 finish qualifies the Park Street resident to compete in the Little Miss of America national competition to be held in Hollywood July 21-26.

In spite of her youth, should she claim the title, it will not be her first. Far from it.

Breanna won her very first competition at 2 years, 11.5 months - so young she needed special permission to participate. That crown - as World's Most Beautiful Majorette Princess - came in 1991.

It was followed by the Drum Majorettes of America Miss Thanksgiving title in 1992 and the Michigan Toddler Model of 1993 title awarded earlier this year.

Breanna also won Michigan State Champion for Show Twirl for 3 to 7 year-olds in 1992, and was expected to try to reclaim that title in competition last week-end.

The talented young lady comes by her ability at least in part through her mother, Dawn German. An instructor of baton twirling and dance for Ellsworth Community Education, German is herself a multiple-award winner.

A nine-year member of the national champion Angels Twirl & Show Team, German said one of

her most enjoyable experiences was competing with her daughter at the 1992 mini-nationals, where the pair came in third.

Breanna will be accompanied to the national competition by her mother, father William and grandmother. In addition to vying for prizes that include \$1,000 savings bonds, cash awards and wardrobes, the tiny twirler will participate in the annual Kids Entertainment Expo, where

Hollywood's top agents routinely scout for new talent.

Breanna will also compete in the optional Commercial and Talent categories of the Little Miss of America competition.



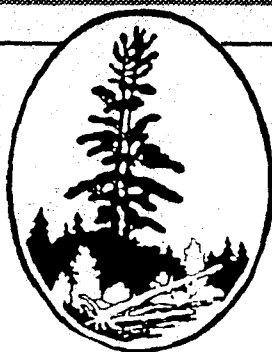
Public hearings set on plan affecting seniors

