



OUR WEATHER



Changes may be coming for emergency services

A change may be in store for East Jordan Fire Department and Ambulance service in Eveline Township.

According to Eveline Township Supervisor Dave Willson, residents at Nowland Lake have requested their coverage from Charlevoix instead of East Jordan. They believe the response time would be faster.

If the change is made, East Jordan emergency crews would respond only as far as Holy Island Road on the west side of Lake Charlevoix.

On the east side, response area would be the East Jordan School District boundaries to the west of Wurn Road.

There would be no loss of revenues from the boundary changes. Both Charlevoix and Boyne City have approved the proposed changes.

The Ways and Means and Public Safety Committee will review the changes before the council makes a decision.

In other news City Clerk Kathy O'Rear informed the council that 11 candidates have filed nominating petitions for the nine-member Charter Commission. The names will appear on the November ballot.

Also on the ballot, voters will determine whether the city charter should be revised.

Consumers gives back to community

Employees from Consumers Power Company's Big Rock Point nuclear power plant recently delivered checks to two East Jordan area organizations.

The Charlevoix-East Jordan United Way received an \$855 donation based on employee contributions.

A \$1,000 check was presented to the Raven Hill Discovery Center in East Jordan from the Consumers Power Foundation. Raven Hill provides a hands-on learning experience for individuals, students, teachers and families in the areas of science, history, and the arts.

The check was delivered by Kevin Shields. reactor engineer, who serves on a four-person Corporate Citizenship Team at the plant which reviews all community financial requests.

Big Rock Point Public Affairs Director Tim Petrosky said it is important to be active and give back to the community.

"The money is set aside from shareholder funds because we feel it is the right thing to do," Petrosky explained.

The foundation was set up several years ago to promote Michigan growth and enhancement, education, social welfare, health care, culture and

the arts, and civic and community improve-

Area organizations submit applications to their local offices, Petrosky explained. Recommendations are forwarded to the company's headquarters in Jackson.

In addition, the foundation's Volunteer Investment Program encourages the utility's employees to volunteer a minimum of 60 hours a year to community service activities. The employees can then apply for a grant of up to \$500 for the organization he or she is involved with.

This was the case last year when the foundation

donated \$1,000 over a two-year period to the local Math Counts program sponsored by the Mackinac Straits Chapter of the Michigan Society of Engineers.

"It was a perfect match forus," Petrosky said. "It met the education goal, and we had employee involvement as well."

The amount of money awarded to non-profit organizations varies from year to year, Petrosky commented, depending on the financial requests received and funds avail-




"Wicked Prince" on stage in East Jordan





Summer sun exposure can be hazardous

Most people equate a farmer's tan, sunburned arms, face and neck, with working in the field all day and sometimes make jokes about it.

Health professionals, however, do not see anything funny about overexposure to the sun, which can lead to skin cancer, a serious problem for some 600,000 people each year.

"The effect of the sun on a person's skin is cumulative, so as a person ages, the chances for developing skin cancer increase," says Howard Doss, Michigan State University Extension farm safety specialist.

Medical statistics show that the odds that a person will develop skin cancer in his or her lifetime are one in six. For fairskinned persons the odds are one in three.

Medical research also indicates that the incidence of skin cancer has been increasing at a rate faster than the incidence of any other cancer except lung cancer in women.

A 1990 screening of 600 Wisconsin farmers revealed that 46 percent had precancerous skin lesions and 8 percent had skin cancer.

People should wear broad-brimmed hats or caps that have neck protection, full-length pants and long sleeved, lightcolored shirts. Sunscreen with a rating of 15 or higher should be applied about every two hours.

Whenever possible. avoid the midday sun. Doss advises. The greatest potential for sun damage to skin occurs when a person's shadow is shorter than he is.

Protect yourself against tick-borne Lyme disease

Lyme disease is a serious debilitating bacterial illness that is spread by the bite of a tick. It is the most common tick-borne disorder in the United States; 583 cases have been reported in Michigan since 1979 The highest risk months are May, June and July. In 1992, 43 cases were reported in Michigan.

