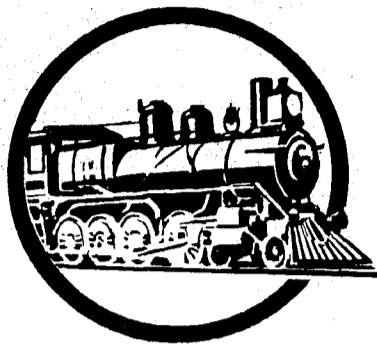

Curriculum, directives sent back to teachers

With several members missing, the Human Development Committee (HDC) of the East Jordan School Board conducted a quiet working meeting.

Representatives of Concerned Parents of East Jordan were conspicuously absent.

The opening audience forum drew only one comment.

"The committee is doing a great job," said an audience member. Hearty applause was the response from the rest of the audience.

The purpose for the May 24 meeting was to review the 5-8 grade human sexuality curriculum.

Affected teachers completed lesson plans and gathered resources for

review by the community and HDC. In planning the curriculum, teachers considered school board guidelines, HDC concepts and enablers and parent/community comments from public viewing of the materials.

The fifth-grade curriculum will introduce the subject of puberty separately to boys and girls.

Students will be separated in order to promote freedom of discussion. Children may have many questions as they face the onset of puberty.

The materials will be a series of videos and charts.

There was discussion on two issues. Some committee members felt there should be instruction on the subject of intercourse at this level.

"Kids need to know about it before they do it," said David Downton.

Dr. Rod Tinney agreed. "They're certainly talking about it on the bus alot sooner than age 13. It should be a basic understanding that intercourse can cause reproduction."

The original intention was to introduce the subject to seventh or eighth-graders.

The committee agreed to insert the concept into the fifth-grade cur-

riculum, as well as a brief mention of masturbation as a normal activity.

Committee member Charlotte McArthur protested the video presented to fifth-grade boys because it "shows scenes of masturbation."

This was denied by all members who had seen the film (McArthur had not.) It was pointed out that the video does briefly mention the subject, but shows or implies no act.

"If you want to talk about students being bombarded with inappropriate material, check our local video stores," said elementary principal Charles Hershberger. He supports use of the video and follow-up assurances that masturbation is a normal process.

The HDC accepted incorporation of the grade five curriculum. McArthur was the only dissenting vote.

The discussion of the middle school (grades six to eight) curriculum was more complex.

"I feel the curriculum has been watered down," began HDC chair Tammy Jackson.

Teachers, following procedures,

sent the HDC their lesson plans with the recommendation that contraception, sexually transmitted diseases (STDs), and abortion be saved for discussion at the high school level.

Several committee members felt strongly that high school is too late to present these issues. Barb Malpass presented statistics on eighth and ninth-grade pregnancies in the East Jordan area over the past few years.

The committee agreed these issues must be covered at the middle school level, within the contest of broader subject areas.

Friendship, dating, relationships and decision-making is one unit to be presented. Rape, date rape, sexual harassment and abuse will be included in this unit.

In the area of family, sex and love, the curriculum will deal with the subject of human sexual response. Touching, kissing and self-discipline will be addressed.

Contraception will be discussed within the contest of abstinence being the best prevention.

Abstinence will be emphasized throughout the curriculum as the

City examines fireworks fund

This will probably be the last year the City of East Jordan donates a large sum toward the Fourth of July fireworks display.

At the city council meeting June 1, there was a general consensus that the city is providing too much of the funding.

According to council member Guy Vallance, the Chamber of Commerce used to contribute more. He feels the council should consider the donation more carefully in 1994.

Mayor Russ Peck agrees. "I don't think we should be spend-

ing our taxpayer's money to fire into the sky," he said.

This year's donation of \$5000, having already been budgeted, was approved. Council felt it was too late to change the expected support for the 1993 celebration.

New equipment

The city council passed a resolution to enter into a lease/purchase agreement with Caterpillar Financial Services. A new loader will be purchased at a cost of \$83,800.

Charter commissioners

Clerk Kathy O'Rear spoke of a need for charter commissioner candidates. Of the nine positions necessary for the job of charter revision,

only two petitions have been requested.

To be placed on the ballot, potential commissioners have to collect ten signatures from city residents. The petitions are to be turned in by June 15.

Bridge Club donation

City Ambulance Administrator Bernard Hammond reported a \$250 donation from the East Jordan Bridge Club. The money will be used to purchase a special child transport.

