#### Six Local Men to be Drafted

Six East Jordan men are among the 20 Charlevoix county draft registrants who have been called for pre-induction physicals next month. They are Jackie C. Clark, Wayne A. Wilson, James C. McKinnon, Charles F. Haney, Dale A. Reich and Ronnie L. McWaters who have been ordered to report November 27 for the trip to Detroit for examination.

Among the 20 are the first men in the 26 to 35 year age group. They are Carl H. Charon, Stephen M. Williams and Dennis B. Grubbe, all of Boyne City and David L. Miles of Charlevoix. They are the only four registrants on the books who have not been called for examination. Other young men who will report at the same time are Ivan H. Evers of Wallon Lake, Jon F. Wasylewski, Larry R. Hutchinson, Patrick C. Varnum, Charles W. Davis and Lyle E. Barldey of Boyne City; Larry G. Drew, Roger N. Loe, Robert M. Foster and Gilbert R. Arnold, all of Charlevoix.

The county had no draft call for November since there was no one to be called, according to the draft board clerk.

#### TOURS FOUNDRY

East Jordan Rotary Club members visited the East Jordan Iron Works as part of their regular weekly program Tuesday. Foundry President Bill Malpass was host to the members at the plant where a guided tour was held.

Forty-one year old Bruce Malpass, vice president in charge of sales at the East Jordan Iron Works, Inc., remained in critical condition at Charlevoix hospital Tuesday following a plane crash at the East Jordan airport last Thursday in which three other men were involved.

Iron Works President William Malpass said Tuesday that Bruce had improved slightly, but that no visitors were allowed to his room. Bruce underwent extensive surgery immediately following the crash which took place about noon Thursday as the plane in which he was riding fell into the trees at the east approach of the airport and crashed into the dense woods a short distance from the field.

Plane pilot Theodore Malpass, 44, vice president in charge of manufacturing at the Iron Works, received severe cuts on the head. It was reported that he would be released from the hospital, probably this week.

Other occupants of the small plane were: Charles Fox, 40, of 608 Westgate, Washington, Ill., and Leroy Seiwel, 48, of Peoria, Ill. The two men were treated at Charlevoix hospital and released Monday, flying to Peoria, Ill., by air ambulance.

Bruce Malpass was said to have suffered from internal injuries which caused bleeding and was the most critically injured among the four plane occupants.

The two Malpass executives were transporting the two visitors to the Traverse City airport when they took off from the local air field.

The four plane airplane, a Cessna 200-B was owned by the Chain of Lakes Flying Club. Federal Aviation Agency men arrived on the scene the next day inspecting the wreckage. It was said their official report on the cause of the mishap would not be released for some time.

The crash victims were transported to Charlevoix hospital by city police ambulance, fire department ambulance and Bill Huckle, who volunteered his station wagon for the run.

Police said that county road commission employees working on the road near the accident rushed to the scene at the moment of the crash.

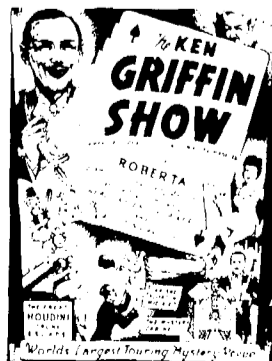
Homecoming festivities are underway. All classes, grades seven through twelve, are working diligently on their floats so that they may be paraded through the town Friday afternoon, October 21.

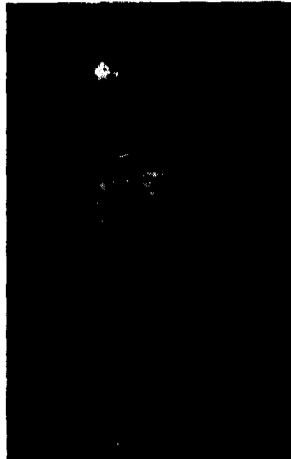

# Hi-School Notes

The Future Teachers of America held its first meeting Monday, October 10, at 7:00 p.m. in the home economics room. "The Code of Ethics of the Education Profession" and other informative pamphlets were distributed to the members. The FTA Pledge was recited by all present. Carol Coolman, secretary, called the roll by name and cadet teacher assignments. Mrs. Alma Larsen and Mrs. Alta Drapeau, advisors, treated the organization to refreshments of cookies and punch.

