


Snowmobile Club celebrates 25 years

A crackling fire, an inviting buffet of homemade treats and congenial company all came together for the East Jordan Snowmobile Club as they celebrated their 25th anniversary Sept. 26.

The snowmobile enthusiasts marked the establishment of their organization in 1968 with an open house at their clubhouse on Mt. Bliss Road. Coincidentally, September is also the anniversary of the clubhouse itself, whose foundation was laidSept. 3, 1968.

A chronicle of the events and activities over the 25 years has been assembled by the members. The scrapbooks show that the group's first organized meeting was on Oct. 12, 1967. The first president was Jim Meredith, assisted by vice-president Bob Forsman and secretary-treasurer Myra Crawford.

Dues were established at \$3 per family, or \$2 for an individual. The fledgling club sponsored their first race in March the next year, out on the South Arm.

As the group grew, it became evident there was a need for permanent facilities. After considering several properties, the club bought 27 acres from Bill Zoulek for \$3,000 and the clubhouse soon became a

Lack of funds forced members to scrounge for materials and furnishings for the new building. Many donations were made by area businesses and individuals.

Looking back, both charter member Tom Galmore, Sr., and current president Clarence LaCross spoke of how very active and involved members were in the beginnings of snowmobiling as a sport in northern Michigan. While the East Jordan Snowmobilers no longer sponsor races like in the old days, they continue to be extremely active in promoting the modern version of the sport.

As part of the Charlevoix County Snowmobile Council, many of the club members volunteer to groom or brush trails. Four years ago, club funds were

combined with a DNR grant to purchase a grooming machine.

Grooming and brushing trails and maintaining signs can be a full-time job, noted LaCross, who has been the principal groomer for several years.

He said covering the 33 miles of the Jordan Valley trail takes seven to eight hours. The job must be done during late-night hours.

To help finance grooming operations, the club sponsors Sunday morning breakfasts throughout the snow months. The clubhouse has become a popular stopping place on the trail, where for \$3.50, snowmobilers can enjoy a hearty breakfast and great company from 7 a.m. to noon.

The busy breakfast crew has served close to 400 on several occasions. The club also began a Saturday lunch last winter.

"We like to have the clubhouse open for a place to go on snowmobiles," said LaCross. "We've met folks from Ohio, Wisconsin, Indiana, Canada, all over. It's pretty interesting."

Today the club has about 50 family and individual memberships. The price has gone up some - \$10 per year with a one-time initiation fee of \$25.

Finding its role in this transitional period of the sport is one of the issues the club deals with today. Although snowmobiling has gone in and out of popularity over the last 25 years, recent changes are more

"It's become big business," said LaCross.

While meeting visitors and developing friendships is a positive in northern snowmobilers' lives, the influx of riders is a mixed blessing.

"I enjoy the trail when the week-enders aren't here," said member Jim Hartsell, "but on weekends I prefer the fields and backwoods."

He said he's afraid someone going 70 or 80 mph will plow into him operating at a modest 35-40 mph. continued on back

"Trail makers" have come a long way

"Trail makers is what they were first called," said Tom Galmore Sr.

Known as "Mr. Snowmobile" in some circles, Galmore is probably East Jordan's most informed authority on the history of the machine that opened up winter in the north.

Retired for six years now from his family business, Galmore's, Inc., the hardy snowmobile enthusiast began selling Ski-doo machines in 1965.

"The first snowmobiles were designed as work contraptions," Galmore explained.

Early prototypes were not sleek and glamorous like today's vehicles. Galmore evoked the image of a Model-T Ford on skis to demonstrate how long the idea has been around.


The first sled-type snowmobile was produced in Quebec in 1958 by Joseph-Armand Bombadier. In 1973, according Galmore, Ski-doo sold their one millionth machine.

Galmore's sold 200 snowmobiles in 1969, and although most were Ski-doos, as many as 110 companies were manufacturing the machines.