Several members of council commented on the good work of the Bridge Club. Plans were made for special recognition at a council meeting in the near future.

Bear license deadline near

The Department of Natural Resources reminds hunters that June 15 is the deadline to apply for a 1993 Michigan bear harvest license.

The season is Sept. 10 through Oct. 21, but dates vary for some management units, of which seven are in the Upper Peninsula and one in the northern Lower Peninsula. Specific hunting season dates are listed on the harvest license.

Each applicant may apply as an individual or with a partner. The application fee is \$14.35 for residents. There is no application fee for Senior Hunt license holders who must obtain their application from a DNR district or regional office.

Lucas recall petition being certified

By June 5, initial steps will be completed certifying signatures on the petitions to recall Central Lake Township Clerk Marilyn Lucas.

The signed petitions were filed with Antrim County Clerk Laura Sexton May 21, six

months from the time Lucas took office for her current term. Sexton is examining the signatures for proper form.

Normally, the clerk of the township in which the recall is taking place would certify the voter registration status of the signers. However, in this case

that also falls within the county clerk's duties since Lucas, as subject of recall, cannot certify the status.

The deadline for Lucas to challenge the petitions, 30 days from the filing with the county clerk, will be June 21, and Sexton will make the determination on challenged

signatures.

Within five days after that, Sexton will rule on the validity of any challenges, and if petitions are approved will submit a proposed date of recall election to the county Special Election Scheduling Committee.

The actual election must take place within

60 days of that submission to the committee.

Apparently, all these steps will take place since Lucas maintains she will not resign from her position as township clerk. She said she will leave office only when the voters decide she should because the recall movement does

not necessarily reflect the feeling of the majority of Central Lake Township voters.

In addition, Lucas expressed the opinion that the prospect of a recall election may be moot when petition signatures, as well as circulator signatures, are examined this week.

Eastport man killed in accident

An Eastport man was killed and two people were injured in a two-car accident Sun., June 6 on East Torch Lake Drive.

Antrim County Sheriff Dale Roggenbeck said Danny Lambert, 43, was killed when his 1985 Mazda was struck by a 1985 Ford driven by Tim Sommers, 24, of Central Lake. Roggenbeck said both cars were southbound on East Torch Lake Drive when

Sommers pulled out to pass the Lambert car near the intersection of Meggison Road at about 5:48 p.m.

Lambert, who was attempting to make a left turn on to Meggison Road, was hit broadside. Roggenbeck said the vehicle went into a ditch, flipped over once and landed upright. Lambert was taken to Munson Medical Center in Traverse City, where he was pronounced dead of his injuries.

Sommers and a passen-

ger, Michelle Wirebaugh, 27, of Ellsworth, were taken to Charlevoix Area Hospital. Wirebaugh was treated and released while Sommers was held overnight before being released Monday.

Blood samples have been taken from both drivers for analysis. The accident remains under investigation.

Assisting at the accident scene were units from the Antrim County Sheriff Department, Central Lake Fire and Rescue, Eastport Ambu-

lance, Bellaire Rescue and Ambulance, and Emergency Services #2 and North Flight from Traverse City.

Cash stolen from Cary's

The Antrim County Sheriff Department was dispatched May 31 to the scene of a breaking and entering at Cary's Self Serve in Central Lake. Antrim County Sheriff Dale Roggenbeck said it appears unknown persons kicked the back door in to gain entry.

Deputies estimated \$300-400 in cash was taken. The incident is under investigation by the sheriff department.

Shaw residence on Rushton Road were a small refrigerator, ice chest, tents, an outboard motor, television sets, VCRs and assorted food items.

Some items are still

missing, including a 20-man tent, a lantern, a marine radio, a metal hotplate and miscellaneous food items.

"The officers did a good job on this," Roggenbeck said.

Hayo-Went-Ha B&E solved

The Antrim County Sheriff Department has arrested two adults and placed three other suspects under investigation in connection with the recent breaking and entering of YMCA Camp Hayo-Went-Ha on East Torch Lake Drive. All of the suspects are residents of Central Lake.

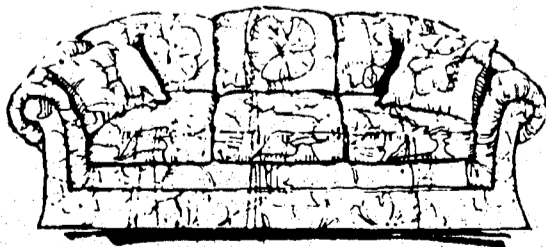
Deputies said an extensive amount of stolen property was recovered at the residence of one of the suspects. Dwayne Shaw, 19, and John Potter, 18, were arrested. Antrim County Sheriff Dale Roggenbeck said two other adults and one juvenile are being questioned.

