

Bruce Malpass Still On Critical List

Six Local Men to be Drafted

Six East Jordan men are among the 20 Charlevoix county draft registrants who have been called for pre-induction physicals next month. They are Jackle C. Clark, Wayne A. Wilson, James C. McKinnon, Charles F. Haney, Dale A. Reich and Ronnie L. McWaters who have been ordered to report November 27 for the trip to Detroit for examination.

Among the 20 are the first men in the 26 to 35 year age group. They are Carl H. Charon, Stephen M. Williams and Dennis B. Grubbe, all of Boyne City and David L. Miles of Charlevoix. They are the only four registrants on the books who have not been called for examination.

Other young men who will report at the same time are Ivan H. Everts of Wallon Lake, Jon F. Wasylewski, Larry R. Hutchinson, Patrick C. Varnum, Charles W. Davis and Lyle E. Barkley of Boyne City; Larry G. Drew, Roger N. Loe, Robert M. Foster and Gilbert K. Arnold, All of Charlevoix.

The county had no draft call for November since there was no one to be called, according to the draft board clerk.

TOURS FOUNDRY

East Jordan Rotary Club members visited the East Jordan Iron Works as part of their regular weekly program Tuesday. Foundry President Bill Malpass was host to the members at the plant where a guided tour was held.

Forty-one year old Bruce Malpass, vice president in charge of sales at the East Jordan Iron Works, Inc., remained in critical condition at Charlevoix hospital Tuesday following a plane crash at the East Jordan airport last Thursday in which three other men were involved.

Iron Works President William Malpass said Tuesday that Bruce had improved slightly, but that no visitors were allowed to his room. Bruce underwent extensive surgery immediately following the crash which took place about noon Thursday as the plane in which he was riding fell into the trees at the east approach of the airport and crashed into the dense woods a short distance from the field.

Plane pilot Theodore Malpass, 44, vice president in charge of manufacturing at the Iron Works, received severe cuts on the head. It was reported that he would be released from the hospital, probably this week.

Other occupants of the small plane were: Charles Fox, 40, of 608 Westgage, Washington, Ill., and Leroy Seiwell, 48, of Peoria, Ill. The two men were treated at Charlevoix hospital and released Monday, flying to Peoria, Ill., by air ambulance.

Bruce Malpass was said to have suffered from internal injuries which caused bleeding and was the most critically injured among the four plane occupants.

The two Malpass executives were transporting the two visitors to the Traverse City airport when they took off from the local air field.

The four place airplane, a Myers 200-B was owned by the Chain of Lakes Flying Club. Federal Aviation Agency men arrived on the scene the next day inspecting the wreckage. It was said their official report on the cause of the mishap would not be released for some time.

The crash victims were transported to Charlevoix hospital by city police ambulance, fire department ambulance and Bill Huckle, who volunteered his station wagon for the run.

Police said that county road commission employees working on the road near the accident rushed to the scene at the moment of the crash

Should Eighteen Year Olds Vote?

Should eight een olds vote? That question has been with us for many years and there are many pros and cons offered.

On the "yes" side of the issue there have been proposals to lower the voting age to 18 from a large number of America's political leaders.

In Michiganthe late Senator Vandenburg was a strong supporter of the idea. Other backers of lowering the voting age include Governor Romney, Senators Hart and Griffin, Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh and others.

President Eisenhower said: "For years our citizens between the ages of 18 and 21 have, in time of peril, been summoned to fight for America. They should participate in the political progress that produces that fateful summons."

Governor George Romney said: "Young people get greatly interested in public affairs ahead of the 18 birthdays. If they could become involved in a more meaningful way at that age---through the right to vote I believe they would be more likely to remain active."

Other endorsers of the idea include Presidents Kennedy, Roosevelt and Johnson; also Richard Nixon and Barry Goldwater.

But what does the general public say about the issue? From talking with a large number of older folks over a period of years, we feel that a state-wide or nation-wide vote on the issue would result in keeping the voting age at 21 years.


Fishermen report the perch biting at Ironton. Not many big catches have been taken but there is some evidence that the fish are returning for at least a mild run.