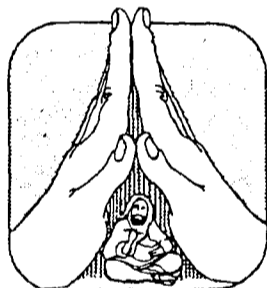

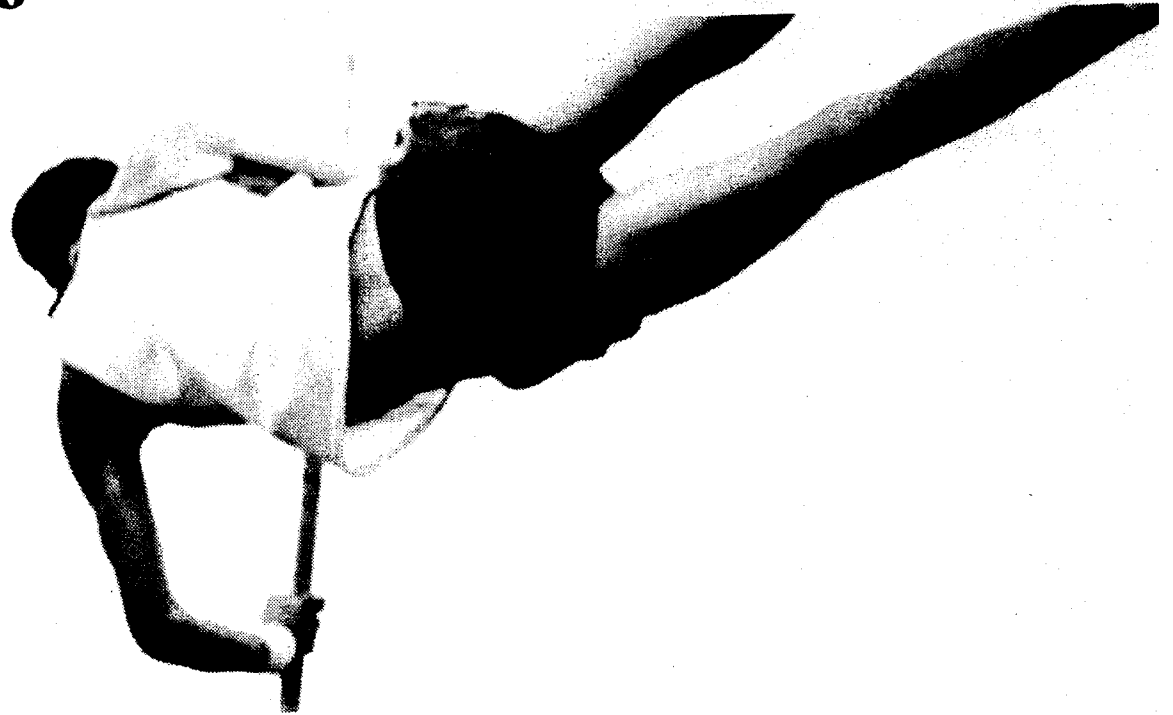

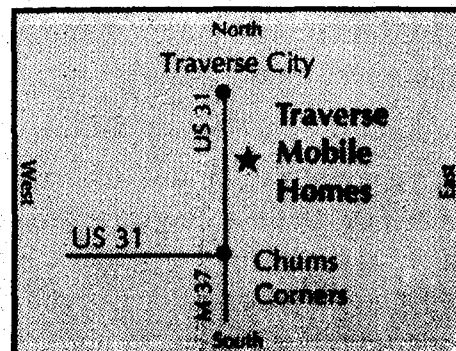

Board says yes to Proposal A

East Jordan residents can expect a 52 percent reduction of school operating taxes if proposal A passes. For a homeowner assigned a \$20,000 State Equalized Valuation (SEV), (\$15,000 to \$20,000 is the East Jordan community average), taxes would be reduced from \$750 per year to \$360.

To negate the savings, the homeowner would have to spend about \$19,500 on purchases subject to state sales tax.

Hanson emphasized the proposal will constitutionally guarantee the sales tax funds to schools. This should reassure voters burned by the broken promise that lottery profits would be earmarked for schools.

Additionally, Hanson promised that should Proposal A be accepted June 2, all millage proposals will be removed from the June 14 school election.

Unfortunately, if Proposal A fails, the project 1993-94 budget deficit will require a four-mill increase request.

"If it doesn't pass, we can predict quite forcefully there will be hundreds of Kalkaskas next year," Hanson warned.

Audience admonished

Board President Mary Jason announced that board meetings will be handled in a more formal manner. "School board meetings are held primarily to address school functions," Jason said.

The change was prompted by board concerns about recent use of the community comments portion of the meetings.

The tone of some of the comments has been accusatory and possibly slanderous. Jason stated the board will no longer allow the time to be used as a forum for personal remarks of a hurtful nature.

Property issues

The school board discussed several property issues. The swap with the City of East Jordan is proceeding well. The Brown Creek property adjacent to the schools will be received in exchange for the old Boswell Field.

The school board is recommending that the city develop Boswell Field into a Little League recreation complex.

Some trees will be harvested from school property. The income will be used for extending and improving the Brown Creek nature trail.

Two city lots were donated to the schools in the late 1970s to be used for the building trades program. As that program has been discontinued with no prospect for other uses of the properties, the school board decided to offer the lots for public sale.

Revenue collected from the sales is designated for the stadium endowment fund.

New kindergarten schedule

The board approved a resolution to operate an All-Day, Alternate-Day Kindergarten Program in 1993-94.

Along with the new program comes a commitment to implement developmentally appropriate curriculum practices on a yearly basis.

The full K-5 teaching staff will be part of the development process, in training as well as planning.