"We had received information from an informant, which was relayed to Deputy Terry Johnson," stated Roggenbeck. "He pursued the matter and came up with the property."

Roggenbeck estimated the total value of the property taken was between \$8-12,000. Among the property recovered at the

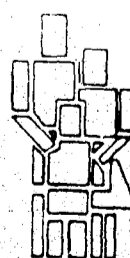

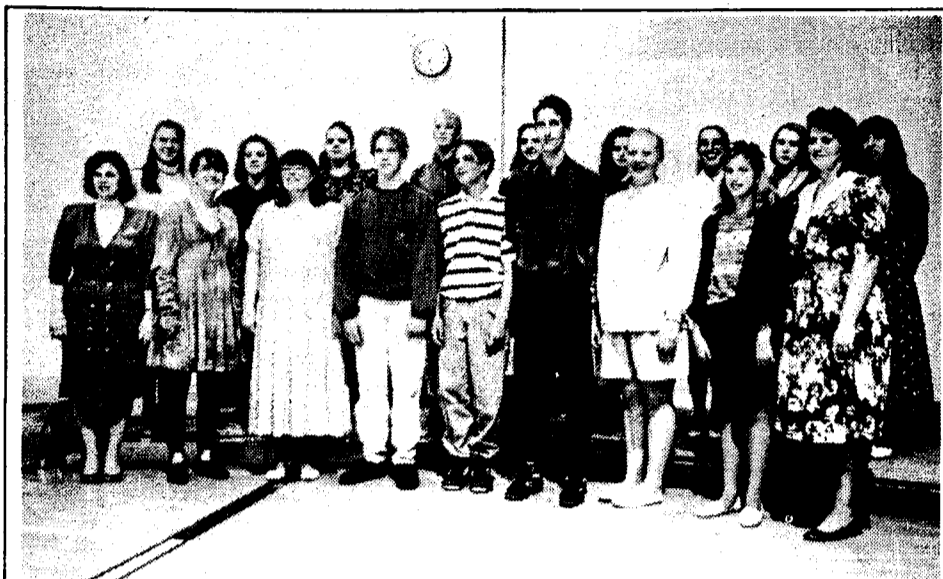
The enthusiastic audience gave standing ovations to all three groups.

"We have a few extra pieces to play if you encourage us!" quipped Schoensee before the finale.

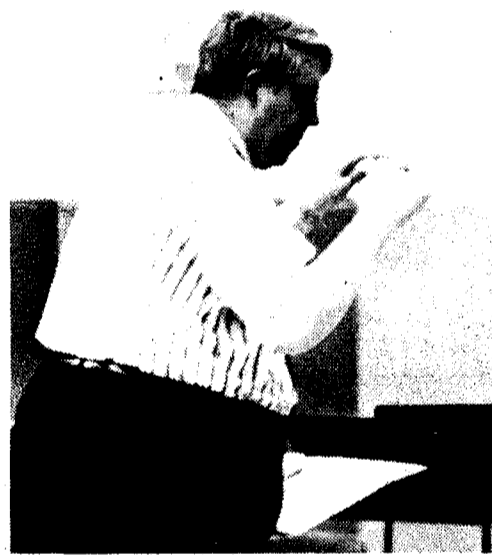
The audience was delighted to comply. After highlights from

DNR requests public input

The Department of Natural Resources will hold public hearings to receive comments on the revised Natural River zoning rules for the Jordan River. Meetings are set for June 10 at 2 p.m. in Charlevoix at the Charlevoix City Library, 107 Clinton St., and at 7 p.m. in Bellaire at the Antrim County Building, 205 E. Cayuga.

Existing rules are being revised to simplify permit procedures for riparian landowners and local zoning review boards and to assure consistent administration of the program. The revisions will provide a stronger legal base with which

to make decisions regarding development of the river corridor, and will also reflect amendments to the county and township rural zoning enabling statutes.

These rules will not affect county or township ordinances with existing approved Natural River zoning provisions. If the county or township

adopts acceptable Natural River zoning, the local ordinance will take precedence over state zoning.