A suggestion box will be placed in Mrs. Drapeau's room for FTA club members to use. Suggestions will include such topics as reports, programs, refreshments, recreation, evaluations, movies, and speakers.

The club is selling pencils at 5¢; erasers at 4¢; and pens at 10¢. These are kept in both advisors rooms and are also taken to each of the elementary rooms each Monday for students to purchase.

The point system was introduced to new members and reviewed for old members. The point system is a means of earning points by cadet teaching, attending FTA, PTA, and MEA meetings, constructing bulletin boards, giving oral reports worth points; an A is worth three points; a B, two; and a C, one. These points are forwarded to a record which determines whether or not the member is to receive an FTA pin worth a total of 15 points earned during the school year.

The FTA pin is 5/8 by 1/2 inch and white with a silver border. On the white is a silver torch with a brilliant red flame. The inscription "FTA" crosses the torch.

A qualifications and evaluation sheet was distributed to all members. This sheet informs the member, especially cadet teachers, what is expected of him by

the teacher. The sheet is the cadet's critique for his and his teacher's evaluation. This evaluation is the basis for determining the cadet's teaching capacity and ability to work with other students.

The meeting adjourned at 8:15 p.m.

The next FTA meeting will be Monday, November 14, at 7:00 p.m. in the home economics room. Dues of \$1.00 are to be paid to Cindy Redmer, treasurer. Sophomores are invited to attend.

The Class of 1968 met Tuesday, October 11, during seventh period in the cafeteria. They discussed naming, constructing, and the location of the float. David Krake, chairman of the float committee, suggested that a list of famous quotations be placed on the second floor of the high school for the class to decide which would be the best. The treasury contains approximately \$200.

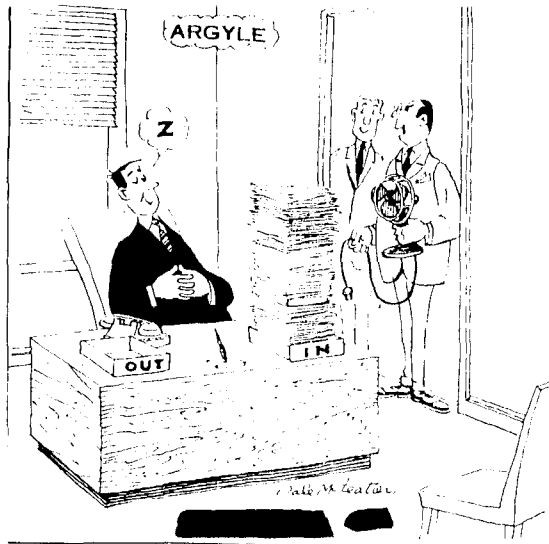

## Shop, Mail Early Use The Zip Code

The best way to assist the Postal service during the Christmas "rush" is to shop early, mail early and use ZIP Codes.

It definitely is not too early to start putting your mailing lists in order," the Postmaster General says.

By organizing your Christmas mailing early, you help your self to a happier and more relaxed holiday season.

The mobilization manual lists suggested mailing dates to assure on-time delivery of Christmas mail as:

**Domestic surface mail**--gift parcels for distant states by areas by December 14, Greeting cards for distant states by December 10, for near-by areas by December 15.

**Overseas surface mail**--should be sent no later than November 10. Overseas air mail should be sent by December 10. Domestic air mail is suggested for the tail end of the mailing rush.

The Postmaster General reminded those mailing to servicemen in the Pacific area and Southeast Asia that small parcels weighing five pounds or less may be mailed at the domestic surface rate between the point of deposit and San Francisco. The packages will be sent by surface to the West Coast and by air on a space available basis to their final destination.

The special issue of the

Postal bulletin places heavy emphasis on the use of ZIP Codes. Residents of East Jordan delivery area will be offered an opportunity to ZIP Code their mailing lists during October.

