

EJ high school gets new principal



A new principal has been named to the post at East Jordan High School.

He is Gus Bishop of Lower Yukon Schools in Mountain Village, Alaska, where he was assistant superintendent of schools.

According to East Jordan Superintendent of Schools Chip Hansen, Bishop was chosen from among 27 candidates and five finalists.

The East Jordan school board devised a profile of the person they were looking for to take the helm at EJHS. The criteria included experiences and skill in outcomes-based education and mastery learning.

The board required an instructional leader and a person with very positive communications skills.

"Gus most closely fit the profile," said Hansen. Bishop has experience as a teacher and principal as well as his most recent position as assistant superintendent.

Although he spent the last 10 years in Alaska, he is a Michigan native. He holds degrees from Alma College and Central Michigan University.

Bishop will officially begin his position Aug. 1, although he is already house-hunting in the East Jordan area. He will attend the August school board meeting.

"Bishop is an outstanding individual," said Hansen, "and we are fortunate to have employed him."

Schools plan month-to-month as state stalls

The financial woes of the East Jordan School District continue as the state legislature stalls on school finance reform and property tax relief.

Superintendent of Schools Chip Hansen reported at the July 11 school board meeting that the legislature has once again postponed action.

East Jordan is already looking at month-to-

month budget planning. Presently, the district has no information on how much state funding will be available for the up-coming school year.


The news from Hansen's legislative contacts is discouraging. Although there is a possibility of a Proposal A clone on the November ballot, nothing specific can be reported.

The board is not completely paralyzed though. Several ideas for cutbacks were discussed and plans for downsizing will be formulated at an upcoming board workshop.

The board hopes to implement the first \$100,000 worth of cutbacks before school opens Sept. 7.

Cuts will be directed toward transportation, custodial and teacher assistant staffing. Basically, any areas not directly involved in classroom instruction are targeted.

The board also resolved to present a Headlee override proposal to voters on Sept. 13. If the override is accepted, the district will become

voluntarily out-of-formula.

Otherwise the district could face a deficit of up to \$500,000 in the 1993-94 school year.

At the board workshop, decisions will also be made as to criteria in judging the quality of the program the schools offer.

"If nothing happens (in the state legislature) we still have an obligation to provide a quality program," said Hansen.




OVER LAND and in the sea, competitors were out to prove they could do it all at the July 3 event.





East Jordan School Board briefs: July 11 meeting

Meeting days changed

The board conducted the annual organizational meeting. Recently elected members Mary Jason and Laurie Hurwitz-McNeil took the oath of office, guided by Business Manager Ruby Dipzinski.

Jason was unanimously re-elected as president of the school board by the other members.

Also named to office were Larry Chanda as vicepresident, Gary Ciszewski, secretary and Herb Griffin, board treasurer.

Because of schedule conflicts, school board meetings will now be held on the third Monday of the month. The time will still be 7 p.m., but the meeting place has been changed to the elementary media center.

Insurance options mulled

The board discussed options after receiving a sharp increase (\$2,000 annually) in student insurance policy premiums.

The district carries the insurance to cover schoolrelated injuries or accidents for non-insured families.

Two claims, due to football injuries, for over \$7,000 each, plus several over \$1,000 compelled the company to raise rates. Last year's premiums covered less than half of the amount paid out in 75-100 claims during the 1992-93 school year.

The board decided not to add a deductible to the policy. There was concern some families would be seek medical treatment for the child.

Vice president Chanda requested that coaches take even greater precautions to avoid athletic injuries.

Parents will also be notified, via newsletter, that the district may not be able to afford continued subsidizing of uninsured students. One possibility raised was for requiring participation to the plan, especially for those in sports programs.

Stats show positive trend

Hansen presented an update on the 1993 board goals. Recent statistics show a reduction of the dropout rate in East Jordan schools from 11 percent in 1990-91 to 2.4 percent in the past year.

Other figures show the number of students involved in co-curricular activities has increased in the last year.

Disciplinary data shows that in both the elementary and middle school, referrals for discipline have decreased by more than 50 percent from 1991-92.