Residents interested in making comments can also submit written statements to the DNR Land and Water Management Division, Natural Rivers Program, P.O. Box 30028, Lansing 48909, until June 30.

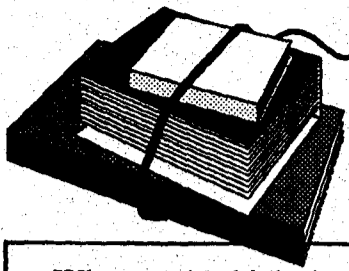

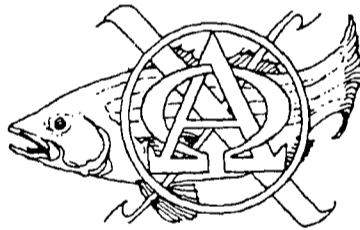

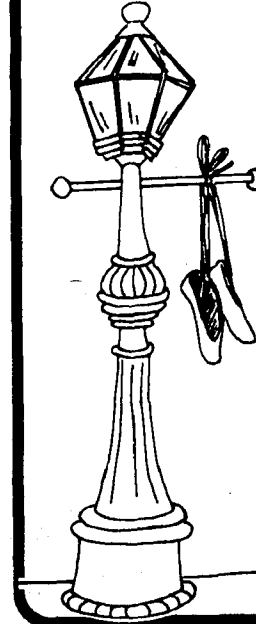

But the Lancers held on to their 3-2 lead and added to it in the next three innings, keeping Central Lake in check the rest of the way.

Tim Koivisto pitched the win, striking out 15. Mike Alfred hit a home run in the third, while singles by Mike Warner and Jeremy DeYoung ignited the final scoring rally for Ellsworth.

Mancelona and Bellaire then took the field, and for five innings dueled

for dominance. Mancelona took the lead in the second on a Rick Johnson walk; with Tom Castle sacrificing him to second and Jason Helwig singling him across for the 1-0 lead. That score stood until the sixth inning.

That's when Mancelona collected four runs on three walks, two wild pitches and an Al Cooper sacrifice fly. Bellaire eked out its only run in the bottom of the sixth, when Scott Goodwin doubled and then scored

on an error. Dave Dyal and Rick Johnson doubled in the seventh to help Mancy score its final two runs in the 7-1 win.

Dave Lanning pitched the win, while Ryan Fischer took the loss.

The final game between Ellsworth and Mancelona saw Ellsworth pick up a run in the second on a walk, stolen base and sacrifice fly. The Lancers then took advantage of a pair of key Mancelona errors to score three in the third and take a 4-0 lead. Mancy countered with a two-run double by David Lanning in their half of the third, but they would score no more.

Ellsworth added an insurance run

in the fifth to finish matters 5-2 and take the championship.

Jared Lucas pitched the win, with Koivisto tossing an inning of relief to secure the victory.

Mancelona got a two-for-four performance from Al Cooper in his final senior game. Brian Lanning struck out four, with Jason Helwig, Jordan Harvey and Gary Straight all adding hits to the total for the final time this season.

"We didn't get the bats we wanted at the time we wanted them," summed up Mancy coach Linden Bielecki. "But we did exceptionally well this year, and everyone is looking forward to next season."

Ironmen runner-up in Great Northern League

The 3200 relay of Aaron Jeska, James Weiser, Aaron Czaplicki and Steve Buyze were 4th (9:15), along with Andy Bowdell in the high jump (5'10"), Ryan Letter in the shot (42'1"), and discus (115'), and the 1600 relay of Kevin Wilcox, Craig Smith, Andy Bowdell, and Mark Rudolph (3:40).

The Ironmen had a great all-area honor roll track meet with places in nine events, and 16 medals by 10 athletes. Brian Wildfong set a meet record in winning the shot (58'5"). Johnson, Aaron Biehl, and Andy Fisher were 2nd in the 400 relay (:46.4), and Fisher was 2nd in the 100 (:11.37).

The 800 relay of Johnson, Craig Smith, Biehl and Adam Webster was 3rd (1:36.4) and Johnson was 3rd in the 100 (:11.5).

NOTICE PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED 1993-94 BUDGET AND LEVY OF PROPERTY TAX

Please take notice that on Monday, June 14, 1993, at 7:00 o'clock p.m. in the high school media center, the Ellsworth Community School Board of Education, pursuant to Michigan Compiled Laws, will hold a Public Hearing to consider the district's proposed 1993-94 General Operating Budget and to consider the levying of an additional proposed millage rate of 1.47 mills for operating purposes pursuant to Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1982.

