



OUR WEATHER

Operation Facelift gathering steam

Operation Facelift is coming alive in East Jordan as a very committed Chamber of Commerce forges ahead.

The Chamber began the promotion of their "Ground Floor Paint-up" project at their July 26 meeting. Attended by representatives of about a dozen downtown businesses, the meeting focused on details of the operation scheduled for Sept. 13 through 24.

The paint-up project is the next step in a process which began in April with the introduction of the Operation Facelift concept.

The Chamber of Commerce voted to pursue the project for downtown East Jordan under the leadership of chairperson Joan Lemerand.

A review of the buildings along Main Street showed the predominant architecture to be turn-of-the-century. A color scheme has been chosen appropriate to that era.

Linda Snyder, co-owner and decorator at Busy Bridge Antiques and Gifts, will coordinate the selection of paint colors with building owners who are interested in becoming involved with the improvement effort.

Three downtown paint dealers, Evan's Building and Home Supply, Ben Franklin's and the East Jordan Co-op, will offer discounts to business owners who take part in the project. The discounts will be given to businesses that have signed a painting agreement with the Chamber of Commerce. Joe Evans is also willing to give individual appraisals on paint types and other factors related to the condition of the building.

The terms of the agreement are to have the ground floor prepared before the target date of Sept. 13, to chose from selected colors, and to provide a painter, either volunteer or contracted.

Area painters Bud Barnes and Donald Anderson have offered their services, also at a discount rate, for the September project.

Business owners may contract with the painters on an individual basis. Both men will keep the paint-up dates open until Aug. 15.

The chamber is also arranging for a power washer and cherry picker to be available during the paint-up period.

Mary Faculak, executive director of the chamber board, spoke of expectations for the effort.


"We hope it will be contagious and have a nice domino effect the more we get the word out," Faculak said.

Faculak, Lemerand and chamber president Jean Pardee reported on some successes already achieved in Operation Facelift.

cruising into its 31st year

The finishing touches are being added for the 31st annual Portside Arts Fair in East Jordan. The show is set for Sat., Aug. 7, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sun., Aug. 8, from noon until 5 p.m.

The fair's Elm Pointe location on Lake Charlevoix provides an appropriate backdrop for the art works exhibited at the yearly event.

"The Portside committee prides itself on running a top quality art fair," noted committee member Laura Hanson.

The fair has numerous volunteers who assist the artists and cater to fair-goers. A children's booth helps keep the younger set entertained while their parents shop. A historical museum and the Cyg Riley Art Gallery will also be open for visitation. All are located at Elm Point and are free of charge.

Refreshments will be supplied by the Lutheran Church.

The highlight of the event is the Purchase Prize awards. Each artist has the option of entering a piece to be judged. If selected, the piece is permanently displayed at the Cyg Riley Art Gallery. This year's juror is executive director of the Lansing Art Gallery, Karen Stock.

Stock has coordinated Lansing's downtown Arts Festival and has served on many Lansing area artrelated committees.

Stock's bachelor of arts degree from the University of Michigan and experience judging many art fairs provides a solid base for the difficult task of selecting the 1993 Portside Purchase Prize winners.

The Collecting Consort will also be on hand to entertain visitors' ears while their eyes absorb the artistry on display. The duo of Anne and Gary Wakenhut is best described as a sensitive and skillfull pairing that combines music and story. Their simplicity and gentle humor provide a soothing contrast to an increasingly complex world.

The Consort's musical blend of Celtic harp, hammered dulcimer, whistle, wood and pan flutes has already entertained listeners this summer in Beulah, Harbor Springs, and Petoskey.

The Portside committee welcomes returning and new visitors to their show and hopes they remember the Portside Arts Fair is "Always the first weekend in August."

EJ Senior Center - "The place to come"

Every weekday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the East Jordan Senior Center is humming with activity.

The credit goes to center director Jeanette Norton, whose aim is to provide lots of fun experiences and a large variety of services.

All members of the advisory board are seniors. Norton keeps in close contact with the board, as well as center participants, in order to provide for as many special needs as possible.

Clinics for all types of physical screening and educational workshops are frequent. Special arrangements are made for help with home and garden chores, including lawn care and snow removal.

One of the most important services the center pro-

vides is the daily lunch. At low cost, seniors can receive a nutritious, delicious and generous meal without the trouble of preparation or clean-up.