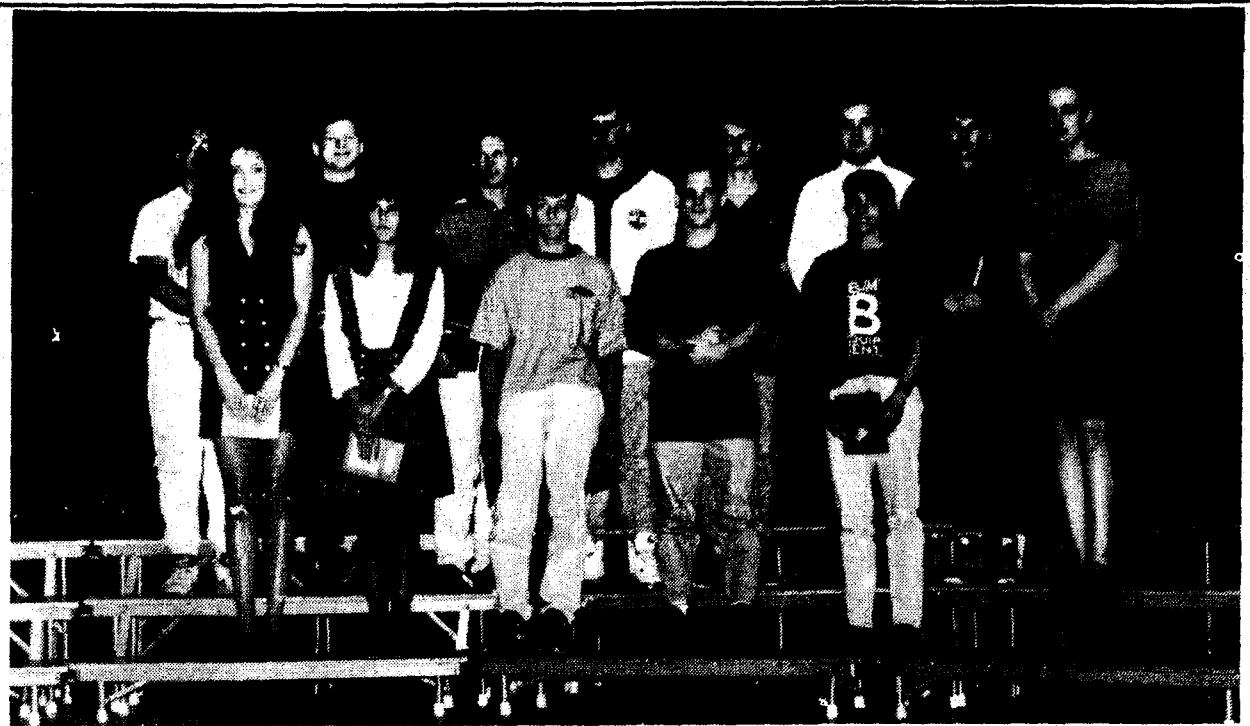
East Jordan high schoolers were honored Friday for their outstanding academic achievements at the EJHS Honors Convocation Ceremony.

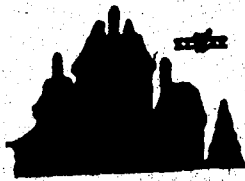

PUBLIC NOTICE SNOWPLOWS SERVICE - UNIMPROVED COUNTY ROADS

Because of limitations imposed by narrowness, trees, stumps, steep grades and soft surfaces, the Antrim County Road Commission is unable to provide snowplowing service on unimproved county roads. In order to provide such service, the unimproved road must be improved (including gravel surfacing) to minimum plowing standards.

The following procedure is established to provide for such road improvement to allow county snowplowing:

1. Person requesting improvement apply to the township board in the township where the road is located.
2. Township board requests the road commission to inspect the road and jointly determine if the improvement is justified. If the improvement is approved, the road commission will submit an estimate of the cost of the necessary improvement.
3. Upon approval of the project the road commission will agree to pay for 1/3 of its costs. The remaining 2/3 of the cost must be met by others, such as the township, the person requesting the service or other interested parties.
4. The road commission will schedule the work to be done. The person requesting the improvement shall deposit his share of the estimated cost with the road commission before the work is started. The township may authorize their participation in the work by resolution.

The above procedure is a restatement of existing road commission policy adopted on January 18, 1973. Persons living on or considering living on unimproved county roads are herewith advised of the necessary procedure for having such roads improved for wintertime plowing.

The above policy was adopted at the regular meeting of the Antrim County Road Commission on March 14, 1988.

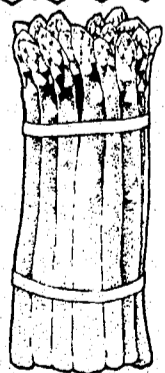

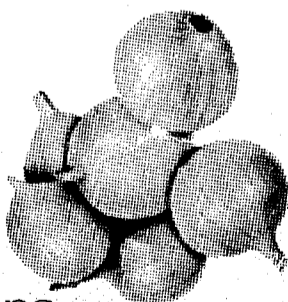

TOWNSHIP HALL-EASTPORT

Present: Schmidt, Cowell, Smedley, Hubbell, Dawson. Audience: 25.

1. Meeting called to order at 7:30 p.m. and the pledge given to the flag.

2. Minutes of previous meeting were approved and filed for audit.

3. Checks #8201-8248 totaling \$13,830.63 for Township (Check #8207 for \$123.07 Medicare payment in April); and Checks #2296-2323 totaling \$4,920.00 for Fire District (Check 2295 for \$13.12 Medicare payment in April) were approved and filed for audit.