Lyme disease is hard to diagnose because its symptoms can vary from person to person and involve different parts of the body. Also fewer than

one-half of people with the illness remember a tick bite. Immature (nymph) ticks are easily overlooked because they are not much bigger than a pinhead. The most obvious early symptom of Lyme disease is a red skin rash which occurs within the first 3-to-32 days after the bite. The rash usually breaks out near the bite site within a week or two and develops into a reddish oval two to six inches across. It may be as large as 20 inches. Without treatment, it

soon fades.

The rash may have a firm center, feel warm to the touch, or provide a burning sensation, and disappear briefly, only to reappearelsewhere on the body. Occasionally, the rash shows central clearing and resembles a bull's eye. Even larger rashes can be missed because they are faint or occur on the back, groin, or arm-

Up to 30% of people with Lyme disease do not develop a rash. Flu-like symptoms may occur and

include fever, headache. nausea, aching joints and muscles and fatigue. They may be the first sign of illness. If untreated, Lyme disease may cause heart, eye, nervous system problems and chronic arthritis weeks to years later. If you notice symptoms after being in a tickinfested area, even though you were not aware of a bite, see your doctor.

To protect yourself during the spring and summer months, stay out of continued on page 9

areas likely to be infested with ticks. When exposure is unavoidable, take these precautions:

- * Wear light-colored protective clothing (long sleeves that are snug at the wrist, shirt tucked in at the waist, and pants tucked into socks or boots).
- * Treat clothing with a repellent that contains permethrin, which kills ticks on contact. Apply DEET which repels, but does not kill ticks, to clothes and exposed skin. On the skin, use solutions
- with low concentrations (under 30% DEET). Avoid using DEET solutions on the face, on infants, or small children.
- * Do a thorough selfinspection when you come indoors, and inspect children when they come in. Studies show that transmission of the disease is unlikely if the tick has been attached for less than 24 to 48 hours.
- * Make sure pets are well protected with tick collars and powders, and check them daily during tick season.

- *Avoid brush piles, tall grass, and other vegetation where ticks may be.
- * Mow grass short around your house and outbuildings.
- * Take a thorough shower or bath and wash clothing after working outside in the underbrush.

If you discover a tick attached to your skin:

- * Use tweezers (not your fingers), and grasp the tick behind the head and slowly but firmly pull it straight out. Do not twist or jerk the tick. If the head is left in the skin, do not probe for it, but consult your doctor. Oth-
- erwise, treat the site as you would an ordinary wound.
- * Wash hands and the bite area, and apply antiseptic. If you must touch the tick, cover your fingers with a tissue, then wash your hands thoroughly.
- * Save the tick. Put it in a small container or jar labeled with the date, the body location of the bite, and where you think the tick came from. Put a small piece of wet paper or cotton in with the live tick. The health department will have the tick identified and tested for

Lyme disease. Dead ticks should be placed in alcohol and be sent for identification.

* Watch the area of the bite for the appearance of a rash that resembles a bull's eye. If one appears or if you notice vague symptoms such as a headache, fever, chills, fatigue, stiff neck, or painful joints and muscles, see your doctor immediately.

Lyme disease does not have to be a problem for people in Northern Michigan. Proper protective actions, along with early treatment can minimize problems related to

this disease. Since there appears to be no tick repellent available that can be used repeatedly on the skin of infants and children without potential allergic or toxic effects, the best approach at present may be twice daily body search and evening shower or bath following exposure to ticks. Kirtland warbler population growing

Michigan's population of the endangered Kirtland's warbler is the largest in 30 years, with 485 singing males reported after a 1993 Department of Natural Resources count of the birds completed in mid-June.

That's a 22 percent increase over the 1992 count and the largest number reported since

502 singing males were counted in 1961. The numbers have increased every year since the record low of 167 Kirtland's warbler singing males were counted in 1987.

