
Remember When...



God's handiwork is so evident. He made the flora and



"Leave no claim outstanding against you, except that of mutual love. He who loves his neighbor has satisfied every claim of the law."

- Romans 13



St. Paul, the widely-traveled apostle to the Gentiles, wrote that letter perhaps 50 years after the death of Christ, and yet it still has a profound impact today. In that epistle, the worldly, well-educated man from Tarsus also exhorts the Romans to "Discharge your obligations to all men; pay tax and toll, reverence and respect, to those to whom they are due." Many of Paul's letters deal with Christian law. All of the commandments he said, could be summed up in the admonition to love one's neighbor as you love yourself. "Love cannot wrong a neighbor, therefore, the whole law is summed up in love," he said. In a troubled, modern world, we could do a lot worse than



Henevelds return to Mexico as missionaries

The community of Ellsworth and the Bell TowerReformed Church will say adios to Reverend Jim and Sharon Heneveld next week when they return to Mexico as missionaries.

The Henevelds arrived in Ellsworth from Mexico in 1981 with children in tow. Now they leave four children in the United States to return to Mexico.

"All of the kids are happy for us," Sharon said.

Before moving to Ellsworththe family lived in the southern part of Mexico near Guatamala for 12 years working with Tzeltal indians. When they return they will live with the same tribe, but the conditions have improved.

"This time we will have indoorplumbing and running water," Sharon said. "We're going back to much less primitive conditions."

Jim added, "We'll beable to go on paved roads."

In the past the only way to the village was by plane.

Because the Henevelds are familiar with the area and people, it won't take long to set up. They said it would take five years for a new person to start over.

"We already know the language," Jim said. "It's like going back home."

Jim and Sharon do leadership development, training leaders at the church. Their work is coordinated by the National Presbyterian Church of Mexico.

One aspect that draws the Henevelds to Mexico is the simplicity.

"Teaching people who are eager to learn," Jim said is a wonderful experience. "It is a lot like the early church."

"They have virtually no background," Sharon added. "Everything is brand new."

In both communities, the people are affectionate and accommodating.

"Other than the loving acceptance of the people, nothing is alike," Sharon said.

In Mexico the pace is

slower, Jim said.

"You get up when it gets light and go to bed when it gets dark," Sharon added.

While the Indians are fascinated by snow, their American friends always assume Mexico is a desert. Mexico has a rainy season and a dry season. The landscape is filled with beautiful green mountains, Jim said. Their village is about 2,000 feet above sea level.

Jim and Sharon said Ellsworth is a good place for families because you can be involved in activities as a family.

"We felt very at home," Sharon said. "We never felt like outsiders. Leaving is hard."

The Henevelds plan to stay in Mexico until they retire and then return to Ellsworth. They also plan to come back on a regular basis to visit.

"All of our friends are here," Sharon said. "We put down roots deep."



How to tell when fermented foods go bad

Healthy blue cheese is veined with mold. So, how can you tell if it's bad? What about buttermilk, yogurt, sourdough bread, hard sausages and sauerkraut?

All of these foods share one thing in common: they are fermented, which ads distinctive flavor to the food and helps some products stay fresh longer. While fermentation may make it more difficult to tell if the food is safe to eat, there are ways to detect spoilage in fermented foods.

Most foods have a nearly neutral pH factor, an environment conducive to bacterial growth. So, to extend the life of some foods, people found ways to make them more acidic. Fermentation is one way, using lactic acid.

Cheeses. Made from separated milk solids, speciality cheeses are ripened using bacteria and/or molds chosen to give certain textures and flavors. Blue cheese is mold-ripened by the bacteria Penicillum roqueforti, while brie is aged by Penicillium camembert.

For storage, firm cheeses keep well for several weeks in the refrigerator if wrapped tightly and protected from mold and drying. A soft cheese, like brie, retains its top quality for only about a week in the refrigerator.

When using cheese, don't leave it at room temperature over two hours. Like all perishable foods and all opened or sliced fermented foods, cheese can be contaminated by micro-organisms on people's hands, by coughs, sneezes and "bugs" in the air. Check refrigerated cheese before serving it. Discard a soft cheese if you see any signs of mold.

Hard cheeses are past saving if mold growth is extensive or cheese has lost its original color and texture. Discard blue-veined cheese if you see mold growth that looks different from the normal veining. Invader-molds may be white, pink, green, blue, black or grey, and has flecks of color or furry patches.

Fermented sausages. Dry and semidry fermented sausages are made from ground meat treated with seasoning and curing agents. Common varieties include genoa salami, summer sausage, Lebanon bologna and pepperoni.

