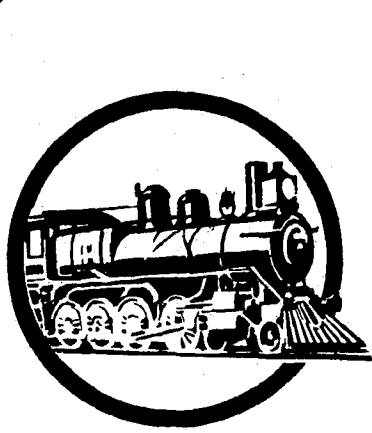

Firefighters express concern over drug policy

Some East Jordan city employees, including firefighters, are unhappy with the recently established policy for a drug-free workplace.

Thomas Breakey presented a letter to the city council at the July 6 meeting. He expressed his concern that the policy is putting all structures under the protection of the East Jordan Fire Department at risk.

Fire Chief Tony Postmus submitted a petition signed by 11 firefighters who were in general agreement with Breakey.

At issue is the restriction for employees reporting to work with a .04 percent or higher blood alcohol content. Breakey and the firefighters feel this figure is too low.

City Attorney Scott Beatty explained .04 was chosen because the state considers the owner of a commercial drivers license to be driving impaired at that blood alcohol level.

According to Police Chief John Imeson, a regular licensed driver would need to be .07 percent to be considered impaired. Driving Under the Influence is set at .10 percent blood alcohol.

"I am troubled by the very real possibility that the fire alarm will sound and nobody will show up because they have had a drink," read Breakey. "I encourage the council to act fast."

Breakey also contended that adrenaline negates the effect of alcohol in the system, unless the person is completely stoned.

East Jordan businessman Arlon Leonard agreed. "The council is jeopardizing the fire safety of the people of East Jordan," he asserted.

Mayor Pro-tem, Greg Chappuies, sitting in for vacationing Russ Peck commented, "I'm sure the intent is to balance the safety of the fire department personnel as well as structures."

Breakey and the firefighters also raised the issue of the city council being excluded from the policy directives.

City Superintendent Bob Johnson called attention to the accusation. He said the council was exempted

at his own recommendation.

"There is no way to enforce this with administration," he explained. He also noted that the council, unlike any other city employees, must answer to the people at the ballot box.

The discussion became heated to the point that Chappuies pounded the gavel. The council decided to send the issue to the personnel and public safety committees for further consideration.

Highlights of the City of East Jordan Drug Free Workplace policy:

- No employee will engage in illegal possession ... of controlled substances whether on or off the job.
- Employees may not drink alcoholic beverages during paid time, on city properties during work hours, during meal periods if returning to work, or report for a scheduled work assignment evidencing any effects of alcohol.
- All personnel are subject to "for cause" testing because of personal injury, employee behavior evidencing substance abuse or observed in prohibited activities.

■ Testing will be administered by East Jordan Family Health Center or a police officer.

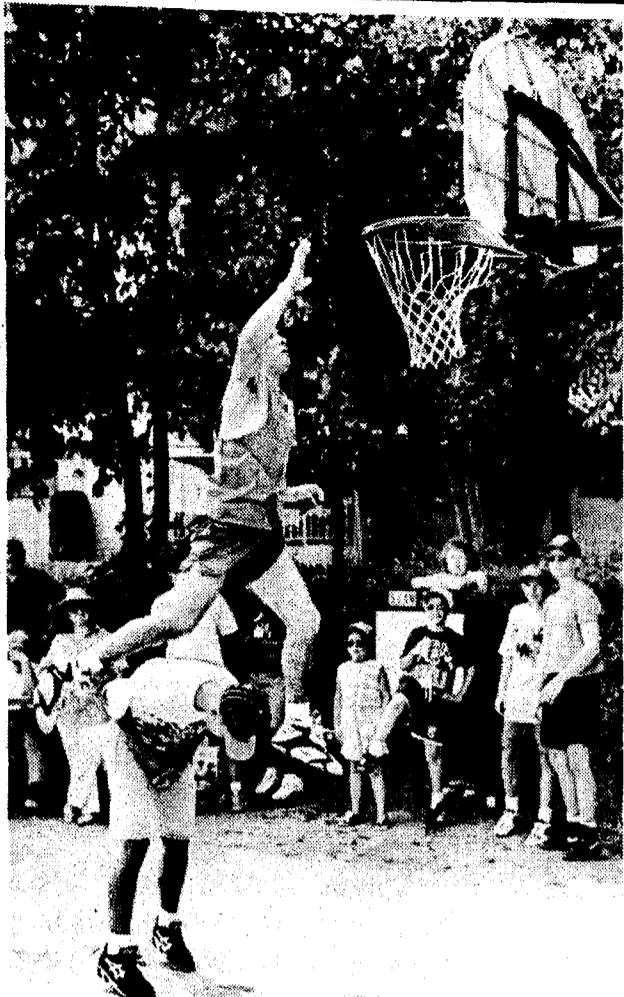

■ A person whose blood contains .04 percent or more by weight of alcohol will be considered to have tested positive for prohibited alcohol use.

■ Any violation will result in immediate suspension from work. A refusal to be tested will be cause for immediate dismissal.

■ First violation: suspended without pay for at least four days and substance abuse screening.

■ Second violation: suspended 30 days while receiving professional help, city will cover costs.

■ Third violation: termination.

■ Call-out provisions: Employee must inform supervisor if alcohol has been consumed within five hours. Three "on-call" work request failures within 30 days will put the employee at risk for disciplinary action.