DNR Director Roland Harmes said, "The nearly four million trees planted on 2,300 acres of state and federal lands this year under the Kirtland's warbler management program will help provide additional habitat for the warblers in six to 10 years, and we commend DNR wildlife biologists and others who participated in this massive planting effort."

Jack pines are planted each year under a cooperative state/federal Kirtland's warbler management program to provide future habitat where the entire world's population of the tiny, bluegray and yellow Kirtland's warblers nest in northern Michigan.

DNR wildlife biologist Jerry Weinrich of the Houghton Lake Wildlife Research Station said the plantations showed dramatic increases in the number of Kirtland's warblers using them this year. Thirty-four percent of the warblers (166 males) were located in the areas specifically planted for the warblers' nesting habitat.

"Ninety-five percent of the warblers were located in Oscoda, Ogemaw and Crawford counties this year," DNR Endangered Species Coordinator Tom Weise said. "The number of singing males found in eight northern Lower Peninsula counties were: Alcona - 11; Crawford - 34; Iosco - 3; Kalkaska - 4; Ogemaw - 81; Oscoda - 344; Otsego - 3; and Roscommon - 4.

The Kirtland's warbler survey is conducted each year during a 10-day period during the first two weeks of June.

The meeting will held in the library of Elk Rapids High School on E. Third St. (Ames to Rivershore to E. Third) in Elk Rapids at 7:30 p.m. on Tues., July 13. The Planning Commissions of Elk Rapids, Milton, Torch Lake Townships and the Village of Elk Rapids will attend. The meeting is open to the public and the Commissions believe that many will be interested in these efforts to conserve the countryside.

How to handle summer dental emergencies

July brings summer into full swing, and summer means vacation travel for millions of Americans. Whether driving the family across the U.S. to see the Grand Canyon, or jetting off to Europe, packing a dental emergency kit is good protection against a spoiled vacation.

"Dental emergencies can happen anywhere and anytime. Being prepared can make the difference between handling a dental problem and getting on with your fun, or having it ruin your plans," says Jay Werschky, DDS, president of the Michigan Dental Association. Pack these basics for your trip: aspirin or a substitute, gauze, cotton, floss, oil of cloves, paraffin and "Dental First Aids Facts," a handy pocket reference

available from the Michigan Dental Association.

Here are some tips on how to handle the following dental problems:

mouth well with warm water and gently floss between the teeth to remove any trapped food. Use a cold compress on the outside of the cheek if there is swelling, and take a pain reliever. Never place an aspirin directly on the tooth or gum.

Broken Tooth: Rinse with warm water, apply cold compresses to the cheek, and get to a dentist as soon as possible.

Knocked Out Tooth: Rinse the tooth lightly in running water, but don't scrub it, and touch it as little as possible. Put the tooth back in the socket and hold it firmly in place. If you can't re-insert the tooth, keep it in a glass or container of water or milk, to keep the nerve clean and moist. Get to a dentist within 30 minutes, if possible, to improve the chances of the tooth being saved.

Objects Wedged Between Teeth: Gently remove the object with floss and avoid cutting the gums. Do not use a sharp instrument.

Lost Filling: Apply oil of cloves to cotton, squeeze out the excess and place a small piece of the cotton in the cavity. Or, cover the cavity with paraffin, and take aspirin as needed.

Bitten Tongue or Lip: Put direct pressure on the bleeding area with a clean cloth and apply a cold compress to minimize swelling. If the bleeding doesn't stop, go to a nearby hospital.

Possible Fractured Jaw: Immobilize the jaw by any means, such as a handkerchief, necktie or towel around the head, and go to a hospital emergency room as quickly as possible.

The above tips are only temporary emergency measures. If you are away from home, look in the Yellow Pages under "dentist" to find the local or state dental society's number to get a referral. Or, ask the hospital emergency room to recommend a dentist.