4. Reports:

a) Constable reported there had been a PIA in Eastport on M88. Street light in front of Township Hall has been out for some time and Fire Chief will contact a supervisor at Consumers. He called attention to illegal parking on road to dock which will be observed closely.

b) Fire Chief reported 1 false alarm; 3 small fires called by DNR; 1 accident; 1 ambulance assist. Four firemen have completed hazardous material course; did an extrication exercise with ambulance and CL Rescue Unit. Dave Dorland completed his 33 week Level I Fire Fighter's Course and got a 97% on his written test. Congratulations Dave!!! He has met with Reg Bird re Firemen's Field Day to be held August 7th and there will be another meeting on May 18th.

P. Lundy requested Fire Chief to review the dispatching of fire equipment to serious accident on Hwy. 31 a few weeks ago.

c) Planning Commission held a Public Hearing on May 10th re a Special Use Permit for Torch Tip and minutes will be forthcoming.

d) No Zoning Board of Appeals report. Meeting will be held 5/12/93.

e) Zoning Adm. has issued 5 permits since last meeting and 1 critical dune permit.

f) Recreation discussed at end of meeting.

g) Road Committee discussed at end of meeting.

h) Schmidt and Knoechel will attend an MTA Seminar on Cable TV on June 3. They have contacted Buday Cable to submit an agreement and are reviewing one from Phoenix Cable. An attempt is being made to secure the number of houses in Torch Lake Township.

i) No report submitted for a possible Clean-up Day and Supervisor secured some information in a hurry before meeting. There were several options possible but no decisions could be made without more consideration being given to this problem. Ballpark figures for a pick-up ranged from \$5000.00-\$10,000.00. A lengthy discussion ensued and everyone in attendance was not in favor of the idea. By a show of hands less than 505 in audience wanted a Clean-up Day at a central location. To the qualified electors of all townships in Antrim County, Michigan notice is hereby given that a Special Election will be held on June 2, 1993 for the purpose of voting on the following proposal:

A PROPOSAL TO LIMIT ANNUAL INCREASES IN ALL PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENTS, REDUCE MAXIMUM SCHOOL OPERATING TAXES, INCREASE THE STATE SALES AND USE TAX RATES FROM 4% TO 6%, CONSTITUTIONALLY DEDICATE FUNDS FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS AND SET A PER-PUPIL FUNDING GUARANTEE

The proposed constitutional amendment would:

1) Limit for each property parcel (excluded new construction) annual assessment increase to 5% or the inflation rate, whichever is less. When property is sold or transferred, adjust assessment according to current market value.

2) Reduce maximum school operating taxes to 18 non-voted mills. Permit districts to levy up to 9 additional voted mills.

3) Reduce 50-mill maximum property tax limit to 40 mills.

4) Increase state sales and use tax rates to 6%. Dedicate this additional revenue and lottery proceeds to schools.

5) Establish a minimum state/local per-pupil funding guarantee, annually adjusted for revenue changes. Provide a minimum 3% per-pupil funding increase in 1993-1994.

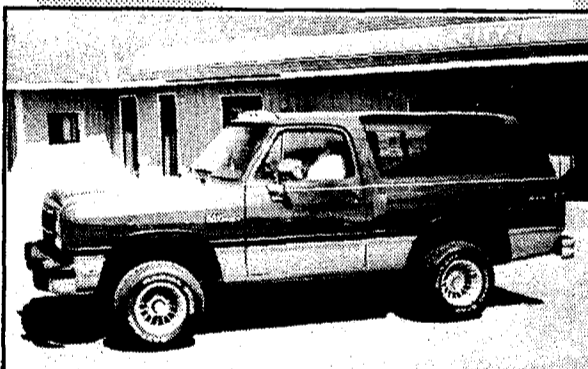

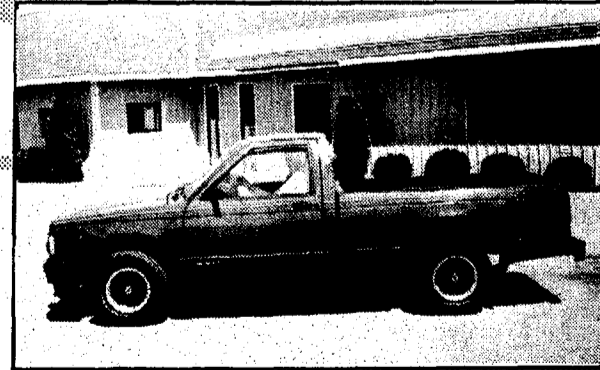