Postal employees will deliver "no postage needed" cards to each of the city's boxholders and rural patrons during the month of October. The cards will have blanks for out of town addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the proper ZIP Codes.

After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards are to be mailed back to the postmaster. Post office personnel will add the proper ZIP Codes and return the cards to the sender. Only addresses, not names of correspondents, should be listed on the cards. ZIP Codes represent delivery areas for the postal services, not individuals.

## Must Report Address Change

State law provides that any driver of a motor vehicle having a change of address must notify the nearest State Dep't branch office, either operator-chauffeur or license plate office or any local

police department or sheriff office of this change immediately.

A change of address from will be made out at no charge to the individual and the change of address typed on the

back of the drivers license. A sticker with address change may be used.

This procedure is mandatory and the Michigan vehicle code provides for it. It is important to enforcement agencies, courts and the department of state.

It is also important for economic reasons. Personal services and the job of finding a driver by any

agency can be expensive. It is also a safe guard to the motorist in case of an accident or loss of wallet that the correct address be available.

## WSU Biologist Traces Habits Of State's Migratory Waterfowl



DETROIT Every fall, Michigan's skies are dotted with ducks and geese departing from the cold north for warmer areas in the south where open water and food are available. The geese fly in distinct V-shaped formations, whereas most of the ducks fly in more irregular, smaller, wedgeshaped groups.

"It is commonly believed that each flock has a special leader, but actually the leader of the V-formation changes from time to time," says Dr. William M. Thompson, a Wayne State University biologist. "Just what determines which bird will be leader at a given time is not known," he says.

Michigan, with its many small inland lakes and the surrounding Great Lakes, is home for about 37 species of ducks, geese, swans and mergansers each year.

All the waterfowl of North America migrate along one of four major or less distinct routes. Most birds from Michigan and the Great Lakes seem to follow the Mississippi drainage system, although some go instead by way of the Atlantic coast.

Since most migrating waterfowl depend on aquatic plants and animals for food, they must have open water in lakes to eat. When ponds and lakes freeze over, their food is no longer available to them. Lack of food rather than the low temperature is what prevents many migratory birds from surviving a northern winter.

Food shortage does not necessarily trigger the southward journey. Most species begin to leave their summer homes long before freezing temperatures occur. Shorter daylight hours and decreasing temperatures in the fall seem to be important factors stimulating migration.