Then, in the early 1970s, the sport suddenly caught on.

Retail sales in East Jordan boomed. Galmore recalled that as many as 20 different dealers and some fly-by-night outlets flourished.

Today snowmobiles are enjoying greater popularity than ever after a slump in the late '70s and early '80s. Galmore's is still one of several East Jordan

snowmobile dealers.

But the manufacturing field has diminished considerably. Presently only four companies produce the machines: Polaris and Arctic Cat in the United States and Ski-doo and Yamaha abroad.

Big changes in suspension, handling and looks have improved speed and comfort. Machines can now be modified for driving on grass or even water. Winter and summer races have become very popular.

Festivals featuring snowmobiles have sprung up

across the snow belt and a multitude of newsletters and magazines (including one published in East Jordan!) keep enthusiasts apprised of activities and industry advances.

As might be expected, prices have changed considerably since Galmore sold that first Ski-doo, when snowmobiles sold in the \$900 to \$1,200 range.

Today, family models cost from \$3,500 to \$4,000, while the 1994 performance vehicles can run from \$5,000 up to \$10,000 and more.

Whatever the year or model, Galmore sees it through affectionate eyes. At 70-plus years, he is still active as a rider and member of the East Jordan Snowmobile Club.

Wherever Galmore is, chances are it's not far from a snowmobile.

Smoke? Please don't, board says

East Jordan school property will be off-limits for tobacco use by this time next year. In the meantime, the school board is trying to politely convey that such activity is already unwelcome.

The state prohibits smoking on school property all weekdays before 6 p.m. But the board is going a step further by urging the public and staff to voluntarily refrain from smoking at school functions.

Announcements are now made at sporting events asking smokers not to light up, even in Boswell Field.

Although there is some disagreement among board members about when to proceed with enacting the prohibition, the board is unified in supporting the Drug-Free Schools Policy it adopted in June.

With or without smokers' cooperation, the smokefree resolution will probably be enacted by August 1994. The school board also resolved to deal with the issue of blood-borne pathogens by training district employees on universal precautions.

The state requires the training, which demonstrates procedures in the handling of bodily fluids. Hepatitis B vaccinations may also be part of the program.

The board will retain the Institute for Environmental Assessment to develop the district's disease exposure control plan.

Fire Prevention Week pointers

OCT. 3-9, 1993 is National Fire Prevention Week. The Banks Township Fire Department and the Michigan State Police, Fire Marshal Division, would like you to take part in fire prevention and safety.

We encourage all members in the home to sit down together and develop a home escape plan. Walk through your home and locate two accessible escape routes from each room. Make sure windows open freely, there's no furniture blocking doors, etc. In an emergency you will not have time to struggle with obstacles.

Make sure you have a working smoke detector on each floor and test them at least every month. Practice your escape plan. Know how to call for help, and most important, once outside, stay out!!! Resist any temptation to go back inside a burning building. If someone is trapped, tell the Fire Fighters.

The Fire Fighters are trained and equipped to perform rescues safely. If you have very old or very young occupants, try to locate their bedroom on a ground floor and have someone designated to help them with their escape.

As part of your escape plan, establish a meeting place outside where all members can wait for the Fire Department. Practice your escape throughout the year and include all members regardless of age.

A few key points to remember:

If you encounter flames, turn around and use your alternate exit.

If you must go through smoke, stay low and crawl where the air is cooler and cleaner.

If your clothes catch fire STOP DP OP and POLL

If your clothes catch fire-STOP, DROP, and ROLL. Get out, and stay out of a burning building.

Check your smoke detectors every month and replace batteries as needed.

Make sure you have your 911 house numbers where they can be easily seen.


Francis Flanders, the bank's Chairman, also

The new CB North will have offices in Beaver Island, Boyne City, East Jordan, Eastport, and Ellsworth, as well as Charlevoix.




Thieves break into Korner Store