Take a close look at the labels for handling instructions. Some unopened semi-dry sausages require refrigeration, most dry sausages don't, but all sausages need refrigeration once you have cut into them. Opened whole semi-dry sausage will last 3 to 6 weeks refrigerated; opened whole dry sausage will last 6 to 8 weeks, and opened dry jerky or beef sticks should last 2 to 3 months in the refrigerator. A white film which can form on sausage skin is harmless and can be cut away, but sliminess or discolored spots on casings mean the meat should be discarded.

Buttermilk, Yogurt, Sour Cream. There is no questions when ordinary milk sours: its smell and taste are distinctly sour. But when fermented dairy products like buttermilk, yogurt and sour cream go bad, it's not always easy to tell if they are safe to eat.

Cultured buttermilk, which some food historians say originated in southern Russia, is the product of a lactic acid bacteria starter mix or culture. It is best used during its first week but it keeps up to two weeks, if refrigerated. If you see a grayish liquid floating on the top, it is spoiled and should be thrown away.

Pasteurized, homogenized cream treated with lactic starter culture becomes sour cream. It will last from 2 to 3 weeks in the refrigerator and should be thrown out if there are mold spots or if there is pink or green scum on the top.

The "friendly" bacteria Lactobacillus bulgaricus and Streptococcus thermophilus turn milk into yogurt. With a life span of 1 - 2 weeks in the refrigerator, yogurt should be thrown out at the first sign of mold or if it has a yeasty aroma.

Sourdough bread. Like all other breads, sourdough can become moldy. Wrapped in paper and stored in a bread box, it will stay fresh just a day. Sourdough draws its flavor from the acidic Lactobacillus sanfrancisco.

Sauerkraut. Sauerkraut was first fed to workers building the Great Wall of China between 246 and 209 B.C. Then it was simply cabbage covered with wine. Now it is made from fresh cabbage that is shredded, salted and fermented in its own juice. While the growth of lactic acid bacteria during fermentation makes kraut somewhat spoilage-resistant, its quality is another matter. Experts suggest canned kraut should be eaten within 6 months for full flavor, and fresh kraut keeps its quality in refrigeration only about a week. Spoilage appears as mold growth or surface

Processed pickles. Lactic acid fermented cucumbers in unopened glass jars may be kept on the shelf about a year. Once opened, you can keep them refrigerated for 1 to 2 months. If liquid turns cloudy or scum forms on the surface, throw the pickles out. Mushy pickles should also be discarded.

Fermented olives. Fresh-picked olives are bitter and largely inedible. So olives to be fermented are first treated with lye to remove the bitterness, then brined and sometimes processed with lactic acid or *lactobacilli* bacteria. The resulting canned olives are shelf stable for up to one year. Opened, they can be refrigerated in their own liquid for 1-2 months. Discard olives when they become soft, spotted or produce a spoiled odor.

Reasons for Demanding Recall:

(1) Use of the township credit card for purchases invoiced to the township by Mastercard but not submitted by her for processing through the township records for payment by the township as legitimate official business expense.

(2) Inability to provide the township board with accurate financial information required by state statute for use in developing the 1993-94 fiscal year budget and for monitoring budget performance to avoid illegal overspending in any budgeted cost center account.

(3) Unilateral decisions to purchase furniture, equipment and supplies in excess of established limits with no report of such purchases to the township board which is in violation of Section 15, Purchases as defined in Board Rules of Procedure.

Justification of conduct in Office:

(1) Mastercard was used with approval of the township board in December, 1992, for attendance of classes. I paid the bill personally after harassment from the treasurer.

(2) The Board was supplied with information at my disposal whenever requested. Fund balances are the treasurer's responsibility by law. Supplying accurate figures is difficult when the books haven't been balanced since 1990-91, according to the auditor. I was appointed clerk unanimously effective April 1, 1992. The budget was approved in March, 1992, with the auditor still trying to balance the previous clerk's books. He finished in June, 1992. He sent a report of the state of two funds being illegally over budget. He also stated that the computer hasn't the safeguards to prevent accumulating errors. Accurate figures cannot be provided without accurate figures to begin with, which hasn't been possible since the computer program was installed.

(3) All purchases are approved at regular board meetings by motion, so all purchases were known. I did not go over my budget for 1992-93, nor has the auditor found any funds missing from my accounts.

I have enjoyed covering the summer events, and it is with great regret that I must leave to continue my education at Western Michigan University.


Over the past four months I have gotten acquinted with the wonderful people and delightful places in East Jordan, Central Lake, Ellsworth, and Eastport.