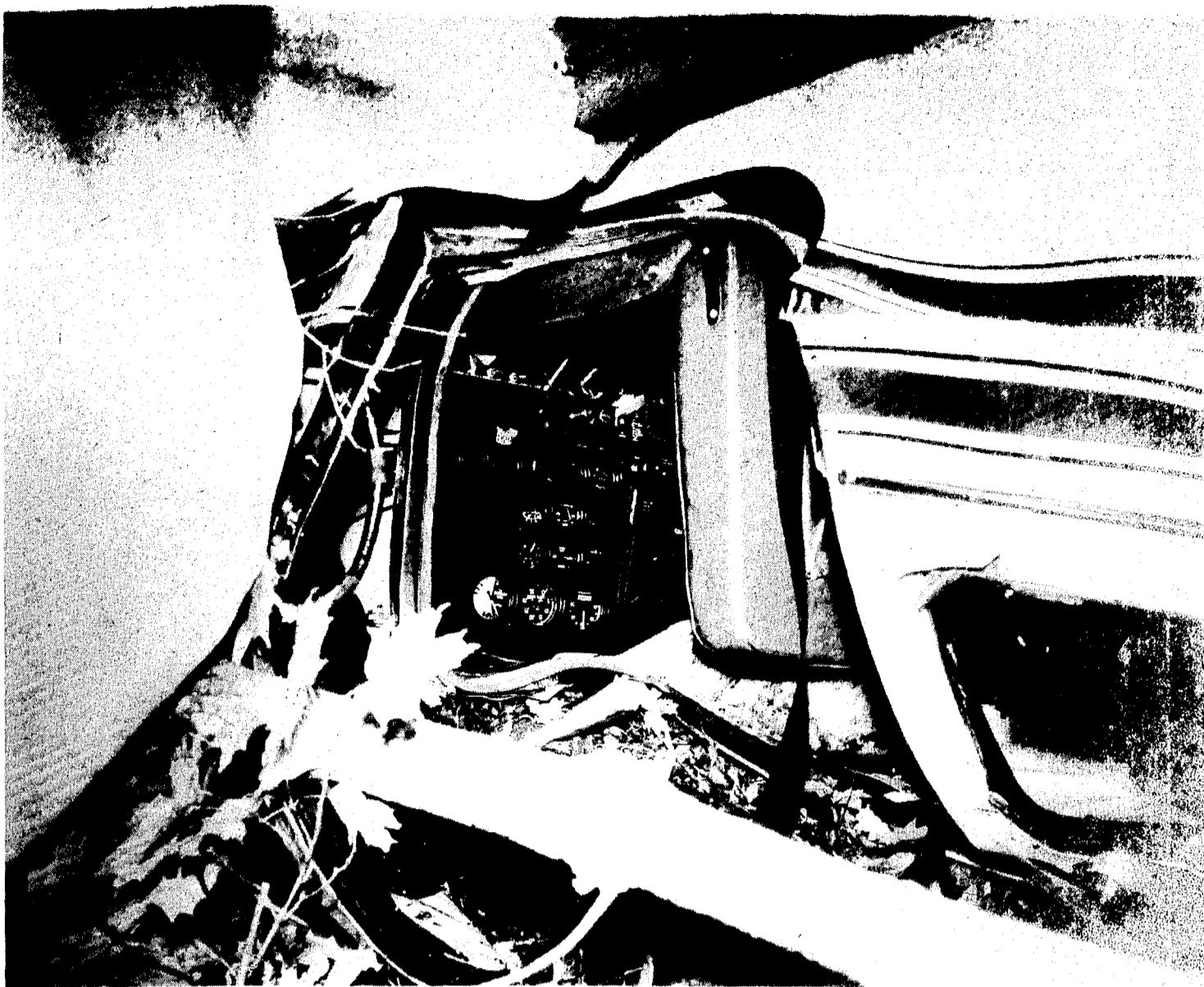

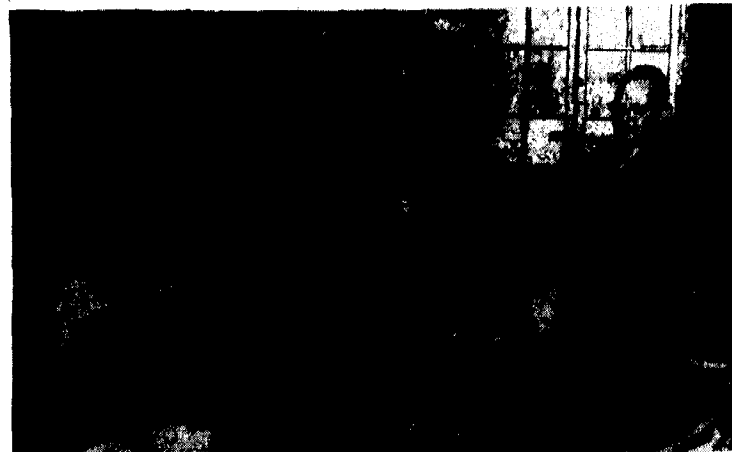

Could any method be more practical? The Top O' The Mitt artists and craftsmen held their Fall meeting October 14, in the coffee house, next to the Court of the Lions, at Castle Van Haver. The vision of one man, John Van Haver, has recreated the barns of the former Loeb estate on M-66 north, near Charlevoix, into a complex of buildings and courtyards known as the Castle Van Haver. Original construction was under the guidance of a European trained architect. It now promises to be one of the major tourist attractions in our area.

Mrs. W. W. Rogers, Secretary-Treasurer of the organization, said that over 75 had registered from the Northern 33 counties of the lower peninsula and that many
