

East Jordan top graduates announced





"I bought myself a job," Walquist said. "I figured it was the only way I was going to get back to work. Because of restrictions I didn't work for five-and-a-half years. I got tired of it."

Walquist said he got the idea of a sub station from Murray's sister-in-law who operated one downstate. He thought about franchises but decided to venture out on his own.

Walquist has kept the menu simple.

"I didn't want to overwhelm people," he explained.

The station offers a variety of eight-inch subs including the popular Italian and meatball sub and a selection of hotdogs like the kraut dog, coney dog, and smoked polish sausage. He also sells meats and cheeses from his deli case.





CMU buys area radio station


Central Michigan University has purchased radio station WLTO-FM, 103.9, in Harbor Springs, expanding the university's public radio network to five stations.

The new station will broadcast programming originating from WCMU-FM in Mount Pleasant. National Public Radio's "Morning Edition" and "All Things Considered" and classical, jazz and blues music are among the programs aired regularly by the CMU station.

CMU Public Radio currently is not able to reach communities along Lake Michigan because of high hills and dunes that block radio signals.

"With the acquisition of WLTO, our programming will reach all or parts of Emmet, Charlevoix, Leelanau, Grand Traverse, Antrim and Kalkaska

counties," said Randall Kapenga, director of public broadcasting technical services. "Presently, we reach into the eastern parts of some of these counties, but that's not where most of the people live. Soon we'll have the potential of reaching another 200,000 listeners."

Hunt said the purchase will help the university fulfill its mission to serve the public.

"Public radio can help educate beyond the classroom by providing information and a forum for new ideas," said Hunt. "The new station also will provide a stronger university presence in northwestern Michigan increasing alumni support and student recruitment."

CMU public radio could begin broadcasting in the area by the end of the year he said. New call letters will be selected.

Pets get cabin fever just like people. When spring arrives, pets will spend more time outside enjoying sunshine and warmer temperatures. Unfortunately, that also means they will be closer to other animals which may be ill, rabid wildlife, and other dangers that can cause disaster if precautions are not taken by owners.

Springtime is the perfect time to give a pet the gift of health, a "tune-up" at a veterinarian's office. For dogs, that should include an annual heartworm examination.


A heartworm examination consists of a blood test performed by a veterinarian. Dogs should be placed on heartworm preventative medicine on a schedule prescribed by your veterinarian. This medication comes in liquid, chewable or tablet forms, and should not be given until the dog has been tested.

According to Dr. Nancy Frank, a veterinarian with the Animal Industry Division of the Michigan Department of agriculture, heartworm is a widespread and serious canine disease in Michigan. "The disease is so easy to prevent but difficult to treat if it is advanced," said Dr. Frank. "Undiagnosed and untreated, it can be fatal to dogs."

Frank said signs of serious infection include: lethargy, coughing - sometimes with blood, and a history of not receiving heartworm preventative medicine. Most cases are detected early in a routine exam and can be treated successfully.

Other canine and feline precautions and concerns include:

• Checking for internal parasites which can be done by giving the veterinarian the animal's stool sample.



• Fleas increase during the spring and reach their peak in late summer. If your dog or cat starts scratching, check for fleas. There are several effective remedies available through your veterinarian.

• Be sure vaccinations are up-to-date, particularly if you take your pet to public places such as beaches, parks or dog or cat shows.

• Adult dogs should be vaccinated annually for distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis, parvo virus, para influenza, and for rabies every three years.

 Adult cats should be vaccinated annually for distemper and respiratory disease, and for rabies every three years. A vaccination for feline leukemia is also available.

During warmer weather, more cats and dogs are outside and the incidence of fighting and accidents, such as being hit by a car, increases. It is a good idea to know where your pet is at all

times; keeping your pet in sight and under control is healthy for your pet and helpful to your neighbors, too!

Long neglected as a health concern for animals, dental care is now accepted as an important part of routine examinations. Pet toothpaste can be purchased by owners to be used at home.

In addition to the vaccinations and general health care measures described above, older pets need extra love and attention. Consult with your veterinarian about a good health program which includes a physical examevery six months. Blood tests are routinely done on older pets to check the function of the animal's organs.


Open burning of yard wastes is also the single most common cause of wildfires in Michigan, responsible for over one-quarter of all wildfires.

"Most wildfires occur on warm spring days when people are burning yard wastes from backyard clean-up chores," said Bruce Chellis, Banks Township Fire Department Chief. "Composting or mulching yard wastes is a safe, nuisance-free alternative to open burning which also eliminates the risk of wildfire. Mulching simply refers to any technique where organic matter (such as grass clippings, leaves, small brush, etc.) is spread in thin layers on the surface of the ground and left to decompose naturally. Grass clippings, leaves and compost can be placed around garden vegetables and flowers to keep down weeds and retain moisture.

In about as much time as it takes to burn yard wastes, these same materials can be prepared for composting. Composting can be done in a variety of ways, ranging from passive methods where the yard wastes are left in a pile to decompose over

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
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Lancers complete season sweep



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

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team of Erica Olafsson, Inman, Spence and Richards also snagged a second place spot.


Coach Dennis Snarey congratulated his team on their super effort at the Wednesday meet, and the hard work all season that made it happen.

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