At the high school, disciplinary referrals actually double over the past year. Hansen explained this as a lower administrative tolerance to discipline problems and a stricter compliance to the handbook.

Suspension policy reviewed

The board discussed alternatives for out-of-school suspensions. There was a consensus that this method

unduly burdened by the amount (\$100-250) and not of disciplinary action is non-productive and reinforces undesirable behavior.

> Options to be considered are in-school suspension in study hall and for middle school students, supervision by an elementary teacher in his/her classroom.

> Middle school principal Eivor Swan has already used this method and believes it is very effective.

> Swan also reported that the summer session has been very successful this year. Parents, staff and students have all responded positively. Only two students failed to complete the requirements.

The deployment began in Juneau, Alaska, where law enforcement and fishery boarding teams were briefed by the 17th Coast Guard District law enforcement staff and the National Marine Fisheries Service.

So far on the deployment, the Jarvis completed 12 boardings and issued several violations to fishing vessels not complying with federal fishing regulations or commercial fishing vessel safety requirements.

Rosie Myers has been happily married for 25 years to Richie, a wealthy, charismatic, high-powered corporate executive. Her life on a Long Island estate has been satisfying; her marriage, first-rate. Eschewing the suburban boredom of tennis, bridge and lunchwith-the-girls, Rosie teaches English in the local high school and keeps an eye on her two teen-age sons.

But wait ... Eden is crumbling. The day after their 25th anniversary bash, Richie walks out on her to live with a younger, prettier business associate. Grieving, and unable to sleep one night, Rosie goes to the kitchen for a snack and stumbles over the body of her husband lying on the kitchen floor with a carving knife in his chest. Cary doesn't have any spare time between her







A Special Board Meeting was called by notice posting to enable Board Members to physically inspect Kruger Road.

The Board met at the Township Hall with the exception of Hubbell, who joined the Board at the site of Kruger Road. Counselor Derman walked the road with Board Members so that

they would be familiar with the area and what was involved. The site was viewed and the Board dispersed at 6:30 p.m. Elva Cowell, Clerk

Present: Schmidt - Cowell - Smedley - Hubbell - Dawson. Audience: 16. Attorneys - Derman & Turkelson, Antrim County Rd. Comm. - J. Pemberton - F. Hunt.

1. The meeting was called to order and the pledge given to the flag.

2. Counselor Derman passed out copies of a survey re Kruger Rd. to Board Members. He gave the background of the research that has been done regarding Kruger Road for the past few years. The parcel in question is Parcel "L" that has 100' of water frontage and is 150' deep, and has a lane running west that is 5.39' wide going back approximately some 237'. Part of Parcel "L." the northern 33', lies within the constructed roadway of Kruger Road. This is a county road and the county has maintained the road. A compromise settlement was proposed that would allow Kruger Road to remain 66' wide to a point approximately 50 to 75 feet east of the entrance to an area known as "Dyars Scenic Shores." From that point to the shore, the Antrim County Road Commission and Torch Lake Township would allow the southern 33 feet of Kruger Road to remain with Parcel "L" and become private. The north half of Kruger would remain public and be improved and maintained by Antrim County Road Commission and Torch Lake Township. The gravel contained on the South 33' of Kruger Road could be removed by the Antrim County Road Commission when the Road Commission and Mr. Kruger develop the new curve and roadway to the South. The Antrim County Road Commission has also consented to do any and all necessary survey work regarding this settlement alternative.

Parcel "L" says in the deed it is subject to the rights of the public and any governmental unit in any part thereof taken, used for street - road or highway purposes. The road is there by user but does not go all the way to the water. Many deeds have this written in them. In talking with the assessor the owners have been taxed for 100' of frontage for many years - which includes the 33' north of Lot "L" in question.

Schmidt asked if agreement were carried out and a fence installed on parcel "L" how would the Road Comm. plow? They have other roads like this throughout the County and it is not a drastic situation. He read the letter from the Township Road Juna 21 Sme committee written Comm. first worked on Kruger Road and they said around 1967. Cowell asked if there was any written agreement between McLachlans and Rd. Comm. and Bruce replied only oral which Mr. Coutour does not recall.