In keeping with the fine resort business last summer that gave the north its greatest summer in years, the Ironton ferry, which transports traffic across the South Arm of Lake Charlevoix, reports a 20 per cent increase over 1965. The report shows that 6,000 more cars were carried this year than in previous years.

Two well known Boyne City men, Clarence Waldo, 32 and his brother, Roy Waldo, 25, whose names have appeared regularly through the years in county court news, are not expected to appear in the newspaper headlines for some 20 years. The two brothers and a third man, Robert D. Ross, 44, all of Reed City, have been sentenced to 20 years in the federal penitentiary for the June 27 robbery of a Bark River State Bank. They took more than \$32,000 but never got to spend it before they were captured following an argument.

A wide search for a plane carrying six Indiana residents which left the Charlevoix airport at 6:15 Sunday evening has been on all week. Four of the six aboard, Mrs. Raymonda Overmere, her sister, Mrs. Erma Vores, and their nephew and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Smith, were all from the Mishawaka, Ind. area, and had come to Charlevoix to visit the older women's sister. Mrs. Joseph Sendenbergh, of St. James, Beaver Island, who is a patient at the Charlevoix Hospital. They had arrived at noon in a Piper Cherokee Six piloted by Roy Nye of Warsaw, Ind., who was accompanied by his wife.

"How do I show on my new deer tag the sex of the animal that I hope to kill?"

That question is being asked these days by a number of hunters, and the Conservation Department's answer to it is simply this.

Cut or tear out the appropriate triangular section on the tag which bears the word male or female. In other words, if a hunter gets a buck, he is to remove the section within which "male" is printed.

Causing confusion on this point is the fact that the words male and female also appear vertically alongside the sections to be cut or torn out. However, they are in reverse order to the male and female designations given in the notches to be removed.

Remembering the Department's first words of advice about paying attention only to the triangular sections, hunters should disregard the sex descriptions that appear outside these notches.

Heavens, how these off year elections worry me. In fact, I fretted so much the other night I woke up twice and couldn't get back to sleep either time.


SHORT-LINE PROFILE

(From the Steam Locomotive & Railroad Tradition, Starrucca, Pennsylivania)

East Jordan & Southern

With this issue the News-Herald begins a history of area railroading which will run several weeks until the story is fini shed. Publication here is with special permission of the author.



n one point, Captain Jake Small of the steam barge "Pine Lake" was emphatic: the next time he carried a locomotive on the deck of his vessel . . . well, to consider a contemporary event, perhaps he'd have been safer with Dewey at Manila Bay.

But he was not sailing for the Admiral. W. P. Porter, a lumberman at East Jordan, Mich., had sent to Chicago for a nearly new Forney engine from the recently electrified Lake Street Elevated, and there had been no way to get it to East Jordan except by water, since Porter's projected logging line connected with no other railroad. On the way the "Pine Lake" had threatened to capsize; the Forney had narrowly missed going overboard. But Captain Small had at length made it safely up the South Arm of Pine Lake to the lumber company dock at East Jordan, where Mr. Porter's young son John greeted the barge and its valuable cargo with a heartfelt complaint: there was no cowcatcher on the engine.

At least, so goes the story. Pine Lake, an inlet of Lake Michigan, has since been renamed Lake Charlevoix; the virgin pine along its shores was all cut down years ago. Smaller lakes dot the surrounding area, a gently rolling countryside of farms and woodlands. East Jordan, at the mouth of the Jordan River in Charlevoix County, is a lumber town no longer, but it has a thriving agricultural industry and an iron foundry. It also has visitors. Vacationists first discovered the pleasures of northern lower Michigan back in the 1880's, and East Jordan today offers them a variety of outdoor diversions. The white swans in Sportsmen's Park have caused East Jordan to become known as the "Swan City," and it impresses those who have been there,

One thing East Jordan no longer has is its railroad—a fact that is regretted by summer visitors as well as the natives. Mr. Porter's logging line grew to be the East Jordan & Southern, or "Easy, Jerky & Slow." It established outside connections, served the community for sixty years, and at the end was hauling quite a few tourists for free—and altogether too little freight for money. East Jordan & Southern Railroad was abandoned last year. Now the freight goes by highway, and the summer people no longer queue up for train rides at the gray and white Victorian depot

Michigan's logging boom began in the 1850's, after millions of acres of federal lands were made available for private development, and it was already in decline when East Jordan finally got a railroad. Logging by rail had come into vogue as the boom reached its peak in the early 1880's. Michigan's first logging line was probably W. S. Gerrish's Lake George & Muskegon River, opened in 1887 in Clare County, in north-central lower Michigan. The logging railroad reached the most remote areas and could operate all year. Logs no longer had to be dragged out by horses, or dumped along the stream banks to await a spring drive.