Activities revolve around the lunch hour. Any day, before or after the meal, a visitor can meet seniors busy with a variety of interesting pursuits.

Quilting, cards and good conversation are available. Bingo is so popular there is a session every Tuesday and Friday.

The center also has a choir, directed by retired teacher Margaret Thompson. They rehearse on Mondays after lunch.

Seasonal activities include electing a King and Queen for the annual Freedom Festival and monthly birthday parties.

Funding is provided by the state Commission on Aging, but according to Norton, there is never quite enough. Volunteers are an important resource for providing services.

Often, the center staff is supplemented by teens in the county Youth Training program or court-directed community service.

Norton also has high hopes that a recently organized Booster Club will be another source of assistance.

"If you're looking for friendship and a meal at low cost," Norton promises, "the East Jordan Senior Center is the place to come."



Swimming is a summer tradition, but so is swimmers'itch. The schistosome dermatitis occurs when cercariae, free-swimming larval worms produced in the tissues of certain snails, penetrate the skin. In Michigan they are only able to penetrate the skin and cause no systemic problems. To avoid the little blighters, stay away from situations that encourage birds to remain in swimming areas, and steer clear of concrete walls or rocks where infected snails may lay eggs. It also appears that most swimmers contact the parasites while swimming on eastern and southern lakeshores. After swimming, swimmers should always briskly towel dry as a final preventative measure.

used in the drugstore.


Snyder and Jackson are both happy with the new addition. "We've always thought








A Word Fitly Spoken

We all have "valleys" in our lives but The Lord also provides "peaks." We tend to become too busy doing all manner of things, working daily for a living and to accumulate material possessions.

We must "Look Up" and realize there is a Higher Being. Think on Spiritual Things, like all the blessings our Lord bestows on us each day, and the beauty that surrounds us.


When our lives are "Status Quo," with no adversities-well, we just go along doing our jobs, raising our children, enjoying our grandchildren and life as we know it.




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



been eliminated through the chemical breakdown over time, and through rinsing and polishing. Although most fruits

and vegetables are residue-free when you buy them, for the small quantities that might remain on the skin of the produce, simple cold water washing will eliminate or significantly reduce any residue.

The following are some tips to keep in mind as you prepare fresh food for yourself and your family:

* Buy fresh fruits and vegetables from reputable grocers or directly from farmers or city markets. Familiarity with a retail food business will help you gauge the quality and consistency of their fresh food, and will make it easier to approach them with questions and concerns about their products.

* Buy only top-quality fruits and vegetables. This doesn't necessarily mean "perfect looking". Some less-than-perfect looking produce may have been grown organically (without pesticides) but wholesomeness and taste will not be compromised.

* Many shoppers place

fresh fruit and vegetables into plastic bags provided by grocery stores. These bags are a convenient way of protecting the produce while shopping or during the trip home. But fresh food should never be stored in closed. plastic bags because condensation that occurs may hasten ripening or cause the growth of mold. Never place washed produce back into a bag that once held unwashed food: you don't want to recontaminate clean food with micro-organisms.

* Wash all fruits and vegetables in cold water without detergent or soap. Soap residue can be difficult to remove from some foods and soap is not intended to be consumed.

* Water helps remove soil particles and other debris that may be hard to see, especially on leafy green vegetables like lettuce. Place the food in a colander and rinse well making sure to clean all sides of the produce, or fill a clean sink with clean cool water and let the

fruits and vegetables soak for a few minutes.

* Some fruits and vegetables, like strawberries and mushrooms, have a high water content and should only be washed just prior to eating. Store these foods away from washed produce in the refrigerator.

* Fruits and vegetables that grow below ground or just above it can pick up additional organisms and pesticides from the soil than other kind of produce. These include potatoes, squash, watermelon, cantaloupe, carrots, parsnips and rutabaga. While rinsing in clear, cold water scrub the skin or rind with a firm vegetable brush. It is important to not only scrub the rind but use a clean knife when cutting into any produce so bacteria on the outside is not transported to the inside.

who were sharing a pole, were dismayed when a female mallard swallowed their Canadian crawler.


The duck, terrified, swam off dragging the pole, unable to free the hook from her beak.

After several futile attempts by neighbor Tim Veryser to capture it, the children's mother managed to secure the duck in a fishing net. She and


her husband removed the hook and released the duck.

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