The Board of Education may not adopt its proposed 1993-94 budget until after the public hearing. A copy of the proposed 1993-94 budget is available for public inspection during normal business hours at the Ellsworth Board of Education Office located in the Ellsworth High School, Ellsworth, Michigan.

Additionally, the Board of Education has the complete authority to establish that 35.93 mills be levied in 1993 if millage election proposals receive a favorable vote.

The maximum additional proposed millage rate would increase revenues for operating purposes from ad valorem property tax levies in 1993 otherwise permitted by Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1982, by four and two-tenths percent (04.2%).

The Ellsworth Board of Education will levy only the present authorized millage rate of 35.93 mills in 1993. THERE WILL BE NO INCREASE IN THE MILLAGE RATE. The Board of Education will NOT increase the Ellsworth Community School's voter authorized millage rate of 35.93 mills.

The purpose of this Hearing is to receive testimony and discuss both the school district's proposed 1993-94 General Operating Budget and the levy of the 1993 additional millage rate. Following the public hearing, the Board of Education may adopt its 1993-94 budget, and the Board of Education may approve the levy of all or any portion of the proposed millage rate.

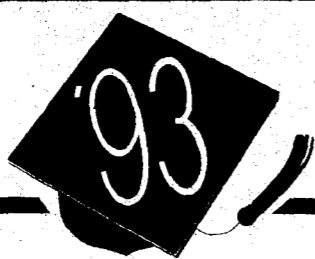

IRS offers toll-free number



"So far, almost 1.9 million Michigan taxpayers have received their 1991 federal tax refund, averaging about \$1,000 each," said IRS district director John Hummel. "But about 1 million Michigianians are still waiting."

Hummel said individuals may call the IRS toll-free number 1-800-829-4477 to receive pre-recorded information, such as when their federal income tax refund is scheduled to be mailed.

Taxpayers calling the automated refund system, or teletax, should have a copy of their tax return available when they call. They will need to know the social security numbers, filing status, and exact amount of refund expected.

"We're working to make taxes less taxing this year, and our automated refund system should help," Hummel said.

DNR promotes boating safety

The Department of Natural Resources reminds residents that June 6-12 is National Safe Boating Week, sponsored by the National Safe Boating Council to launch the recreational boating season.

"We strongly support the goals of Safe Boating Week in Michigan," DNR Director Roland Harnes said, "by providing boating safety classes for beginning boaters, stressing the importance of wearing personal flotation devices by every person who gets into a

boat and reminding them of the dangers of drinking alcohol while boating."

A Michigan law passed last year provides stiffer penalties for operating a boat under the influence of alcohol. It makes it a five-year felony for causing serious injury, and a 15-year felony for causing death while drunk boating.

Marine safety officers may require a preliminary breath test of boaters while they are still on the water and can ticket a boater who refuses one.

According to Coast Guard statistics, alcohol was involved in 50 percent of boating fatalities nationwide in 1991.

"Personal flotation devices don't do any good if you don't wear them," said Sgt. Ozzie Bryand of the DNR's Law Enforcement Division. "In fact, we see more boaters sitting on them than wearing them! Our inspectors estimate that 80 percent of drowning victims could have been saved if they had been wearing PFDs."

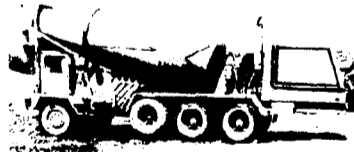

only intelligent choice for elementary or middle school students.

Seventh grade will study anatomy. Boys and girls will again be separated for discussion groups, but both sexes will see the same materials.

"The Biological Male" and "The Biological Female" will be presented as an anatomy resource.

Eighth graders will be presented units on intimacy, marriage and parenthood.

The HDC had a discussion on the issue of homosexuality. It was agreed that the subject is important to discuss non-judgementally.

Often adolescents must deal with feelings of attraction to the same sex. This is a normal part of puberty. The committee felt that definition and discussion can help ease secret concerns students may have about their own sexuality.

Also, as the issue has had tremendous media exposure, it is important that children have true definitions rather than "street" definitions.

Barb Malpass emphasized the importance of learning tolerance and the far-reaching effects of an intolerant attitude.

Since the HDC had so many recommendations, it was voted to send the curriculum back to middle school teachers with the directives.

The next meeting was tentatively set for the end of June. The committee will review the adjusted middle school and the high school curriculum.