By the time East Jordan Lumber Company began to plan its own railroad, three trunk lines had penetrated the region, several logging roads had been started nearby, and the rival town of Boyne City, at the east end of Pine Lake, had an outside connection, with Grand Rapids & Indiana, via the newly built Boyne City & South Eastern Railroad. Grand Rapids & Indiana, the first trunk line to reach the northern shores of lower Michigan, had been completed to Petoskey in 1874. The year previous Michigan Cen-

tral's Jackson, Lansing & Saginaw was running as far as Gaylord; it arrived at the Straits of Mackinac in 1882. Last—and most important to East Jordan—was Chicago & North Michigan Railway, opened from Traverse City to Bay View in 1892, and consolidated into the Pere Marquette in 1899.

As for lumber railroads, besides the Boyne City line there was the early-to-come, early-to-go Mancelona & Northwestern Railroad, a 3-foot-gauge which Mancelona Handle Company was operating in the country 15 to 20 miles south of East Jordan—using a Shay—by 1896. Up in Emmet County, about 20 miles north of East Jordan, Ephraim Shay himself was getting ready to build the 2-foot 6-inch Harbor Springs Railway. And David Ward, a self-made lumberman of local renown, was already laying track from Frederic across his "Ward Pineries" toward East Jordan.

William Pitt Porter was president of East Jordan Lumber Company and the leading lumberman of East Jordan. During 1898—the year of the Forney's hazardous passage on the deck of the "Pine Lake"—Porter's company laid about 10 miles of track from East Jordan into the woods. The advantages of a connection with the nearby Pere Marquette were obvious from the outset. Somewhat less predictable was the last-minute race between operators Porter and Ward to open the first common-carrier railroad into East Jordan.

David Ward had been a woodsman for some five decades, and Frederic & Charlevoix Railroad was a project of his old age. He was a graduate M.D., but had gone into lumbering and made a fortune at it. Starting as a "pine looker" or timber cruiser" for early lumber companies, Ward had filed his own claim for a valuable stand of virgin white pine near Otsego Lake in 1854, barely ahead of another surveyor. It was the beginning of the Ward Pineries and, in time, the making of the Frederic & Charlevoix, which Ward started to build in 1895. Within a year F&C's first engine, the Brooks 2-6-0 Alba," was operating over 25 miles of track stretching northwestward from Frederic on the Michigan Central to or nearly to the waystop of Alba on the Grand Rapids & Indiana.

Five years later, in January, 1901, the Ward interests reorganized the uncompleted Frederic & Charlevoix as Detroit & Charlevoix Railroad, a common carrier, and began to push track toward East Jordan. East Jordan Lumber Company formed East Jordan & Southern Railroad in July, 1901, and began to extend its logging road toward Bellaire station on the Pere Marquette. The contestants finished a half-month apart: Detroit & Charlevoix was formally opened to traffic between East Jordan and Frederic on Sept. 15, and East Jordan & Southern ran its first regular train between East Jordan and Bellaire, with appropriate ceremonies, on Oct. 1.





DETROIT Every fall. Michigan's skies are dotted with ducks and geese departing from the cold north for warmer areas in the south where open water and food are available. The geese fly in distinct V-shaped formations, whereas most of the ducks fly in more irregular, smaller, wedgeshaped groups.

"It is commonly believed that each flock has a special leader, but actually the leader of the V-formation changes from time to time," says Dr. William M. Thompson, a Wayne State University biologist. "Just what determines which bird will be leader at a given time is not known," he says.

Michigan, with its many small inland lakes and the surrounding Great Lakes, is home for about 37 species of ducks, geese, swans and mergansers each year.

All the waterfowl of North American migrate along one of follow the Mississippi drainage system, although some go instead by way of the Atlantic coast.


